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1. OVERVIEW

This help guide documents CDOT Plan Production processes using OpenRoads Designer & related tools. The primary topics include but are not limited to Named Boundary's, Sheet Creation, Annotation, and Sheet Index. The Sheet Index section covers sheet management and the steps of how to create and put together a project plan set ready for Ad. This includes how to apply page number on a plan set, how to insert and or remove pages from plan set, and apply page number to the final plan set.

The initial dataset is shown below. **Note that the names of the files used and created in this guide are named for clarity and not necessarily the file naming convention used by CDOT.**

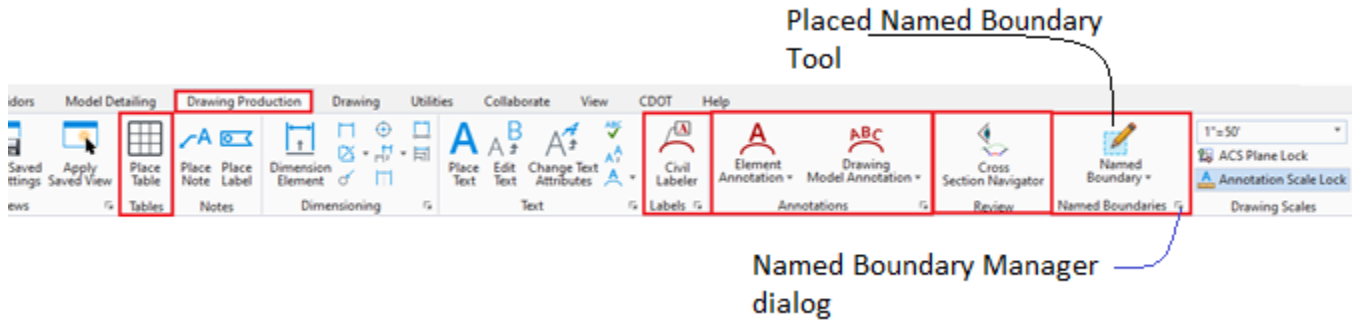

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2. DRAWING PRODUCTION OVERVIEW

2.1 Section Overview

This section provides a high-level overview of the Drawing Production Tools available in OpenRoads Designer that are discussed in this document. **Detailed plan production steps are available in other sections of this document.** Also included in this section is an overview of the CDOT Ribbon Tab tools.



- **Place Table** – Allows you to Place a Table from a Report or an Excel file.
- **Civil Labeler** – The civil labeler is a production-focused annotation tool for the civil environment. Stored as part of a workspace, label definitions are easily shared while maintaining constancy and compliance with standards. Label definitions bring together Text Favorites, Text Styles, Dimension Styles, Element Templates, custom prompting, border frames, and lock settings into a single, repeatable label definition. Examples of use are intersection, station/offset, station/elevation, offset/elevation, etc. and this tool does allow bulk selection of intended elements to label.
- **Annotations** – This is a much more automated method of labeling than the Civil Labeler but generally not as flexible with customization. The tools are feature driven by Annotation Groups that are associated with Feature Symbolologies. Examples of use are Alignment stationing annotation, profile annotation, displaying ROW on cross-sections, etc.
- **Cross Section Navigator** – This tool allows you to easily browse between cross section drawing models that have been previously generated through the Named Boundary Cross-Section Sheet creation process. Note that this only looks for drawing models in the active drawing file.
- **Named Boundary** - Places named boundary elements which define the location from which Sheets are generated. Named Boundaries can also be used to identify where you wish to calculate earthwork.

NOTES:

- Annotation should generally be performed in the Design or Drawing models. The only annotation work that should be done in a Sheet model is when you use the Place Table command and title block info.

2.2 Sheet Production Process

The overall sheet production process using the ORD Named Boundary process is:

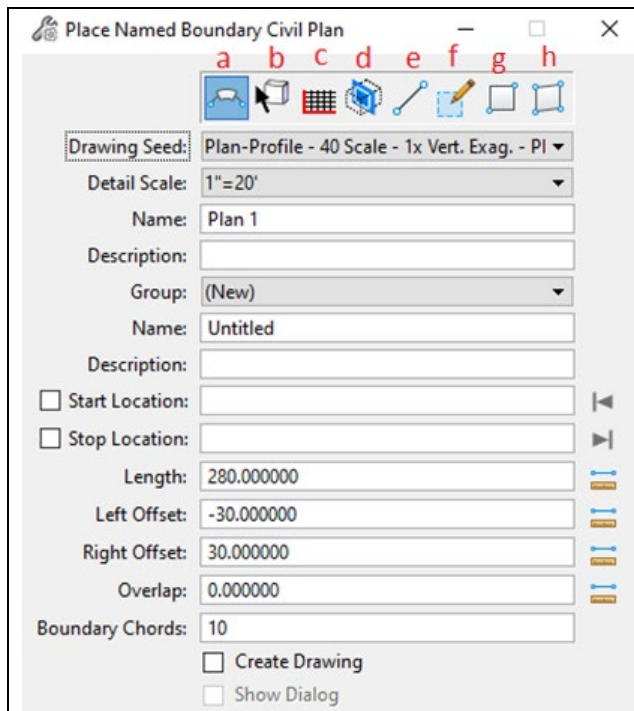
- 1) **Place Named Boundaries** which identify where you want to cut sheets. **Drawing Seeds** are chosen during the Place Named Boundary process to pre-populate the dialog settings.
- 2) Invoke the **Named Boundary Manger dialog** which is utilized to manage Named Boundaries and ultimately kick-off the Create Drawing process.
- 3) The **Create Drawing dialog** is the dialog invoked through the Named Boundary Manager dialog that actually creates Drawing & Sheet models & references the Drawing models to the Sheet models. Annotation Groups are defined on this dialog as well to annotate the XS grid, Plan Annotation such as matchlines, profile annotation, etc.

NOTES:

- CDOT does offer another method outside the Named Boundary process of creating some of the General Sheets. This process is available on the CDOT Ribbon Tab and is documented in this manual.
- The CDOT Create General Sheet tool only creates a Sheet model (a Drawing model is not created).

2.2.1 Named Boundary Tool

Step 1 of the Sheet production process is place Named Boundary shapes that define the areas where you wish to generate sheets at. We will utilize the Named Boundary tool quite often in this help guide so we will provide an overview of the tool below. We will also show the Named Boundary Manager dialog. The modes (a,b,c, etc.) are defined below. **Drawing Seeds** are chosen to populate the default values on this dialog, specify the sheet cells placed when sheets are created, and also specify Annotation groups used when creating sheets.



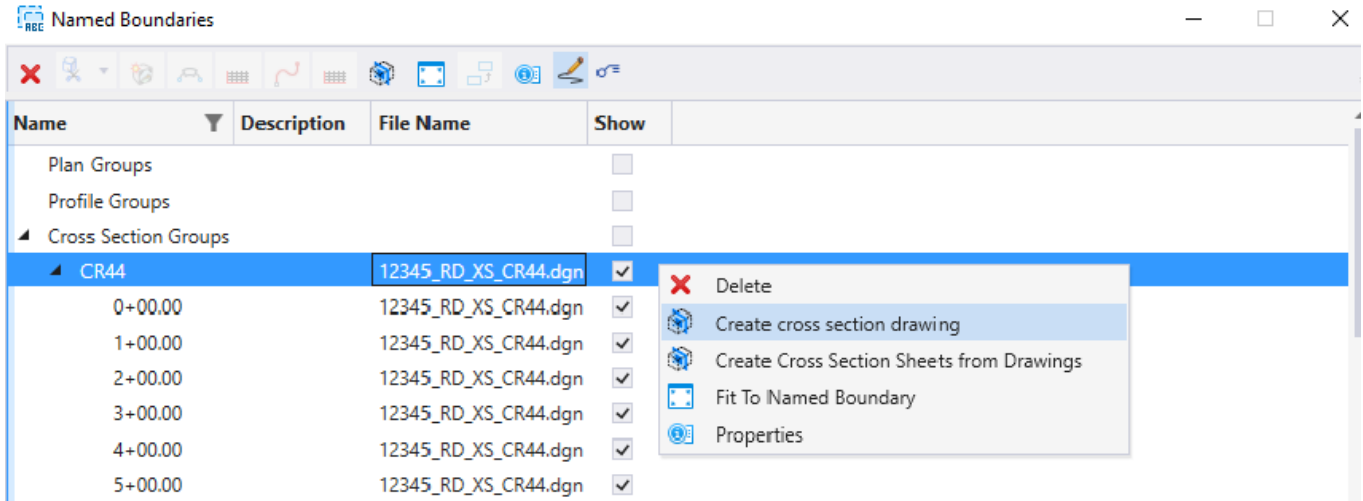
NOTES:

- Red modes to the right are placed along an alignment.
- Blue Modes B, G, & H are not generally used so not discussed in detail in any of the steps below.
- If you check the Create Drawing checkbox, you will proceed right into the sheet creation process as soon as the Named Boundaries are placed. This is a viable option but it is more practical to go through the Named Boundary Manager discussed below to generate Drawing & Sheet models.

- Civil Plan Mode** - (Place along an alignment – Plan, Double Plan, Plan Profile, & ROW Plan Drawing Seeds, Survey Plan, Roll Plots, etc. are available.)
- Civil Plan By Element** – (Lets you place a named boundary from an existing element.)
- Civil Profile** - (Profile, Double Profile, Plan Profile, Driveway Profile Drawing Seeds)
- Civil Cross-Section** - (Cross-Section Drawing Seeds @ various scale are available)
- Civil Cross-Section - 2 Point** (Two point method of creating a Cross-Section Named Boundary. You would use this primarily for skewed X-Sections (at culverts, etc.))
- From Drawing Boundary** - (Plan not along an alignment) (Roadway Detail-Title-Plan-Typical), ROW Title & Plan, Survey Plan, etc.)
- By 2 Points** – (Lets you place a named boundary by interactively defining a rectangular element with two data points.)
- By Polygon** – (Lets you place a named boundary by interactively defining vertices of a polygon with data points.)

2.2.2 Named Boundary Manager dialog

As mentioned earlier, the **Named Boundary Manager dialog** is used to manage (Delete, rename, etc.) the Named Boundaries in the DGN file. It is also Step 2 of the Sheet production process unless you check the Create Drawing item on the Place Named Boundary dialog above. If this is checked you will skip the Named Boundary Manager dialog and go straight into the Sheet Production process.



2.2.3 Create Drawing dialog

Step 3 and final step of the Sheet Production process is the **Create Drawing** dialog. This dialog is pre-populated and generally no edits are required. Ultimately, this dialog controls the creation of the Drawing & Sheet models. In this dialog you can;

- 1) Specify to create the sheets and drawing models in the same file the Named Boundaries are in or in other files.
- 2) Change scales
- 3) Change Annotation Groups,
- 4) Control Drawing & Sheet Model names
- 5) Add the Sheets created to the Sheet Index
- 6) Specify a Sheet Model that has been created in advance with the *Sheets* setting below although this is generally set to (New) as shown below.

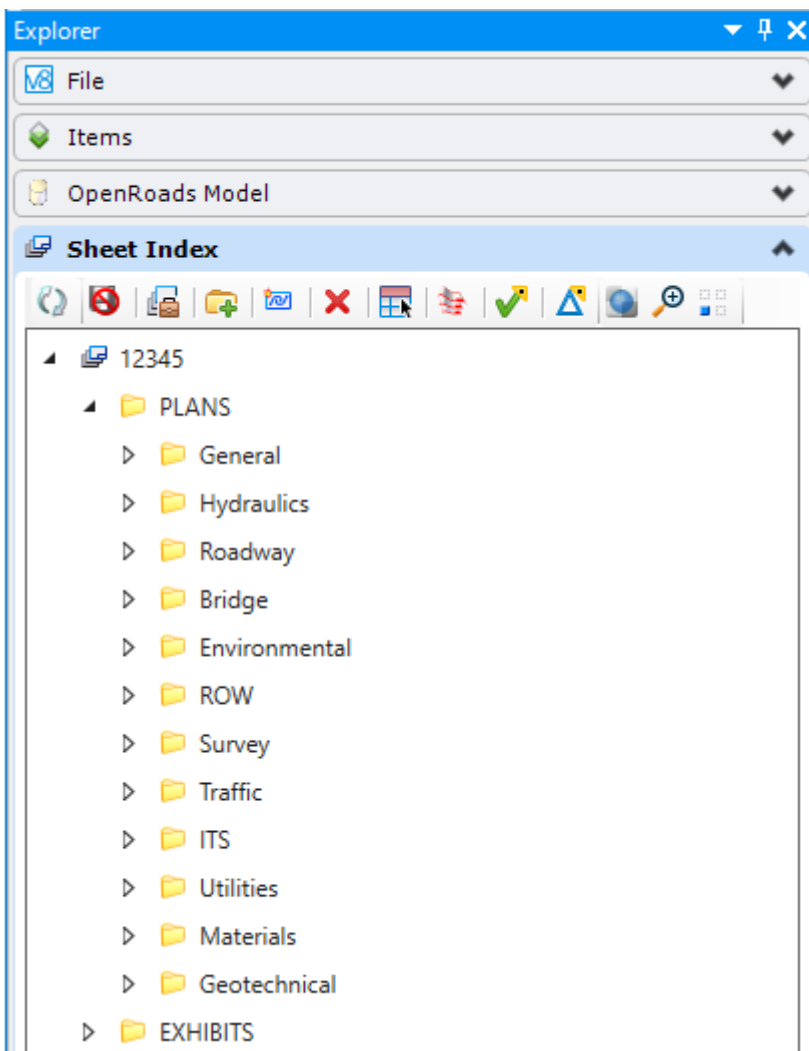

2.3 Sheet Index

Sheet Index is found on Project Explorer as shown below and is used to manage DGN files that contain your Sheets. **It's extremely important that all Sheets are created in a Sheet model because Sheet Index will only recognize sheet models as sheets.** In other words, Sheet Index will not recognize a sheet cell placed in a design or drawing model.

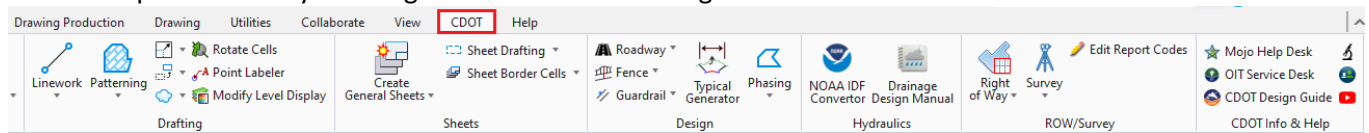
The Sheet Index:

- Aids in Sheet naming/numbering
- Allows index property edits by users of fields like Hwy No., County, Project Code, etc. which automatically populate text fields that have been established in the Title Blocks.
- Can generate an Index of the Sheets as a Table
- Transfers the Sheets to Print Organizer for PDF production or printing.



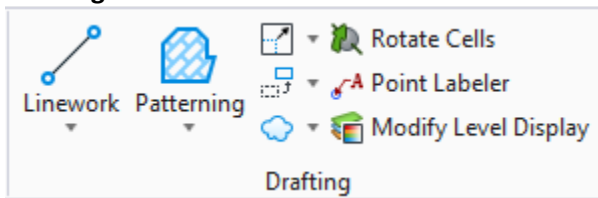
2.4 CDOT Ribbon Tab

CDOT also provides many Drawing Production Tools through its custom **CDOT** Ribbon Tab shown below.



The Ribbon Group categories of the CDOT Ribbon tab are described below with more discussion in the **GENERAL SHEETS & HATCHING** primary sections.

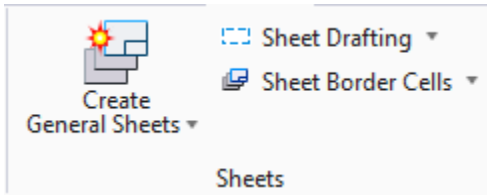
- **Drafting**



These are drafting tools with a mix of commands as described below:

- Linework tools that set active attributes & kicks off the Place SmartLine tool.
- Patterning selections that set the Pattern Cell of the Pattern Area command & kicks off the Pattern Area command.
- Various MicroStation tools including the Revision Bubble (Cloud By Points command)
- Custom tools
 - Rotate Cells
 - Point Labeler
 - Modify Level Display

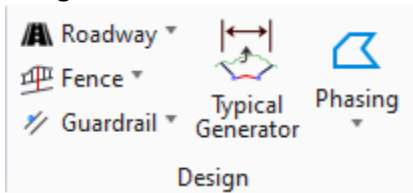
- **Sheets**



- **Create General Sheets** – Covered in detail under the GENERAL SHEETS section, this is an option for creating sheets outside of the Named Boundary process that only creates a Sheet Model (No Drawing model is created). This would be ideal for tabulation sheets.

3. GENERAL SHEETS (No Alignment)

3.1 Section Overview

This section covers the process of creating General Sheets normally found at the beginning of the plan set. These include but are not limited to the following sheet types:

Title Sheet

Index (Generally included on the Title Sheet)

M&S Standard Plans List

Typical Sections

General Notes

Summary of Approximate Quantities

Structure Tabulation

Earthwork Summary

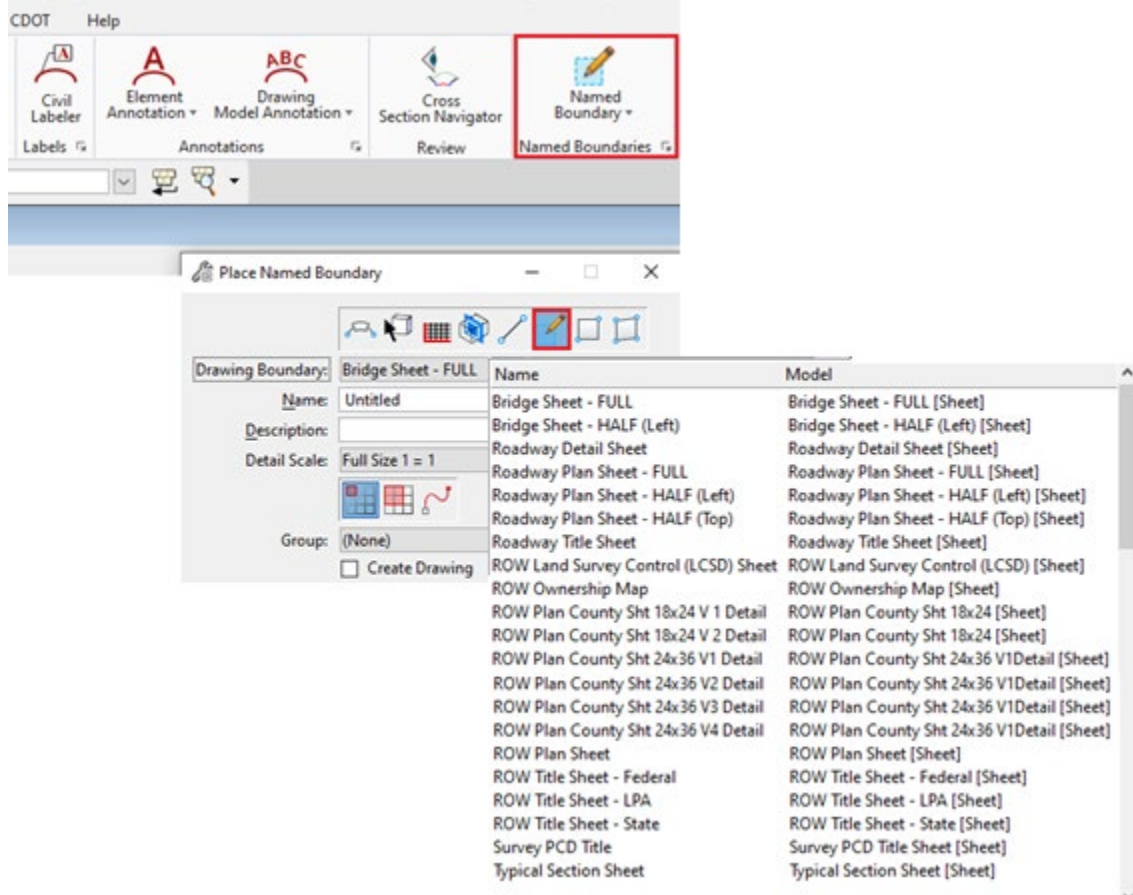
Surfacing Tabulation

Guardrail/Fencing/Delineator Tabulation (Included on separate sheets on large projects)

Any Civil model Detail Sheets

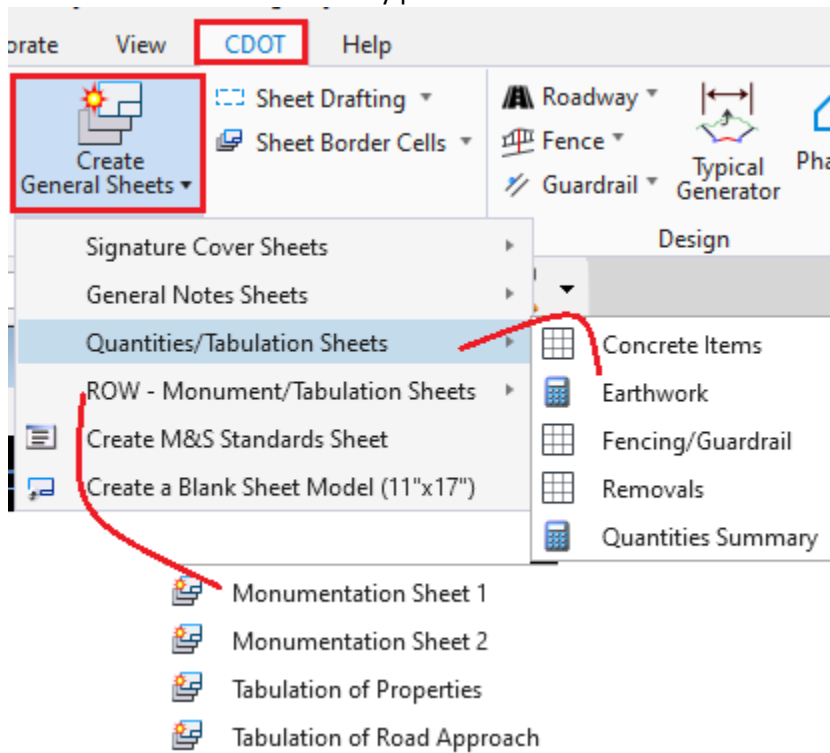
These sheets are not generated along an alignment such as Plan/Profile, Cross-Section, Traffic Control sheets, etc. There is actually a couple of different methods for creating these type of sheets.

1. Place Named Boundary Tool (From Drawing Boundary).



NOTE: Listed above are the current Drawing Boundaries available.

- 2. Create General Sheets Ribbon tool found under the CDOT ribbon tab shown below and discussed more in depth in the sections below. These commands create a Sheet Model but not a Drawing model like the Named Boundary process does.



NOTE: A few of the ROW & Quantities/Tabulation Sheet Types are shown above.

We will create a couple of these type sheets using both of these methods in the next couple of sections.

3.2 Place Named Boundary (From Drawing Boundary)

Annotation should normally be performed in the design or drawing models when using the Named Boundary process to create sheets.

3.2.1 Creating a Title Sheet

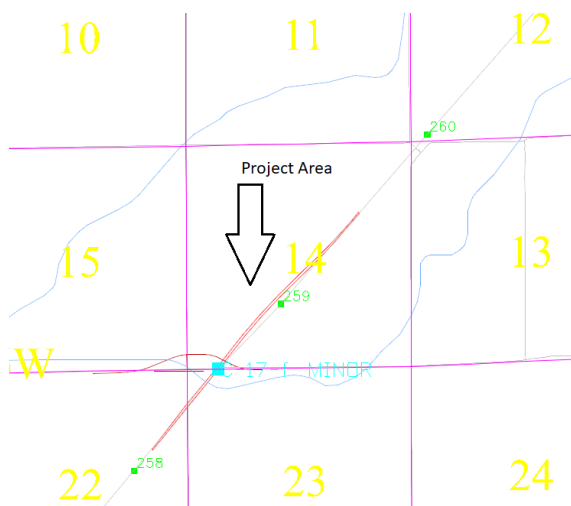
In the steps in this section, we are using a DGN with Section lines, roads, county boundaries, etc. already present in the correct GCS.

*There are other instructions (**word docx links below**) available outside this manual that are a better resource than the steps in this section of creating a Title Sheet because of some of the annotation processes documented there. The word document links below guide you through the process of creating a title sheet vicinity map using GIS data. The GIS data has been compiled from a number of shape files into a single DGN file. GIS attribute data is used to label the drawing for the title sheet vicinity map through the use of the Civil Labeler.*

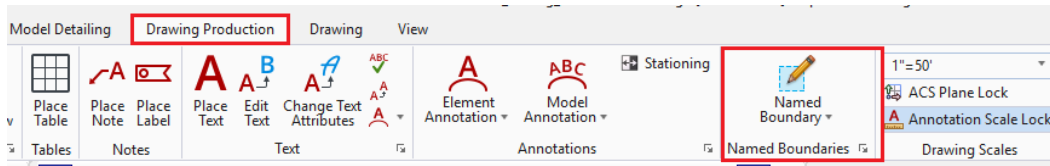

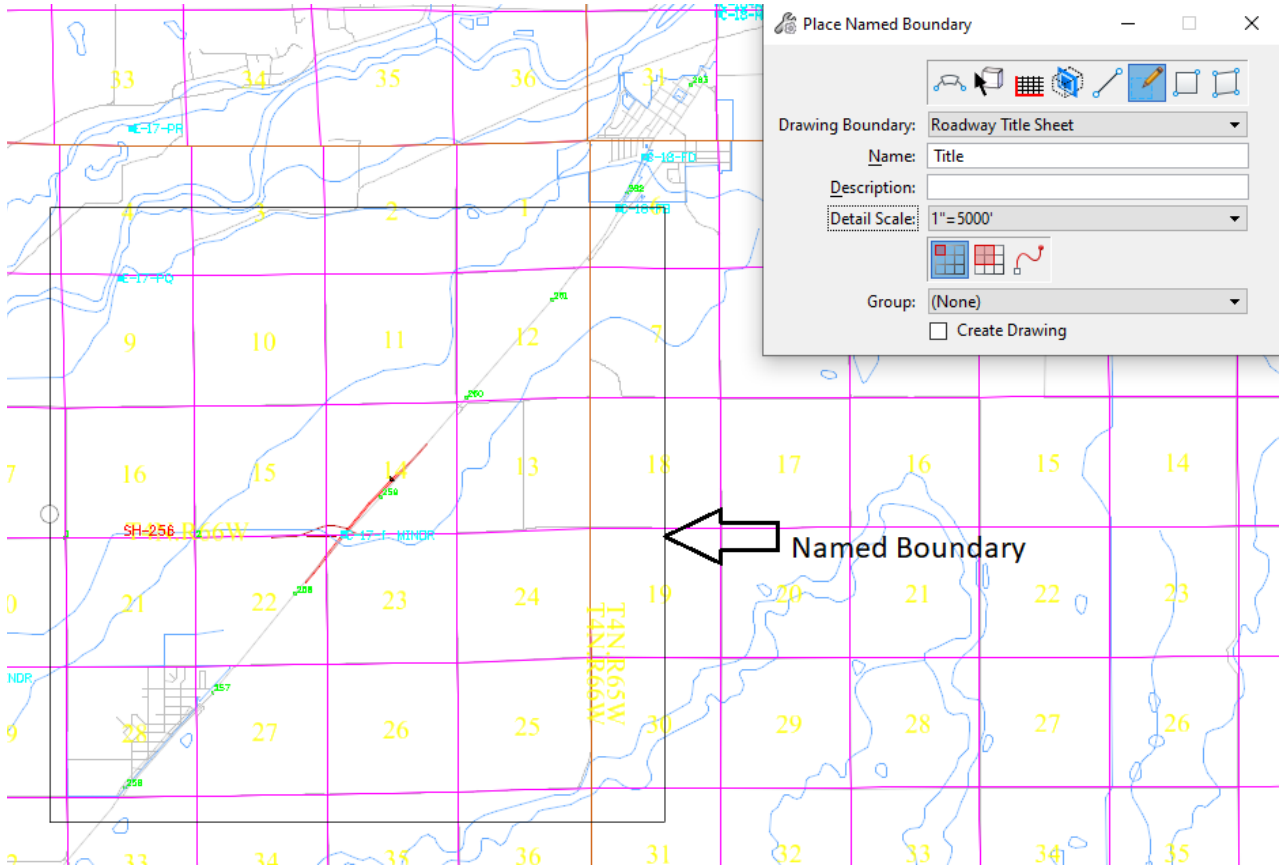
1. Create & enter the title sheet DGN file (Using a 2d Seed file) -> **12345_RD_Title.DGN**.
2. Reference the file **12345_RD_Geometry.dgn** & fit the view.
3. Reference the file **12345_RD_Weld County.dgn**. Note that this file is a derivative of the GIS Vicinity map above and created for this manual. Your drawing should appear similar to what is shown below.



4. Select Drawing Production -> Place Named Boundary.



5. Use the **From Drawing Boundary** method, fill out the dialog as shown below, position the Named Boundary similar to what is shown below, and then Data Point to place the Named Boundary.



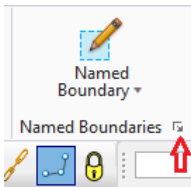
NOTES:

- You will generally change the scale as needed to determine the correct size of the Named Boundary.

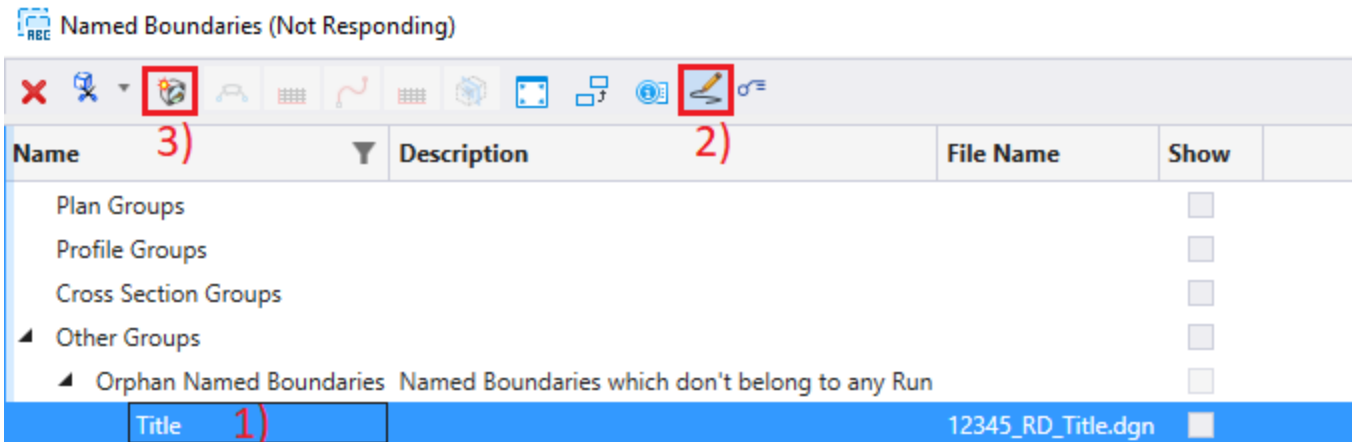


- - Modes are Place Single, Place an Array, Place along a Path respectively.

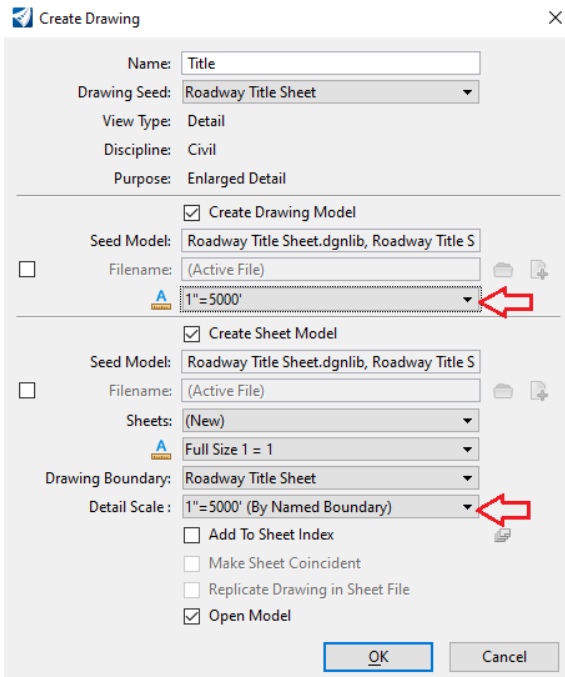
6. Select the Named Boundary Manager button.



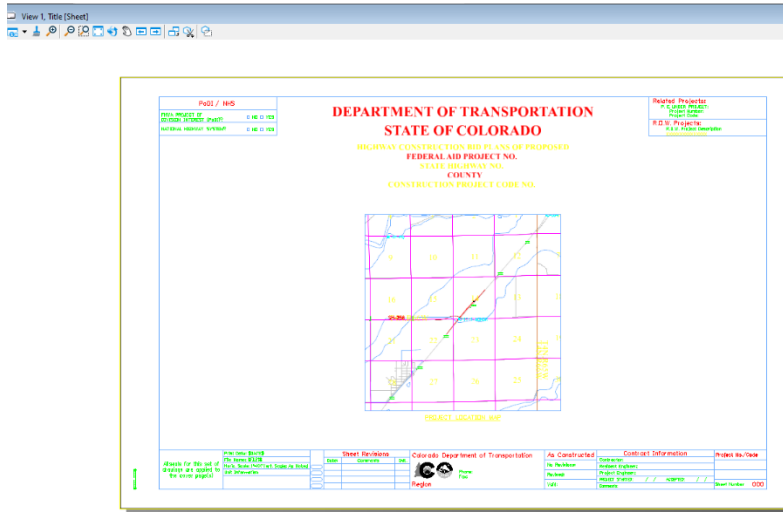
7. Expand Other Groups until you see the Title boundary and follow the steps below.



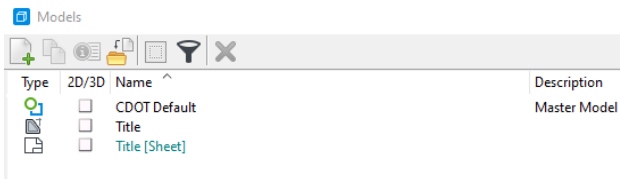
8. Change the scales if needed, review the Create Drawing dialog, and choose OK.



9. The title sheet will be created in a new sheet model.



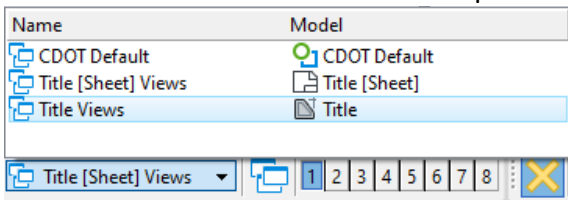
10. Open the Models dialog and review that two models were created as shown below.



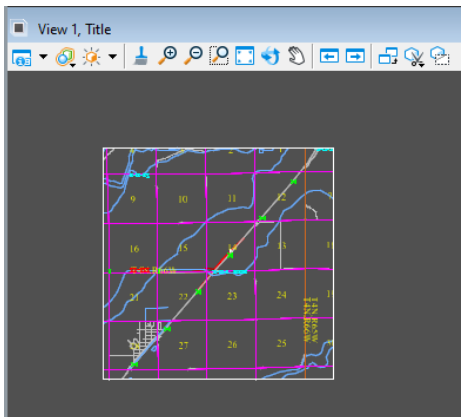
NOTE:

Title is a *Drawing model* and **Title [Sheet]** is a *Sheet model*.

11. You can double click any of these models and it will be opened in all views. Close the models dialog and choose **Title** from the View Groups at the bottom of the MicroStation window.

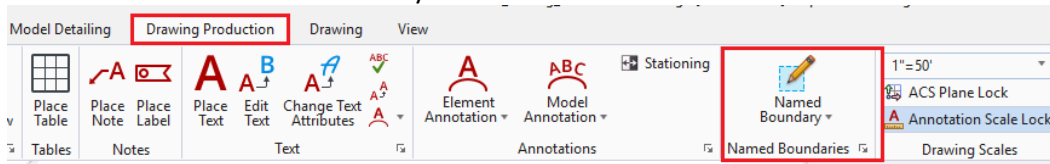


12. Review the Title model. This is the ideal location for any Annotation that needs to be added.

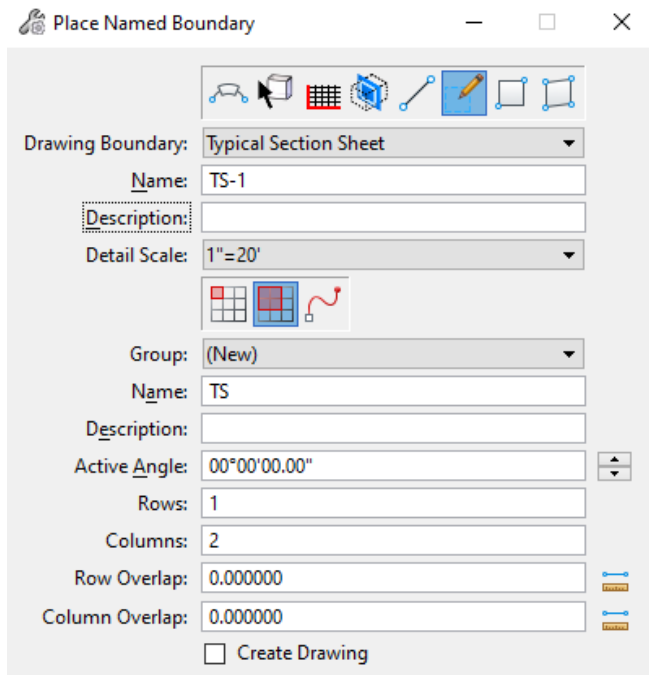


3.2.2 Typical Section Sheets (From Drawing Boundary, Array)

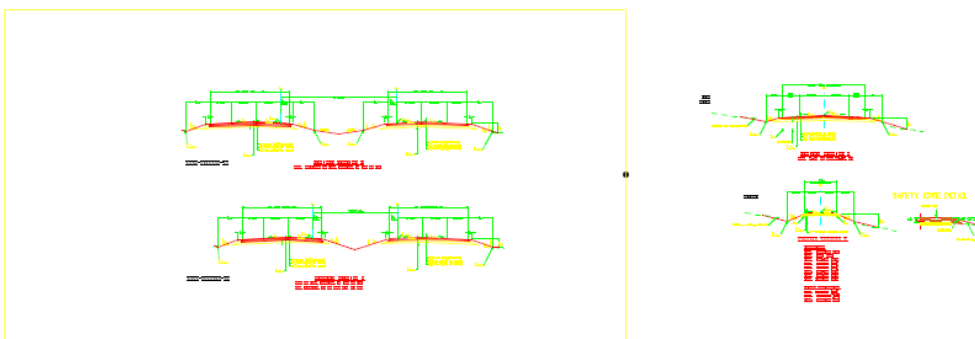
1. Open 12345_RD_Typical Sections.dgn
2. Choose the Place Named Boundary tool.



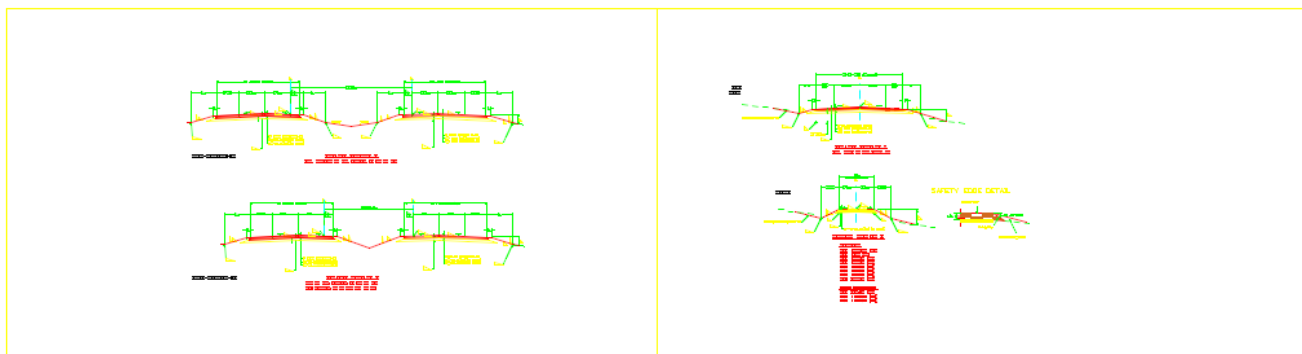
3. Choose the From Drawing Boundary method and set the dialog as shown below.



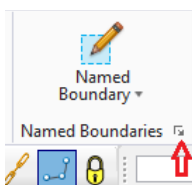
4. Move your cursor to show the location of the 1st sheet as shown below.



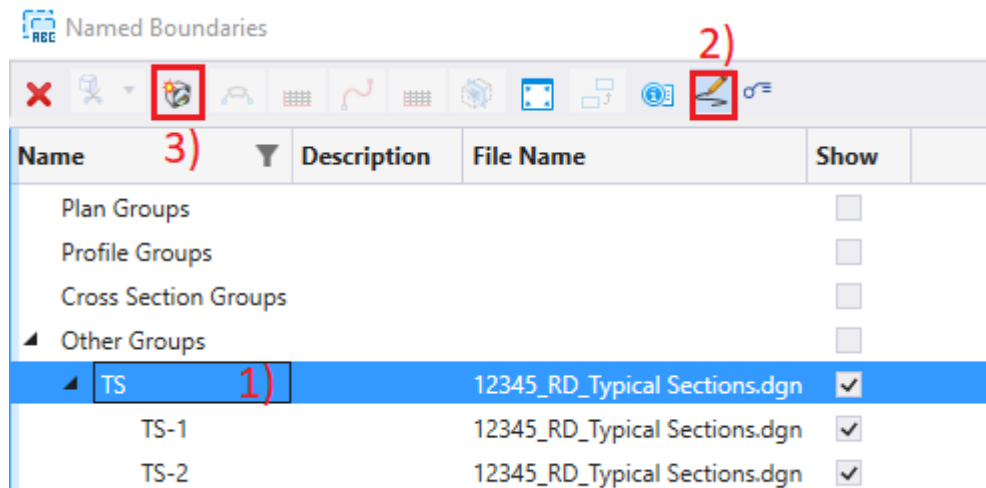
- Data Point to place the named boundaries as shown below. Two were placed since we set 1 Row & 2 Columns on the dialog.



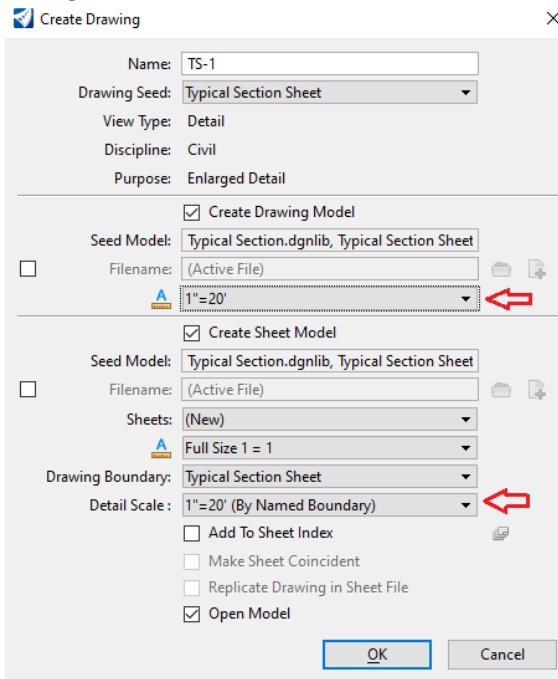
- Select the Named Boundary Manager button.



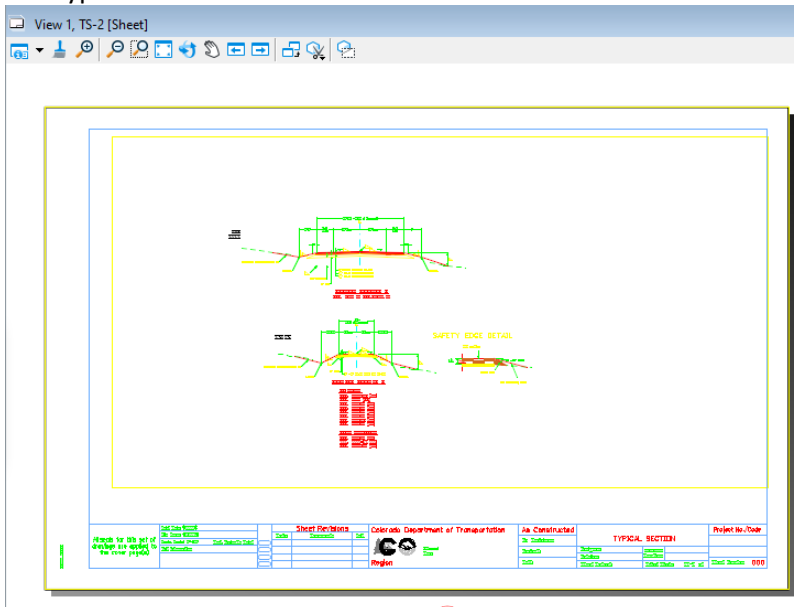
- Expand Other Groups until you see the TS boundary group and follow the steps below.



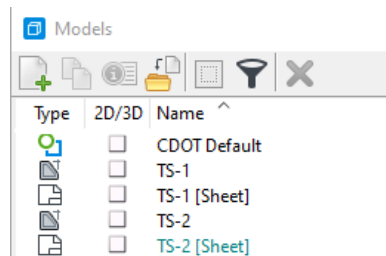
- Change the scales if needed, review the Create Drawing dialog, and choose OK.

- Review the Models created.

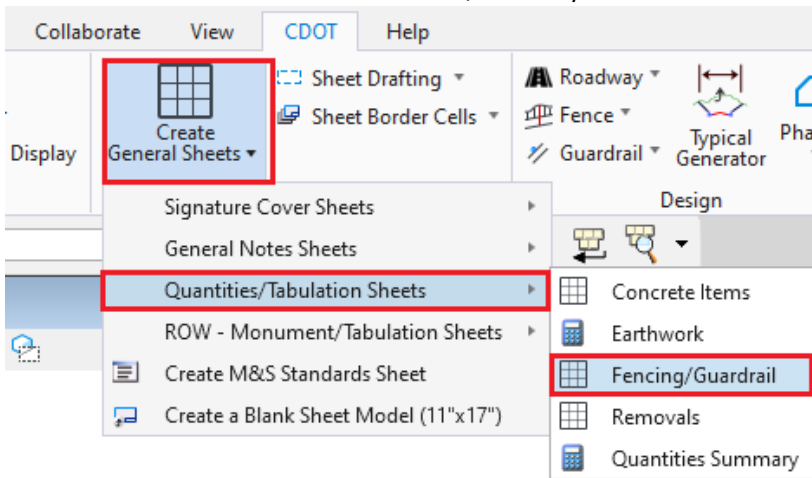


3.3 Create General Sheets (CDOT menu)

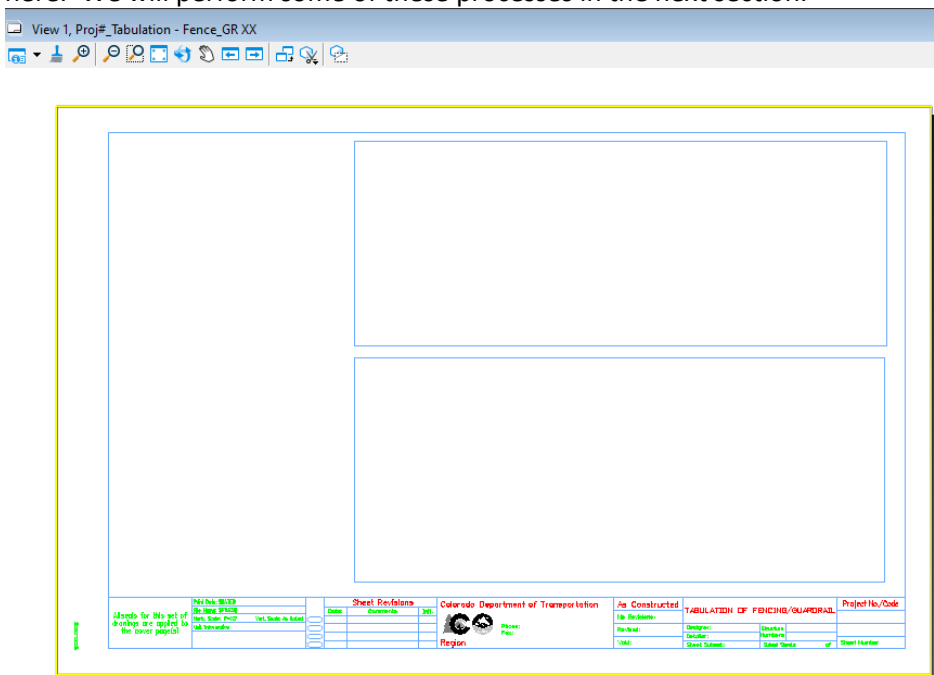
As noted earlier, these commands create a Sheet Model but not a Drawing model like the Named Boundary process does. Much of the time tabular or pasted data from excel/word documents are used as the content on these sheets.

Unlike sheets created through the Named Boundary process, annotation (generally tabular or pasted data from excel/word documents) is performed in the sheet models of General Sheets created through the CDOT ribbon tab because no drawing model is created through this process.

1. Create the file **12345_RD_Tabulation_Fencing.dgn** & enter this file.
2. Choose the Create General Sheets -> Quantities/Tabulation Sheets -> **Fencing/Guardrail**

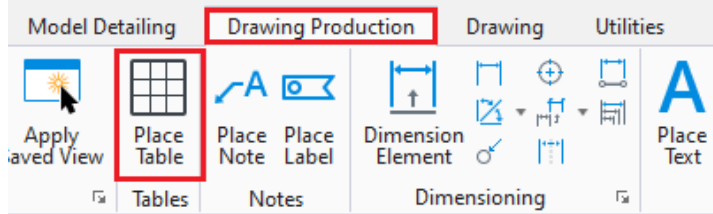


3. A sheet model is created & opened as shown below. Note that no Drawing model was created nor are there any reference files to the sheet model. You will add tables, estimated quantities, etc. as needed here. We will perform some of these processes in the next section.



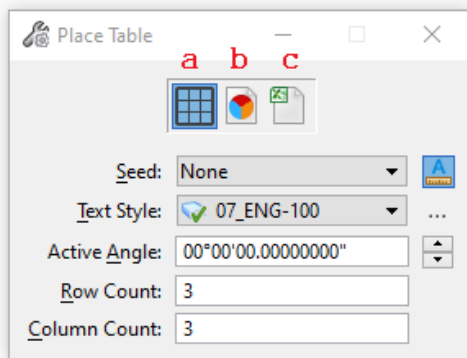
3.4 Place Table

Found under Drawing Production is the **Place Table** command shown below.



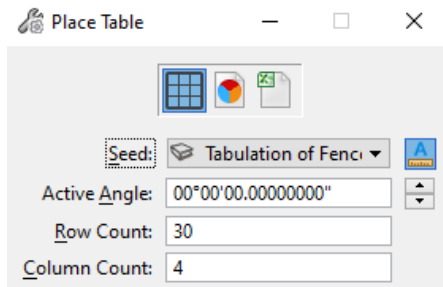
This tool (shown below) allows the user to:

- Place an empty table
- Place a table from a report
- Place a table from an Excel file.



3.4.1 Place an Empty Table (Using a Drawing Seed)

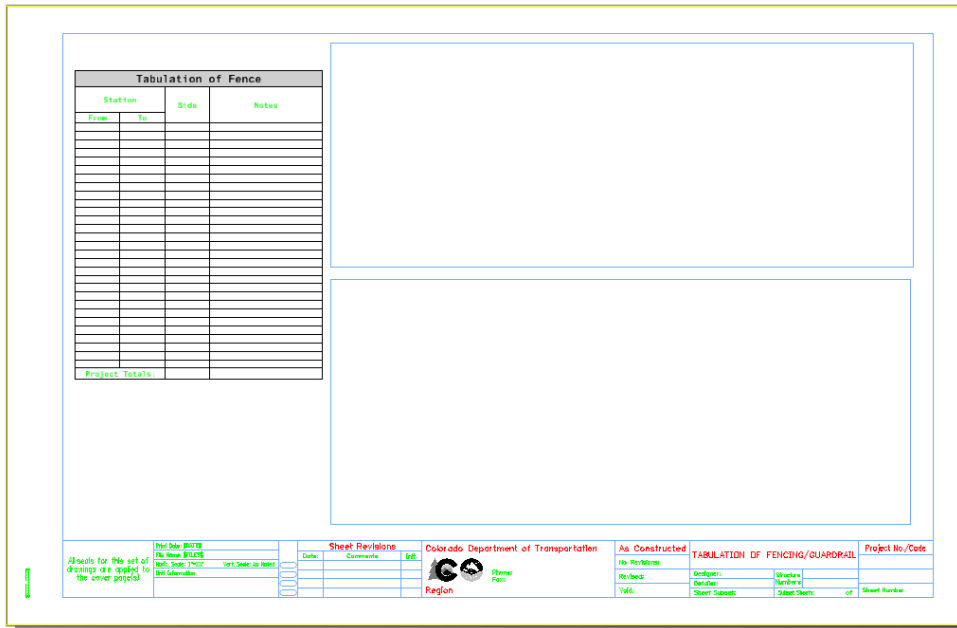
- Remaining in 12345_RD_Tabulation_Fencing.dgn, choose the **Place Table** command.
- Set the dialog as shown below.

- At this time, there is only one Seed (Tabulation of Fence) but more should be added soon.

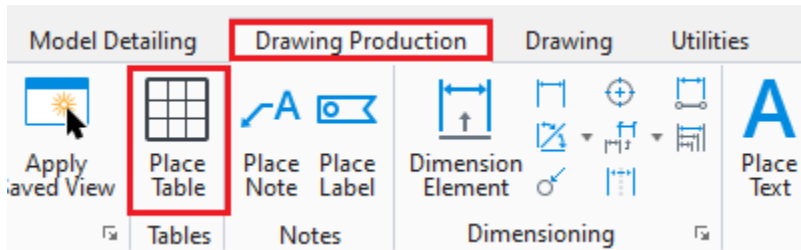

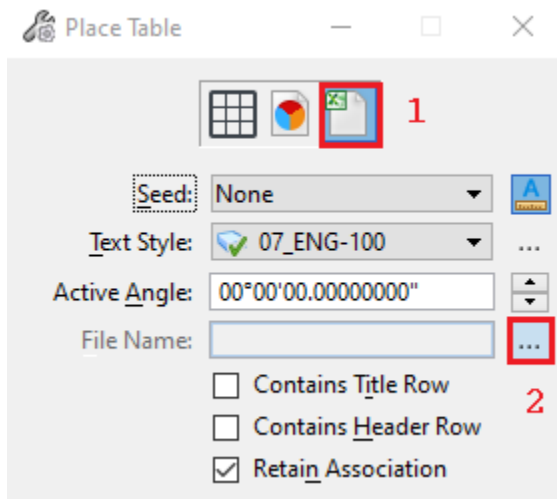
3.4.2 From an Excel file

Below are general steps for using the Place Table command to place rows/columns from an excel file.

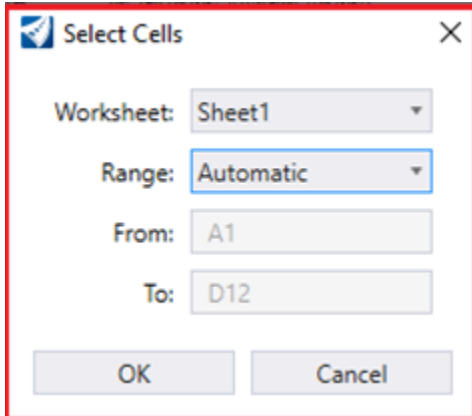
1) Choose the Place Table command.



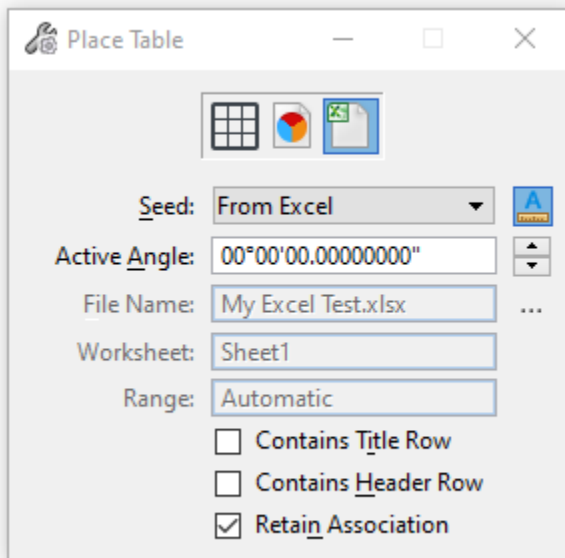
2) Set the mode to **From File (1)** and then choose the XLSX file (2).



- 3) You are prompted with the following dialog. Config as needed to place the worksheet/row/columns as needed.

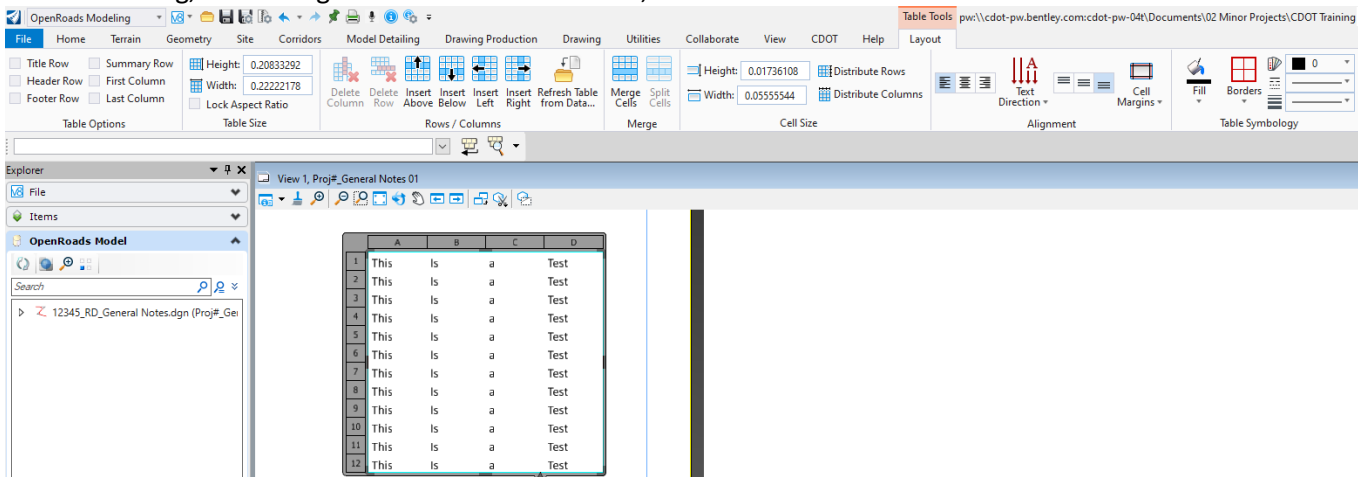

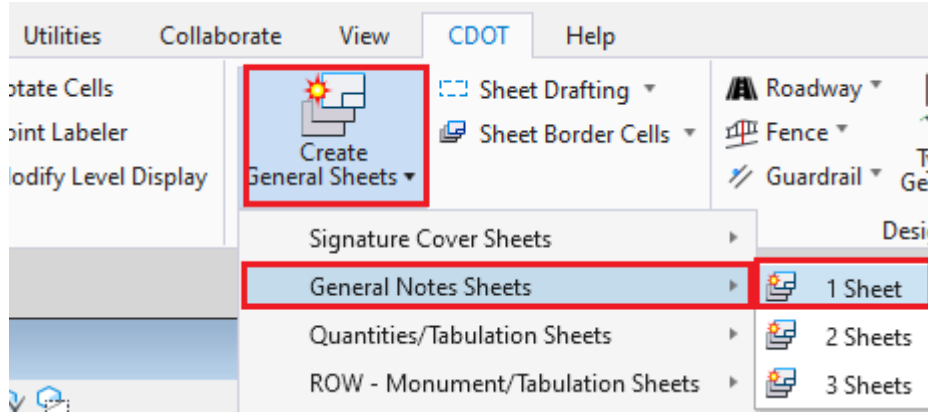
- 5) You can then select this table and notice the ribbon changes to excel commands. You can perform edits such as resizing, Refreshing data from the datasource, etc.



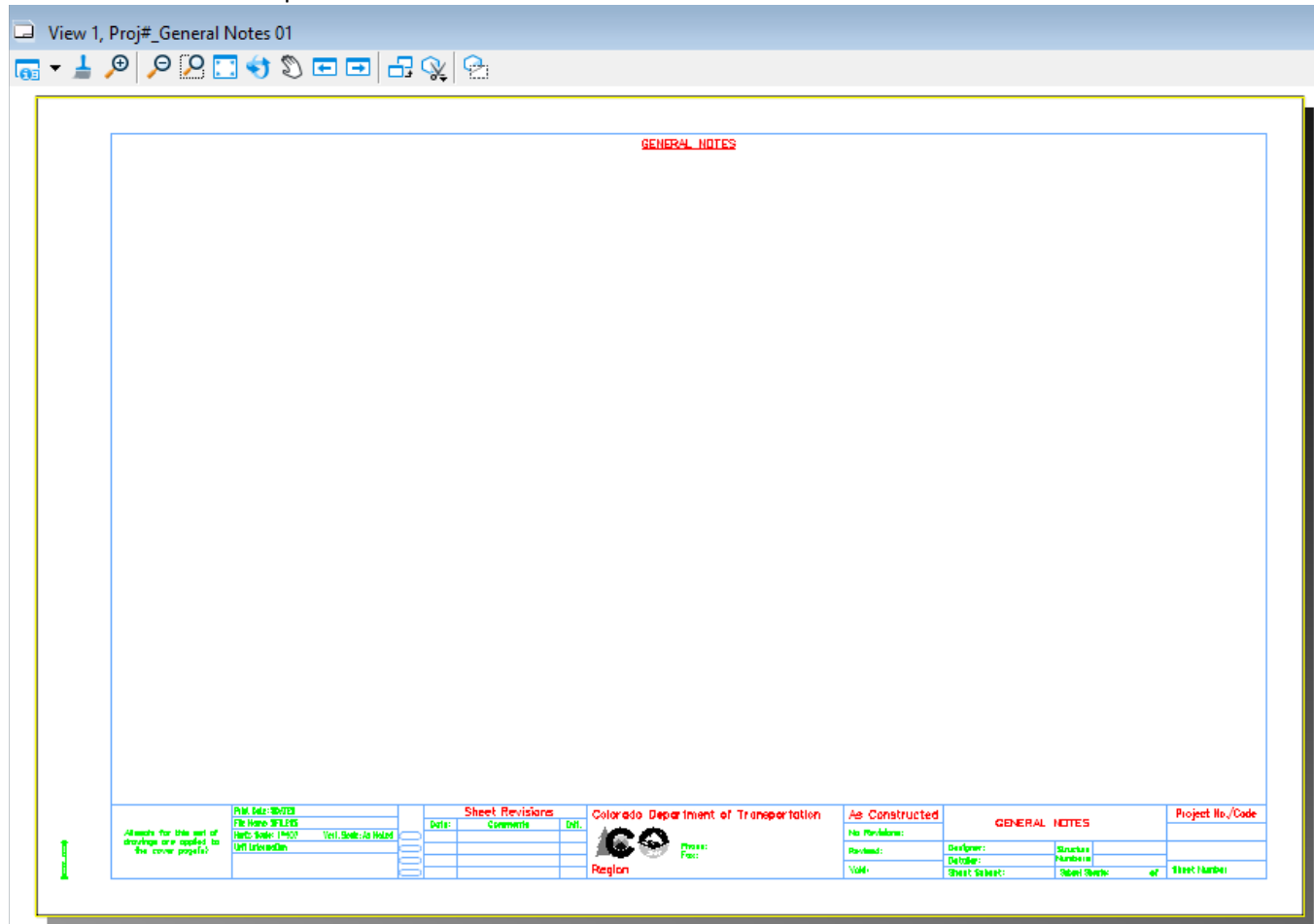
3.5 Paste Special

You can copy/paste data from an external app such as word or excel, into a DGN through the Paste Special command. We will create a General Notes sheet in the steps below.

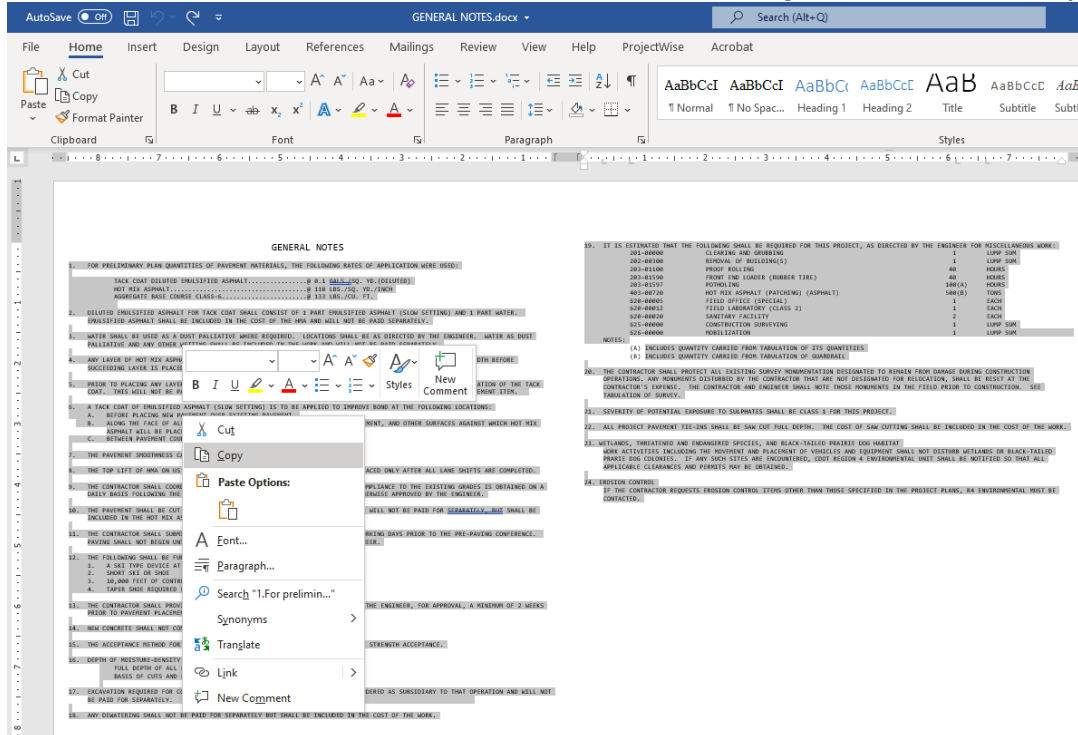
1. Create the file **12345_RD_General Notes.dgn** (using a 2d seed file) and enter this file.
2. Choose the Create General Sheets -> General Note Sheets -> **1 Sheet**



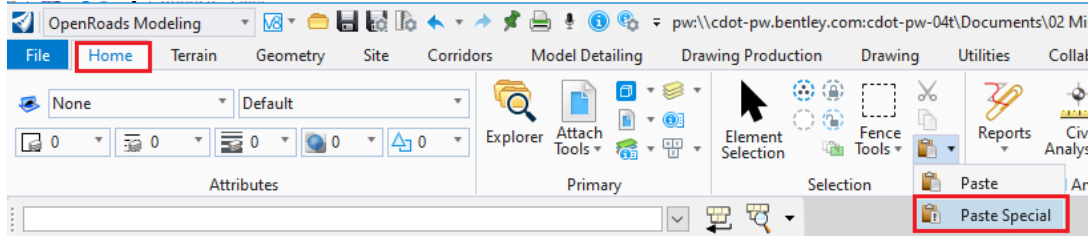
4. A sheet model is created & opened as shown below. Note that no Drawing model was created nor are there any reference files to the sheet model. You will paste the General Notes from a word document here in the next few steps.



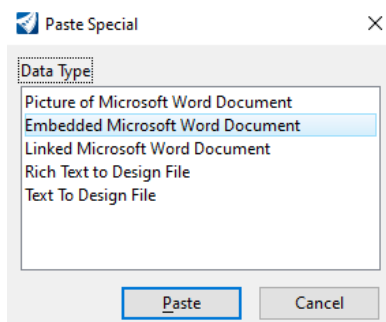
- In ProjectWise or Windows Explorer, open the file **GENERAL NOTES.docx** (that should be included in the dataset) with Microsoft Word. Select the text as shown below, right click, and choose **Copy**.



- Moving back to the General Notes DGN file, choose the Home -> Selection Paste Special command.



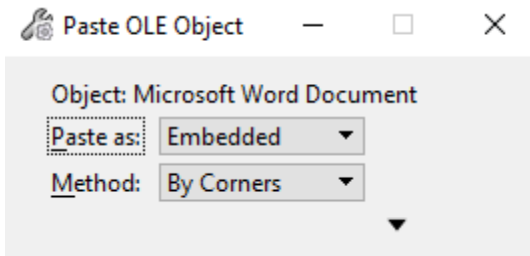
- Select the **Embedded Microsoft Word Document Data Type**.



NOTES:

- Embedded – The copied contents is added and actually saved in the DGN file and future edits are made to the embedded file by double clicking the image in ORD to open the document up in Word to edit.
- Linked – The copied content is added to the DGN file but edits are still made outside of ORD in Word to the original document and then the ORD Update link tool is used to update the text.

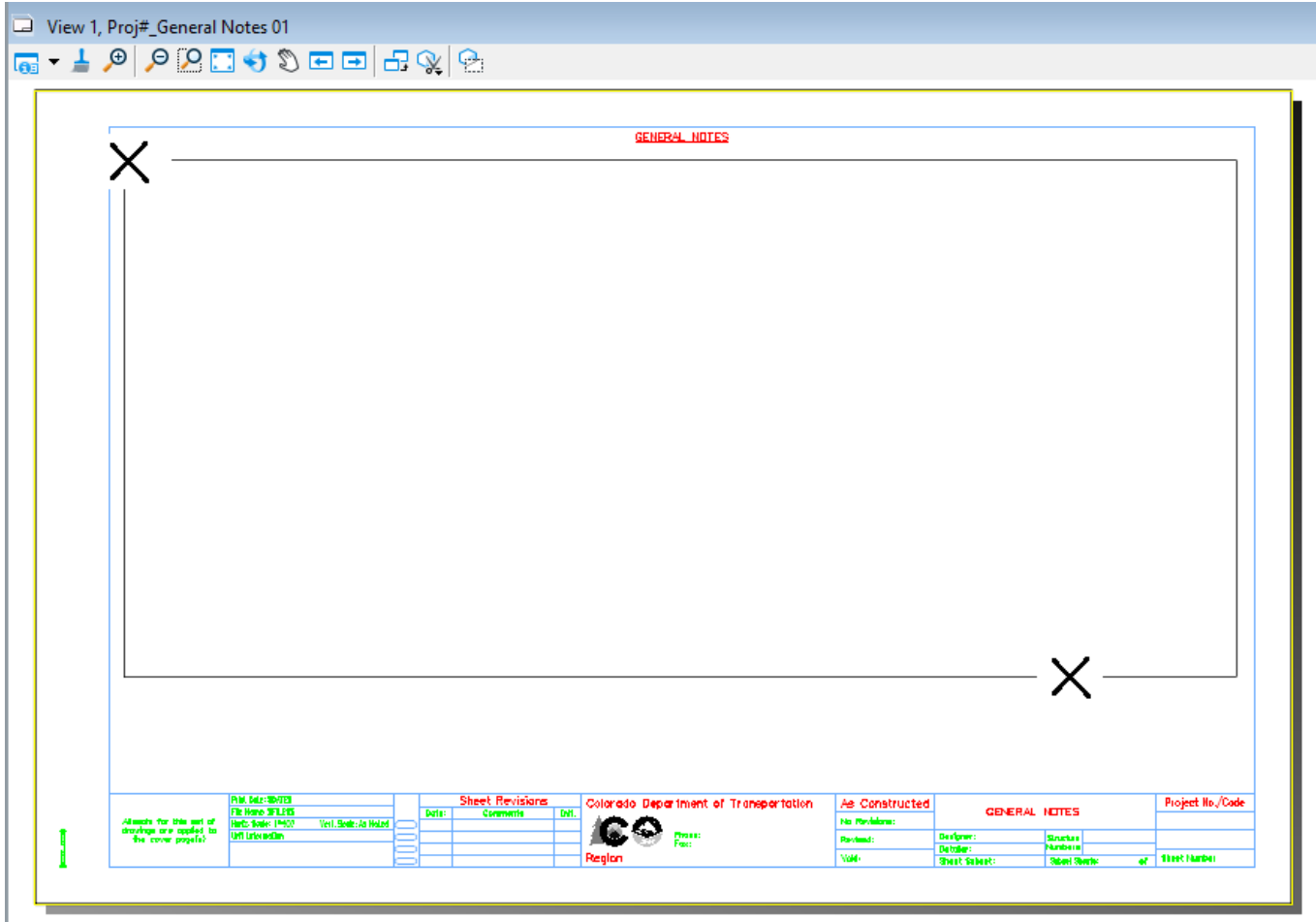
- You should be prompted with the following options on the Tool Settings dialog.



- With the settings above, observe the bottom left of the ORD window. You should be seeing the following prompt.

Paste OLE Object > Select rectangle origin

- Data Point in the top left area of the sheet and then data point in the lower right of the sheet making sure the rectangular shape stays within the sheet boundaries.

- THE CONTRACTOR SHALL SUBMIT A PAVING SCHEDULE TO THE ENGINEER AT LEAST 1 WORKING DAY PRIOR TO THE PAVING OPERATIONS. PAVING SHALL NOT BEGIN UNTIL THE SCHEDULE HAS BEEN ACCEPTED IN WRITING BY THE ENGINEER.

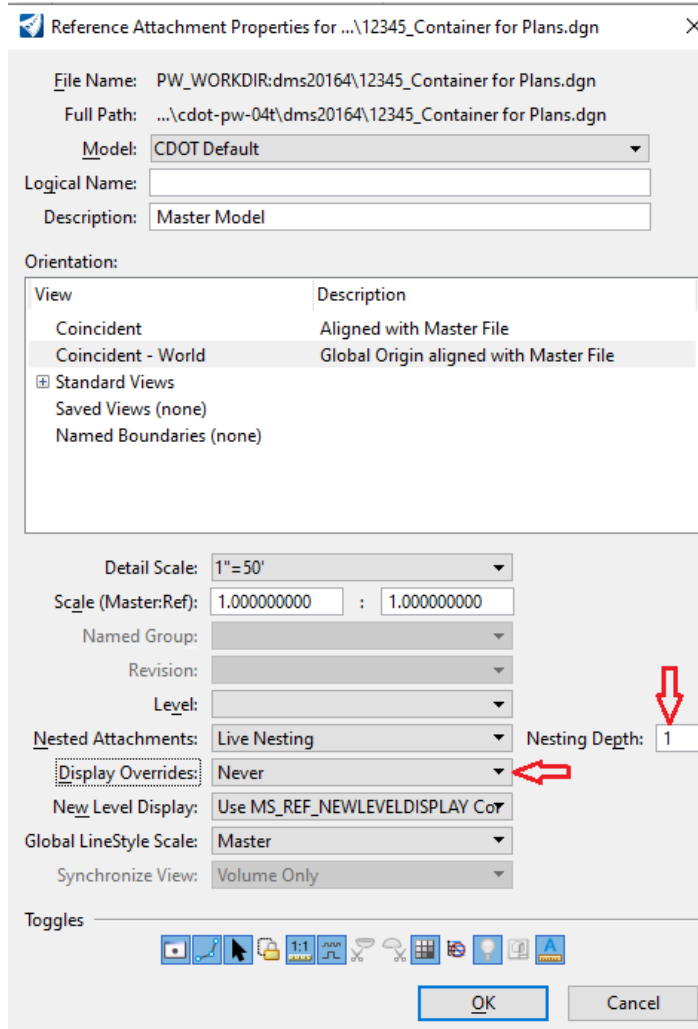
We will create Plan & Profile sheets for CR44 in Section 5, Plan only sheets for US85 in Section 8, Profile Sheets for US85 in Section 9, & Roll Plots in Section 10. Many sheet specific processes (Scales, modifying named boundary locations, adding references, levels, deleting sheets, etc.) are covered in Section 6 and can be applied in Sections 8-10.

Annotation should normally be performed in the design or drawing models when using the Named Boundary process to create sheets.

5.2 Attaching the Container file (or references)

In the following steps, will create a file to reference the container file. In subsequent sub-sections we will place Named Boundaries and then create 1"=50' Plan & Profile Sheets along alignment CR44. We will then create separate Plan & Profile sheets in Sections 6 & 7 along US85 @ a scale of 1"=100'. If you had the same scale for all sheets, you could ultimately create one file for the Named Boundaries but that's not the case here so we are specifying CR44 in the name of the file as shown in step 1 below.

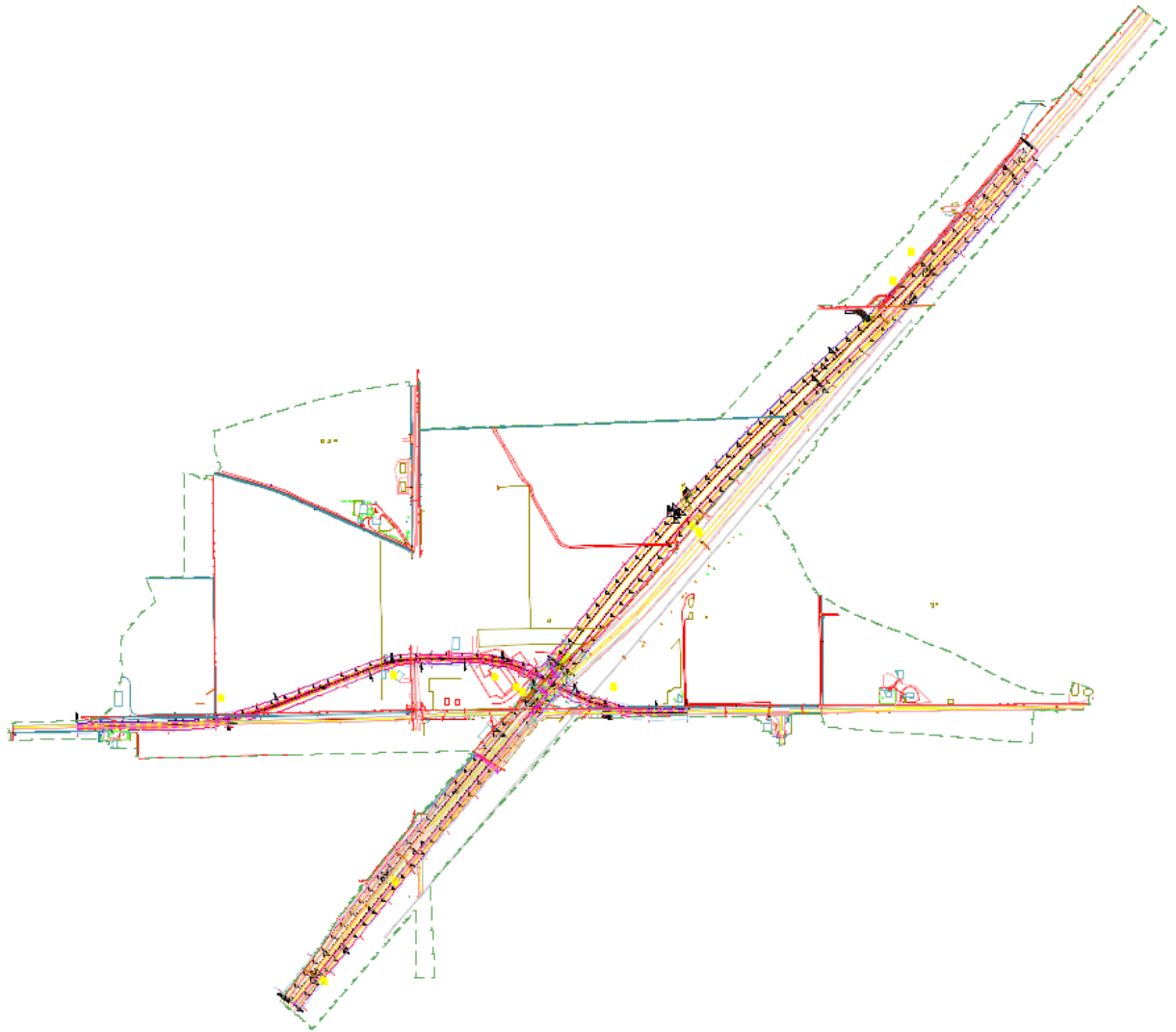
- 1) Create and enter the file **12345_RD_Plan Profiles_CR44.dgn** (Using a 2D Seed file).
- 2) Reference the file **12345_RD_Container for Plans.dgn** with the following settings.

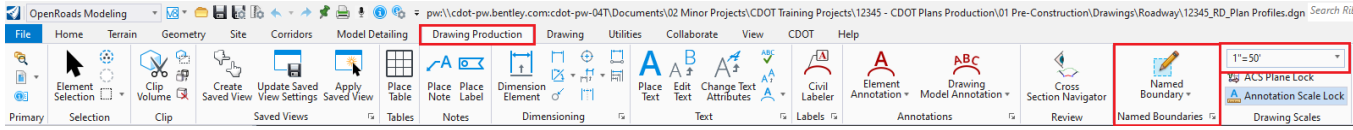

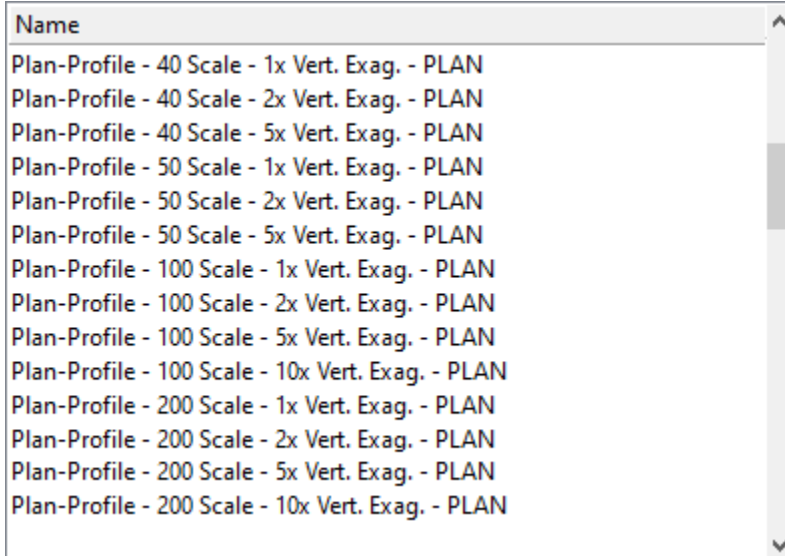


5.3 Placing Plan Named Boundaries

- 1) Select the Drawing Production ribbon tab, confirm or set a scale of 1"=50', then select **Named Boundary** from the Drawing Production ribbon tab.



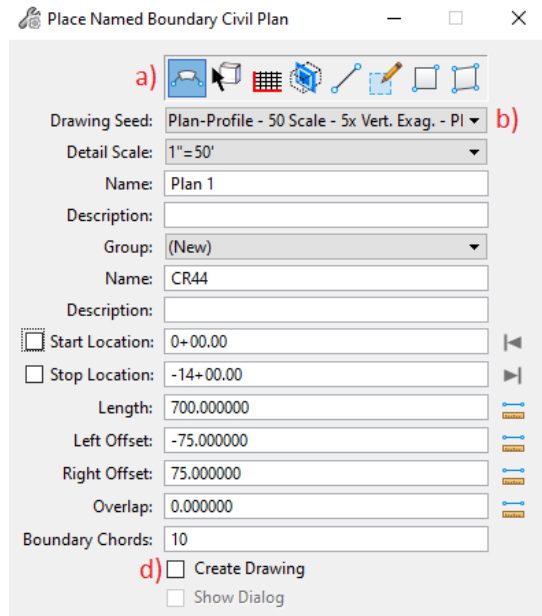
- 2) On the Place Named Boundary dialog:
 - a) Choose the **Civil Plan** icon at the top of the dialog,
 - b) Choose the **Plan-Profile – 50 Scale – 5x Vert. Exag. - PLAN Drawing Seed**
The following are the available Plan-Profile Drawing Seeds you can choose from.



- c) **Select alignment CR44** (You are being prompted to *Identify Path Element* in the lower left of the MicroStation view. You may have to Right click to select this element because there is a Template produced CL element on top or below CR44.)
 - d) **Uncheck the Create Drawing** checkbox at the bottom of the dialog (if necessary).

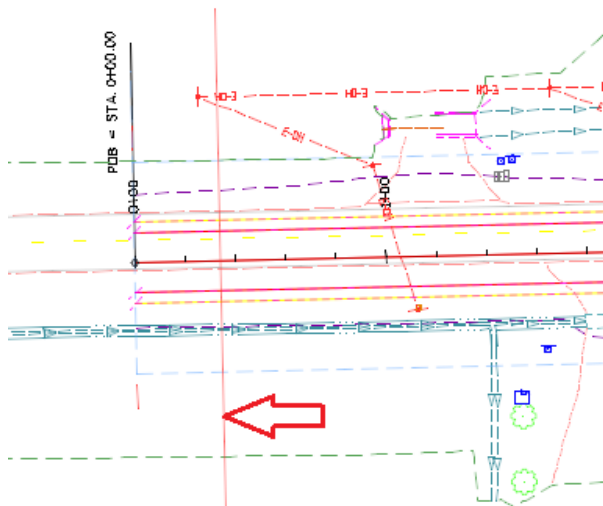
NOTE: *Create Drawing* performs the model/sheet creation which we are not ready to do until we have placed named boundaries for both plan and profile.

The dialog should look as shown below following the 4 steps.




NOTE: Although we will not make changes in this class, observe the two **Name fields** in the dialog above. The 1st (Plan 1) represents the name of the named boundaries. The 2nd (CR44) is the Group the named boundaries will fall under which should be the alignment name. The software will join these two “Names” when creating drawing and sheet models.

- 3) You should be prompted to **Identify Path Start Point to Place Boundary**. Move your cursor and notice the graphics which indicates the start Location.



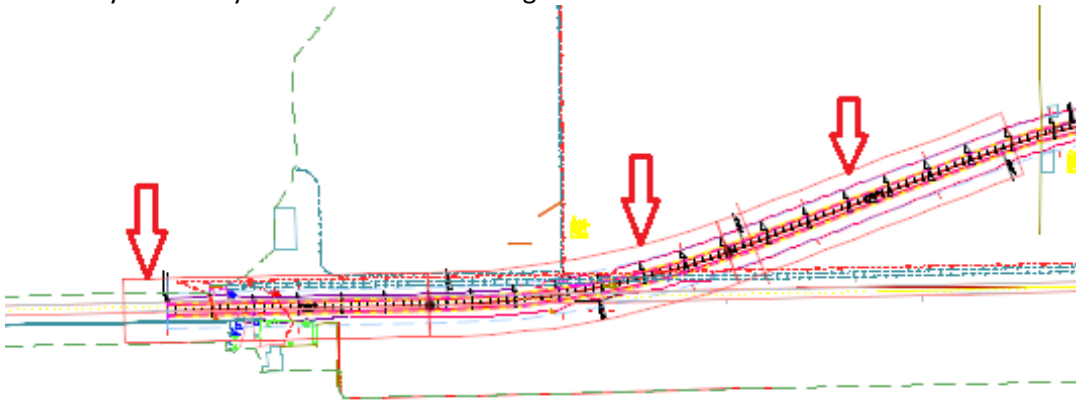
NOTES:

- You can set this Start Location with a data point, key-in, or lock the start station to the beginning of the alignment by clicking the lock to start button .
- You can key-in numbers less than the starting station of the alignment to place the Named Boundary prior to the start station.

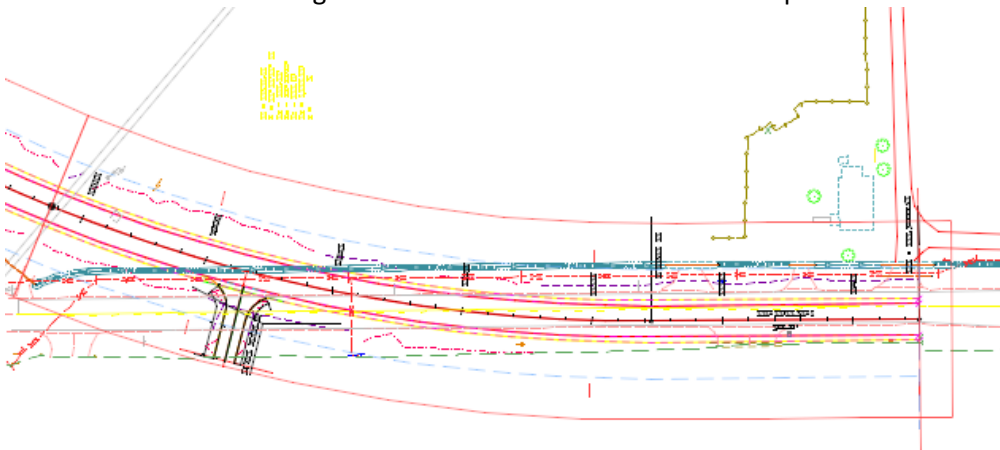
- 4) As mentioned in the note above, you can key-in numbers less than the starting station of the alignment so for this example, key-in -25

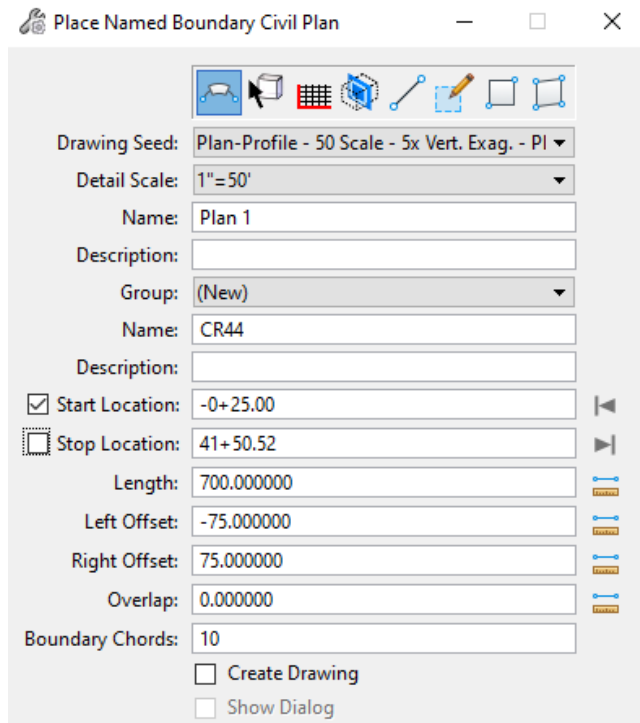
- 5) Data Point to confirm the Start Station which previews the 1st named boundary and ultimately more as you move your cursor down the alignment.



- 6) Now you are prompted to identify the end location to place the boundary. Move your cursor towards the end of the alignment. Data Point so the last sheet is placed as shown below.



- 7) Make changes to Offsets and Boundary chords if needed at this point although we will not make any changes in this example.

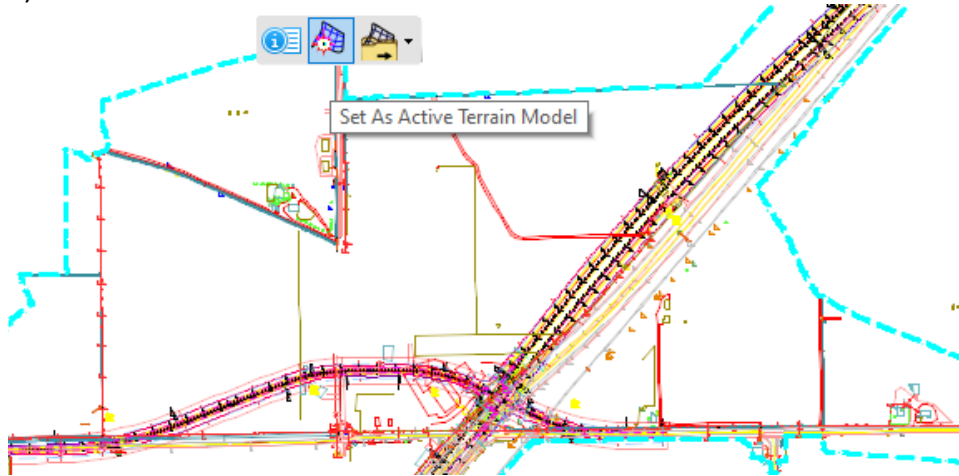


NOTE: Boundary Chords set to 0 will place a rectangular shape. If set to 10 or 20, the Named Boundaries will be curved around curves. The Boundary Chords introduced can be moved as needed to adjust the clipping area.

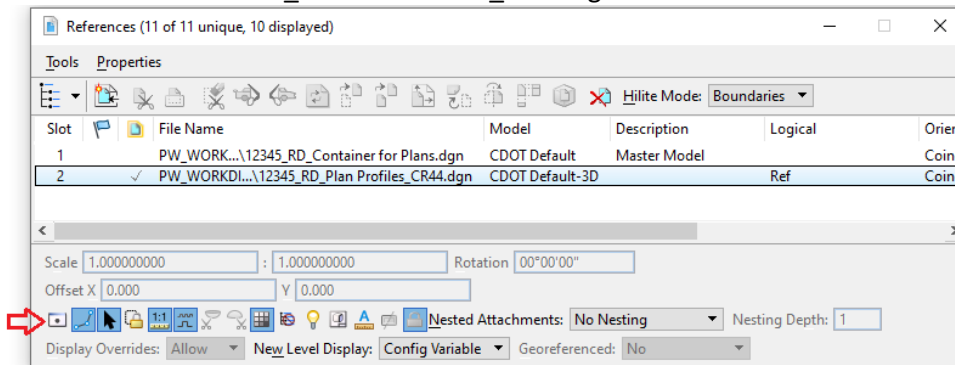
- 8) Data Point one more time to accept the Named Boundary Placement. This will exit you out of the Place Named Boundary dialog.
- 9) Turn any other plan view levels off as needed and Save Settings. In this example, turn construction class off to turn the corridor handlers off.

- Set the *Method* to **From Plan Group**, **The Vert Exaggeration 5**, check **Use Terrains** and **Use Active Vertical**. The dialog at this point should look similar to what is shown below, making note that **Create Drawing** is set:

	<p>NOTES:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> You do have the option of checking the Create Drawing checkbox which means when you confirm all the prompts, you will move straight into the Create Drawing dialog. We will not in this example but this is a viable option. Give 1"=50' Horizontal & Vertical Exaggeration of 5. To calculate the Vertical scale: $50/5 = 10$ so the Vertical Scale will be equal to 1"=10'. Make note of the Available Profile Height (50 in this example). This will help you choose which Profile Annotation Group you will use.

- 6) Once prompted to Identify Profile View, data point in View 7 which should be still opened as a profile view. You should then be able to view the named boundaries in the profile view.



NOTE:

- The number of Profile Named boundaries matches the Plan Names boundaries but that may not be the case when there is a lot of vertical change along the profile. If the profile will not fit on a profile named boundary, the software will break that named boundary into 2 or more named boundaries and shift the vertical datum so that it is different for each extra named boundary if Profile Shifts is set to Datum Stations as shown below.

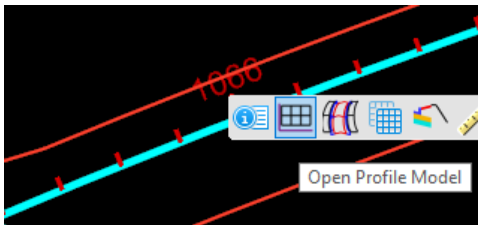

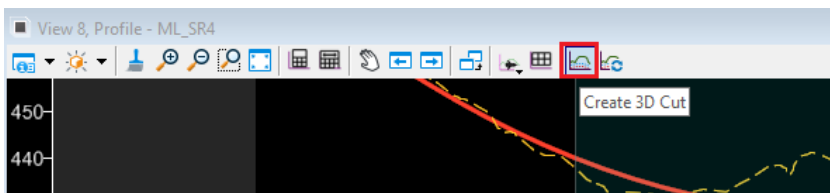
5.4.1 Displaying Elements on Profiles

Profiles, unlike cross-sections, do not automatically display every 3D element the alignment cuts across. However, the **Create 3D Cut** tool will add any elements the alignment cuts across to the profile. We will demonstrate how to display items on profiles that cross alignments (like cross drains or other corridors) in the next few steps with this command. These steps can be performed after sheet setup and any elements added to the profiles should automatically show on the profile drawing model and sheet model.

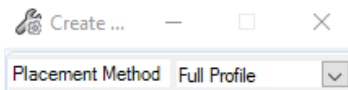
- 1) Open 12345_RD_Geometry.dgn
- 2) Reference the 12345_RD_Drainage.dgnfile.
- 3) Open the profile model of alignment CR44.



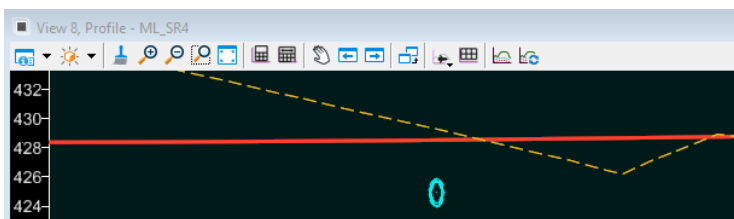
- 4) Turn OFF display of the 12345_SV_Topo.dgn file in the Defaul-3D model.
- 5) Select the command Create 3D Cut from the top of the Profile View.



- 6) Set the Placement method to Full Profile and then data point to create the 3D cut.



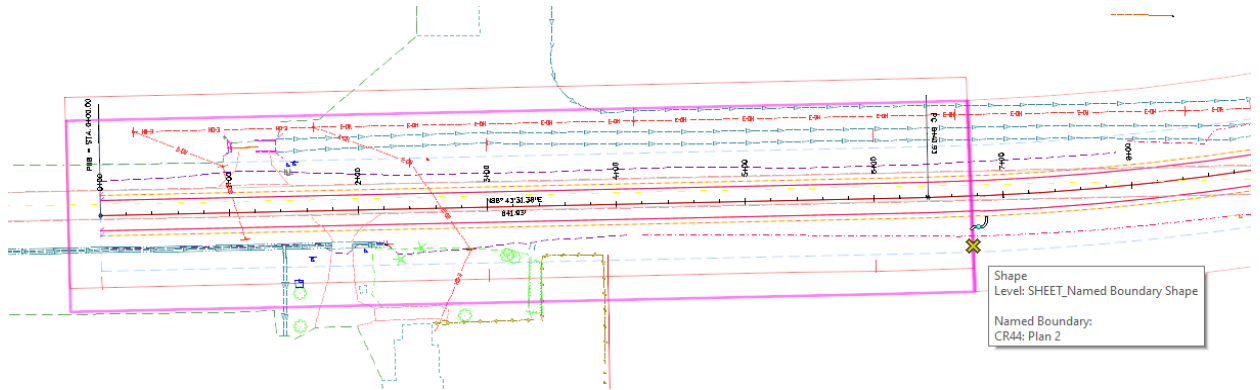

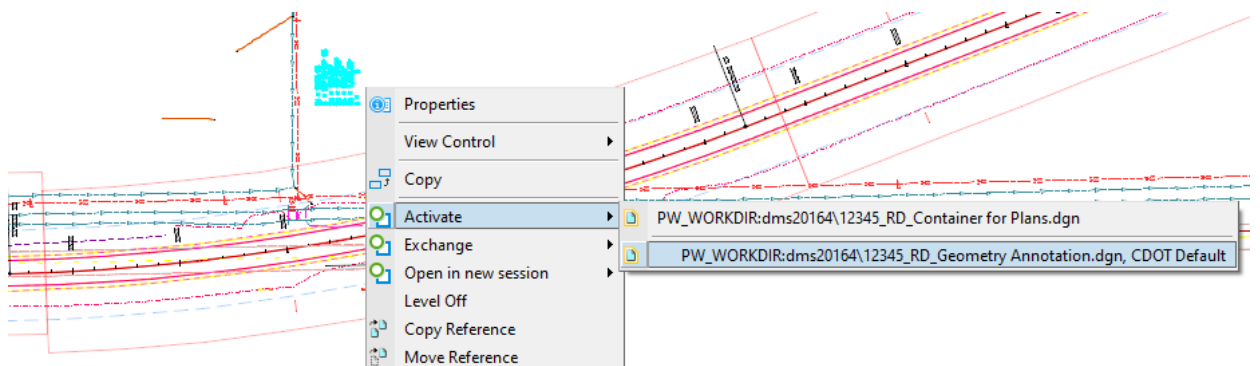
5.5 Modifying Named Boundary Locations & arranging Text

Before you go through the process of creating sheets, you may need to move the named boundaries to encompass important data on the sheet that may not be initially covered. For plan named boundaries, you can use MicroStation's **Move** tool to simply move the plan named boundary. For profile named boundaries, there is an **Adjust Profile Named Boundary** tool available in the Named Boundary pulldown menu that would need to be used.

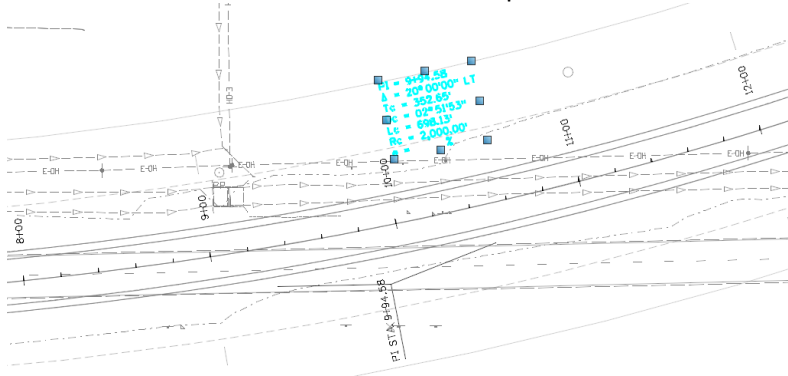
- 1) Select the 1st named boundary and move it to the North just a little.



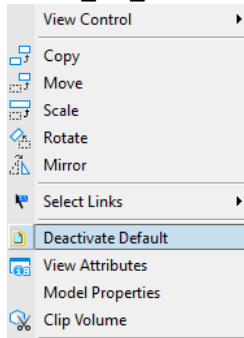
- 2) Move the curve data that is at the bottom of named boundaries 1 & 2 so that it is in the middle of named boundary 1. Since the curve data is in a reference, hold down the Reset button on the curve data, choose **Activate**, select Geometry_Annotation.dgn.



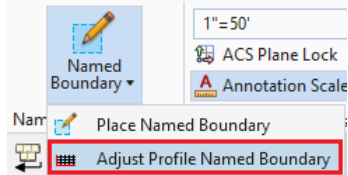
- 3) Move & rotate the curve data so that it is positioned on named boundary 2 as shown below.



- 4) Perform the same process (make sure all other curve data fits on for all other CR44 Curve data.
- 5) Hold down your right mouse button and choose **Deactivate Default** to return to 12345_RD_Plan Profiles_CR44.dgn.

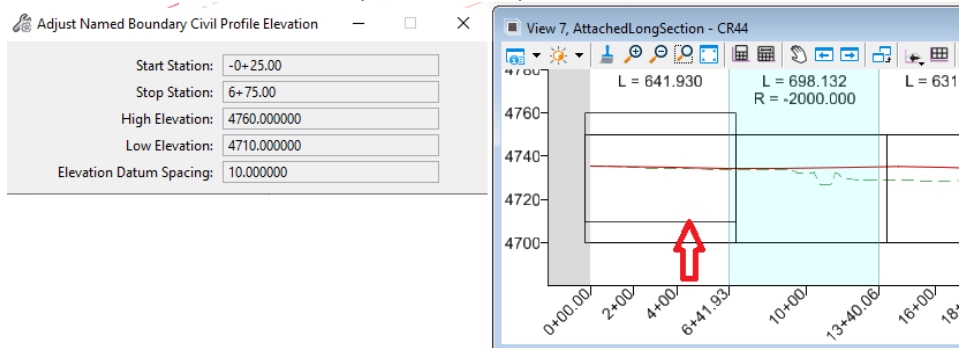


- 6) Next, we will move a named boundary in the profile view by selecting the **Adjust Profile Named Boundary** command from the Named Boundary pulldown.



- 7) You are prompted to *Identify the Profile View*. **Data point in View 7** which should still be open as the profile view for ML_SR4.

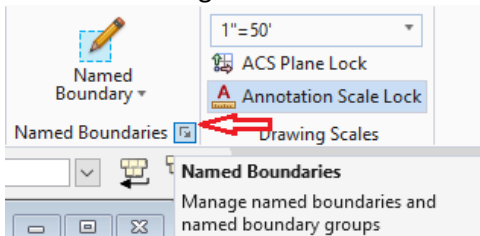
- 8) Select the 1st named boundary (middle shape below) and move it to elevation 445.



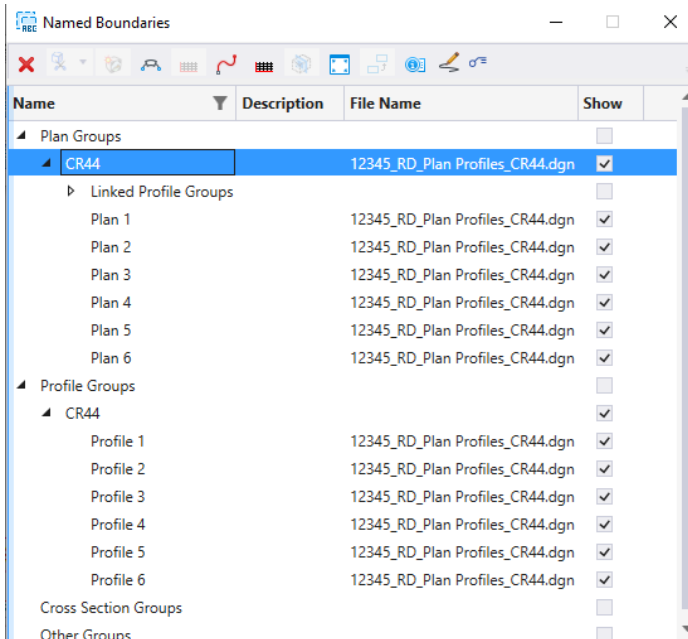
5.6 Creating Sheets (Named Boundary Manager)

In the next few steps we will create sheets from the named boundaries we have placed.
The Profile View must remain open through this process when creating Plan & Profile sheets.

- 1) Turn off any levels you do not want on your sheets, turn off construction class elements, and then Save Settings. This can be performed later as well and controlling sheet levels is discussed more in section 7.6
- 2) Select the Manage Named Boundaries button.



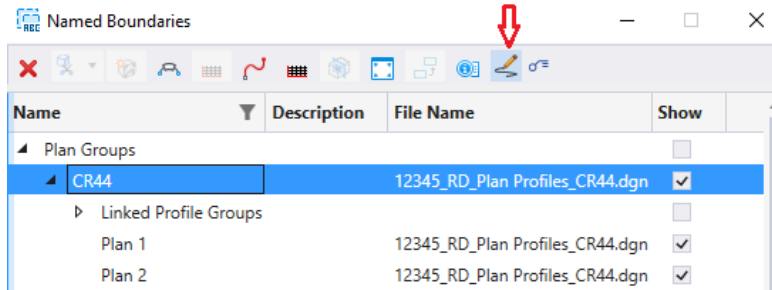
- 3) The Named Boundaries dialog is invoked. Expand the Plan Groups & Profile Groups to review the named boundaries & **select CR44** under the *Plan Group*.



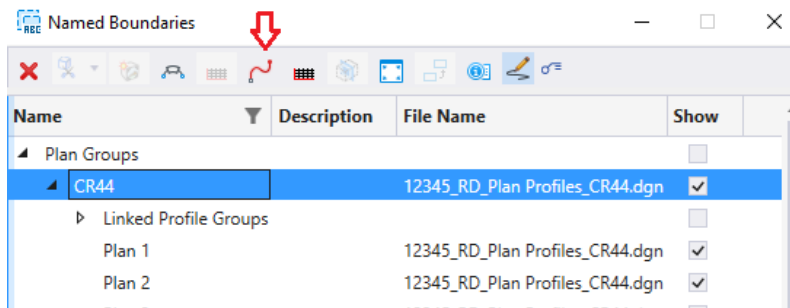
NOTE:

- If there are no arrows next to Plan Groups & Profile Groups, exit the dialog & open it again which should clear up that issue.
- In this dialog, you can delete Named Boundaries, go to Properties and rename named boundaries, create Plan & Profile sheets, etc.

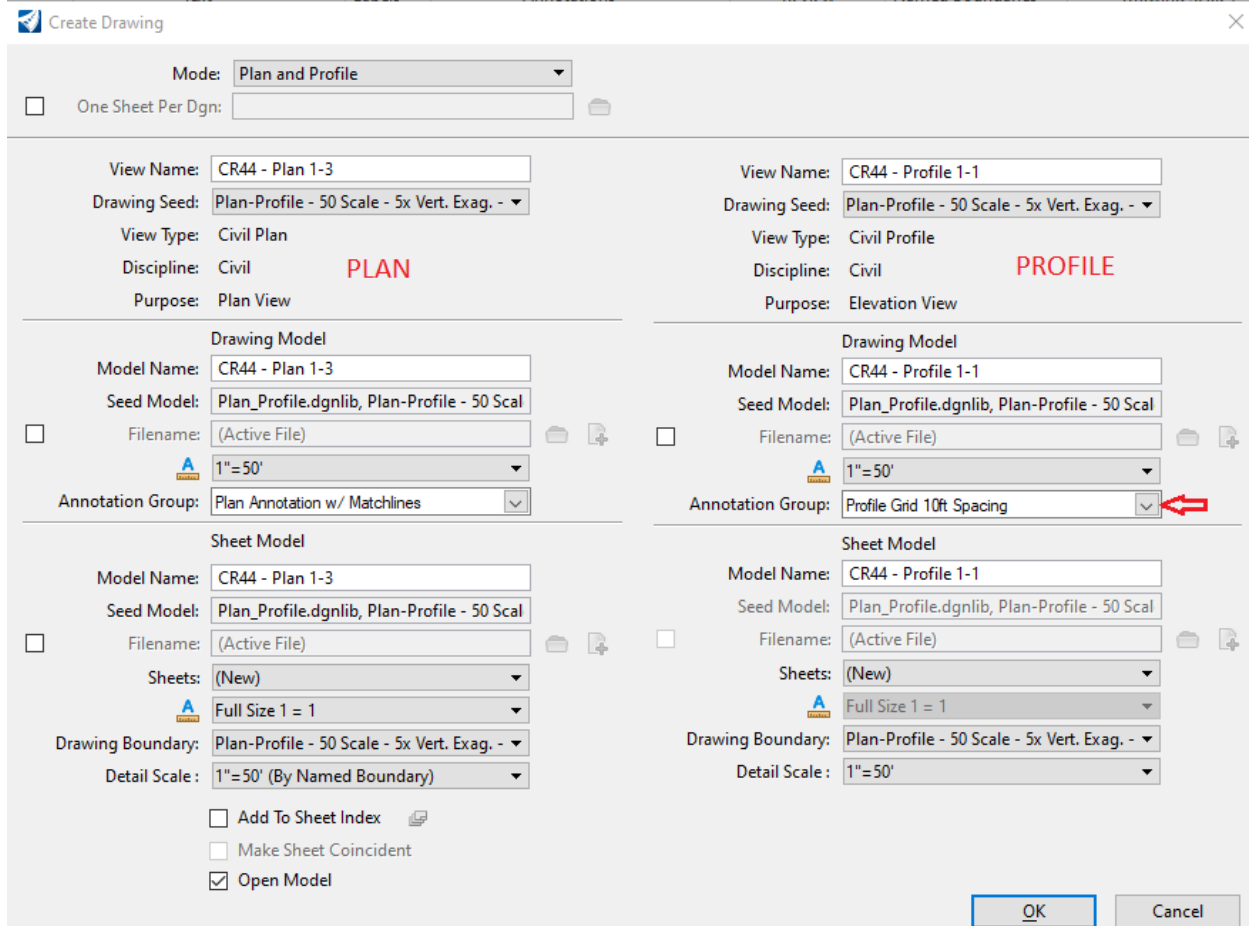
- 4) Select **CR44** under Plan Groups and choose the **Show Create Drawing** button.



- 5) With **CR44** still selected, choose the **Create plan/profile drawing** button.



- 6) This invokes the Create Drawing dialog which is shown below step 7. The Plan view type is on the left and the Profile view type is on the right side of the dialog. You generally do not have to change much on this dialog unless you are working with a different scale (which is discussed later in this section).
- 7) Change the *Profile Annotation Group* from Profile Grid 100ft Spacing to **Profile Grid 10ft Spacing**. Remember our maximum Available Profile Height was 50 on the Named Boundary dialog. Using this annotation group will give us 10ft annotations for the elevation datum.



NOTES:

- You cannot create plan & profile sheets if the profile view is not open.
- The 1st check box on this dialog will create one DGN file per sheet if you check it. If you do check it, the name of the DGN's created comes from the Sheet Model Name.
- It's your preference but we will leave **Add to Sheet Index** box unchecked. Files/Sheets can be added to Sheet Index later if needed. If you decide to check this, choose the icon to the right to specify the folder name.
- The *Profile Annotation Group* is what places the profile grid, annotates the elevation datum, station datum, and any proposed profile that is present when the drawings models are created.

- 8) Tag **OK** to generate sheets. A status bar is displayed in the lower right of the MicroStation window showing progress until the sheets are created. When the processing is complete, you should be moved to the model of the last sheet created.



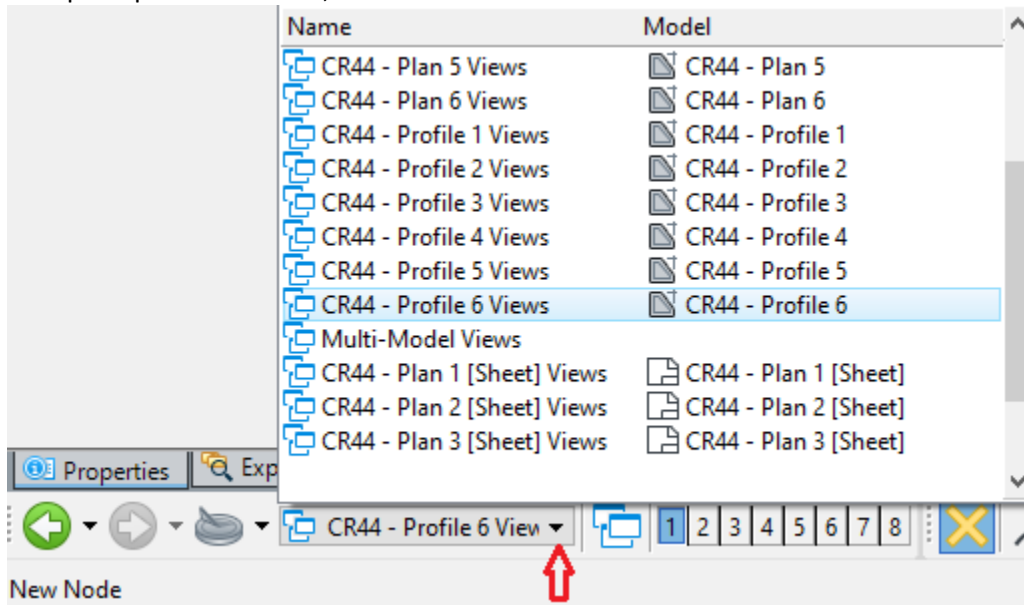

6. SHEET & NAMED BOUNDARY MANAGEMENT

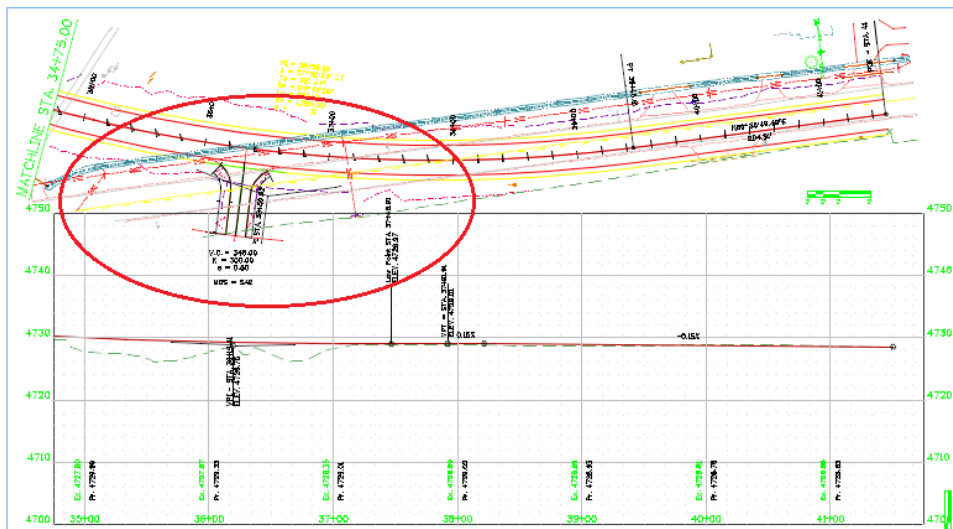
6.1 Section Overview

This section covers Sheet & Named Boundary related tasks outside the normal creation process such as deleting Sheets & Named Boundaries, managing level and reference display, modifying sheet reference clipping & location, etc.

6.2 Deleting Sheets & Named Boundaries

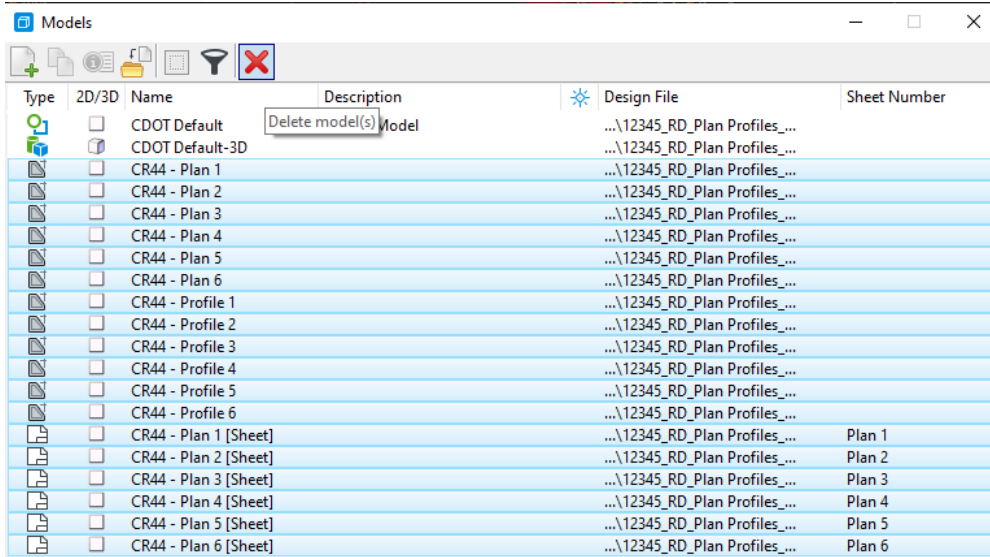
If sheets need to be re-created, delete all drawing and sheet models prior to re-creating. If the named boundaries need to be deleted and placed again, go to the Named Boundary Manager and delete the Named Boundaries. Compress the file, exit, and then re-enter the file before creating named boundaries again. This sequence purges the Named Boundary names so they can be re-used.

For the sheets just in the last exercise, there doesn't appear to be enough room for the plan area on some of the sheets as shown below (on sheet 6). We will delete all the sheet related models and profile named boundaries and recreate the sheets in the following steps.

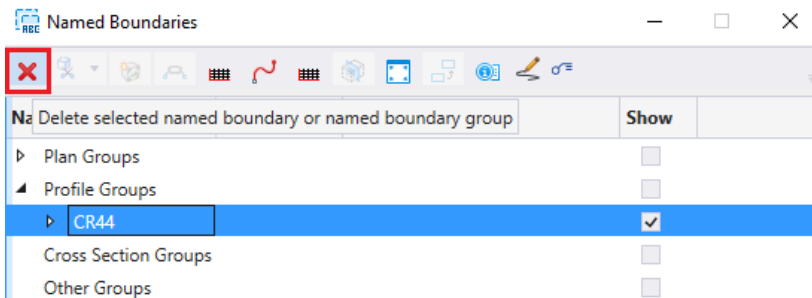


- 1) Return to the Multi-Model views.

- Open the Models dialog, select all sheet related models (All models except CDOT Default & CDOT Default-3D), and then delete the selected models.



- Open the Named Boundaries dialog and delete the Profile Named Boundaries.

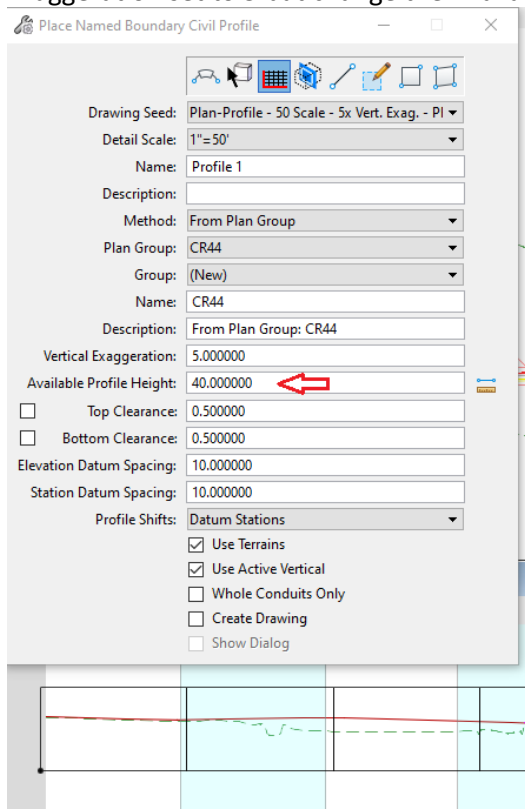


- Choose File-> Tools -> **Compress File**
- Choose **File -> 12345_RD_Plan_Profiles_CR44.dgn** to close & re-open the file.

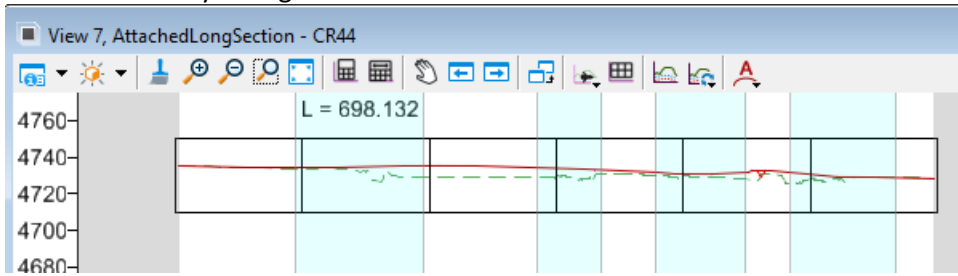
6.3 Modifying Default Drawing Seed Settings

Drawings Seeds set the default values on the Place Named Boundary dialog. These values do not normally have to be changed but they can. In this example, we will replace the Profile Named Boundaries that we just deleted and will change the Default Profile Height to give us a little more space for the Plan View. We will go through more examples of this in the Roll Plots Section.

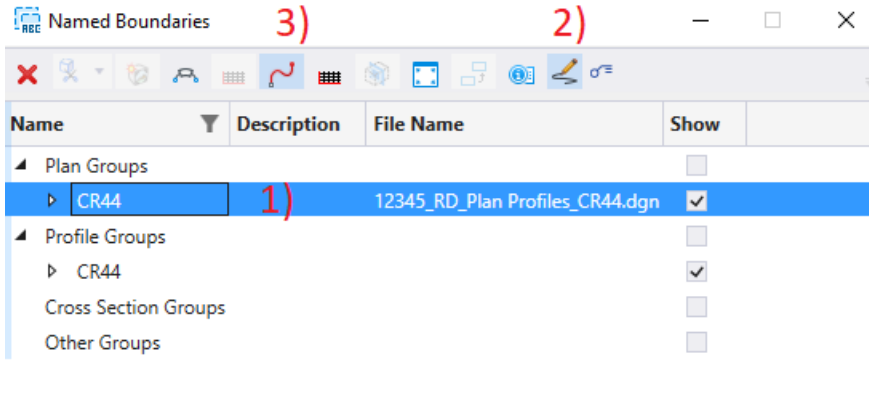
- 1) Let's place Profile Named Boundaries again so select **Named Boundary** from the Drawing Production ribbon tab. The settings you should use are shown below. We previously used a Vertical Exaggeration of 5 which gave us an Available Profile Height of 50. Leave the Vertical Exaggeration set to 5 but change the Available Profile Height to 40.



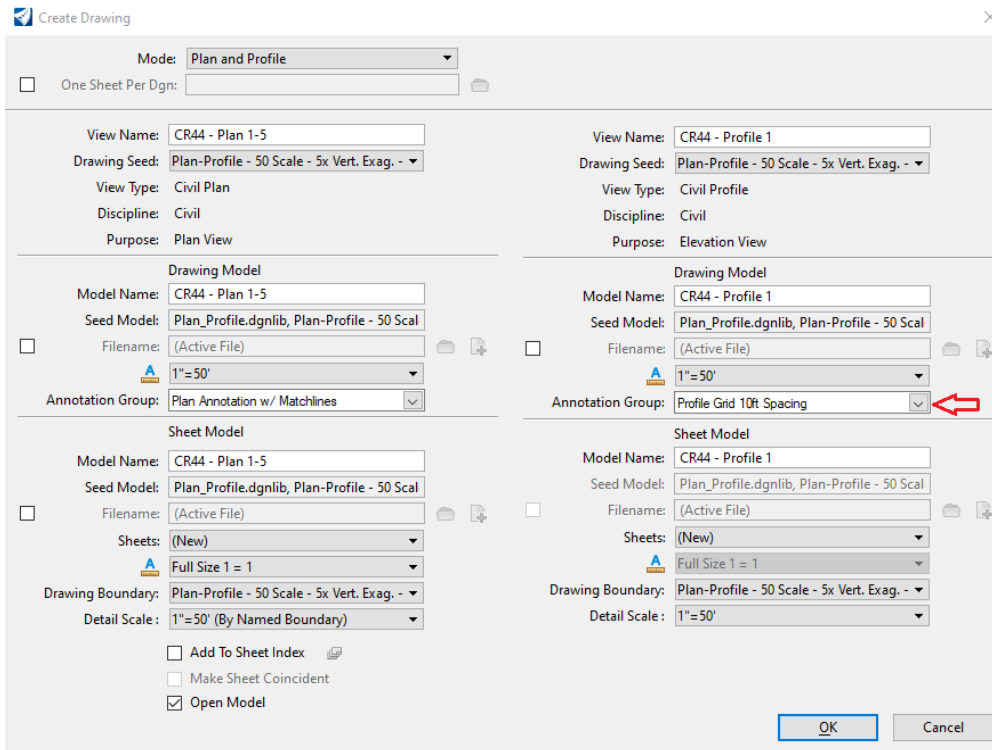
- 2) Move the last two Named Boundaries up if needed to elevation 4710 with the Adjust Profile Named Boundary dialog.



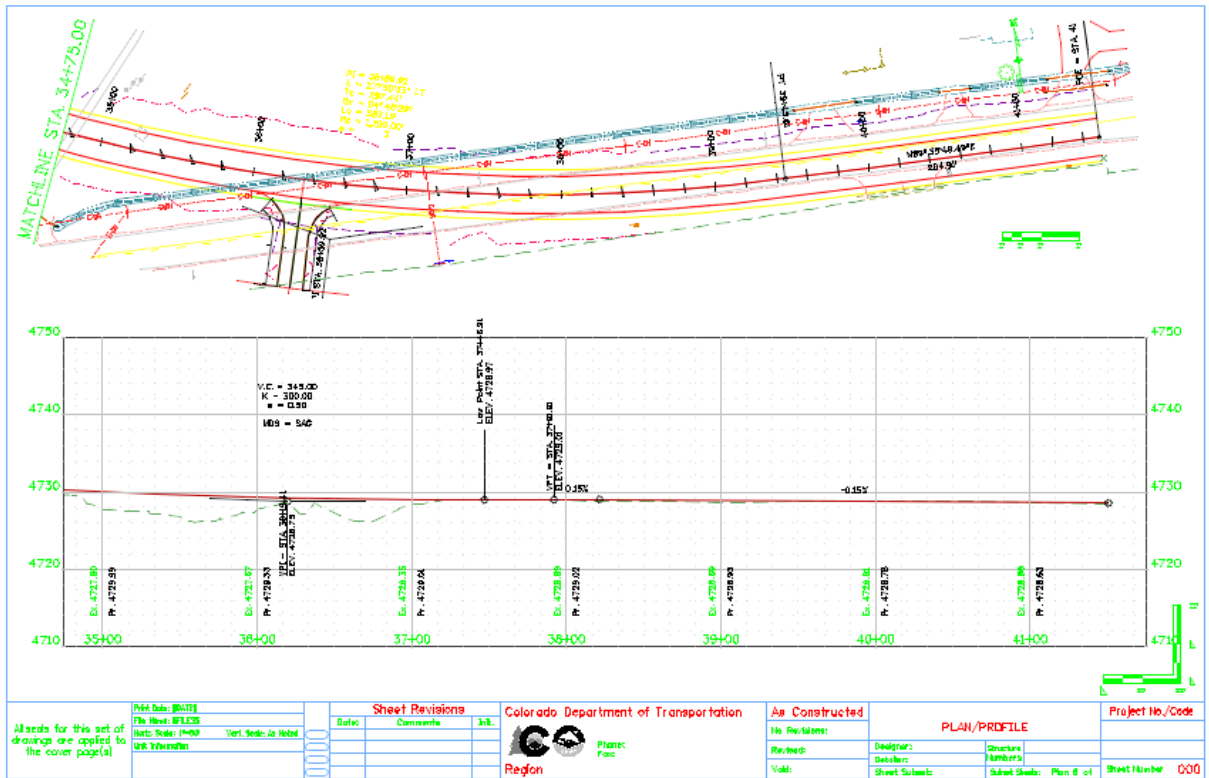
- 3) Open the Named Boundary dialog and go through the sheet creation process.

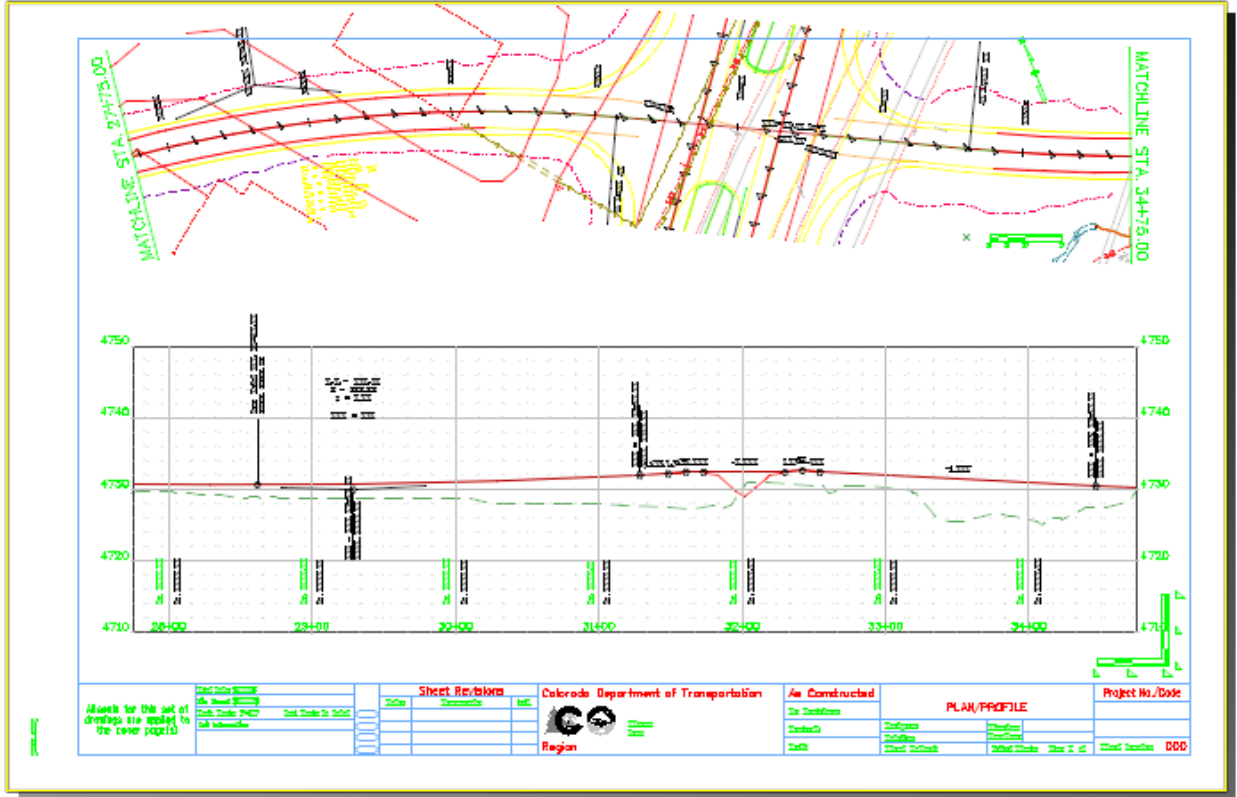

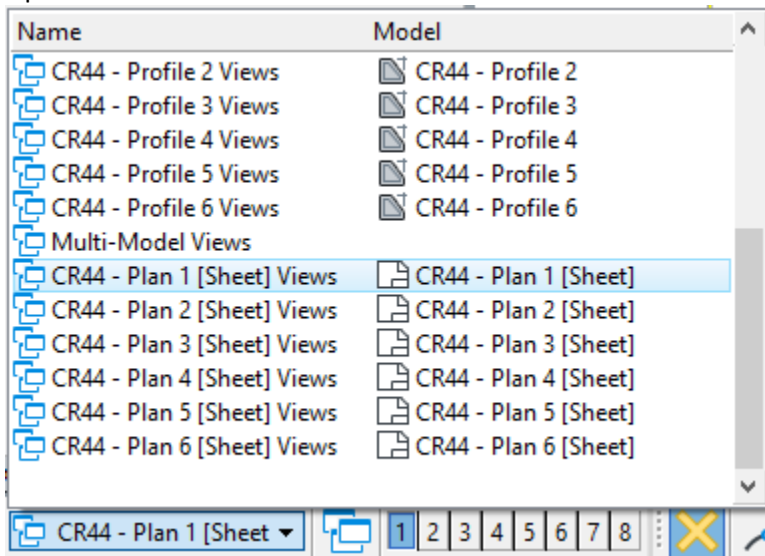
6.6 Controlling Sheet Levels

A new reference setting now allows level control for all sheet models. Turning off unwanted levels in the Default model will display the same on all sheet models. This is controlled by the Synchronize View setting in the reference properties of each Drawing model.

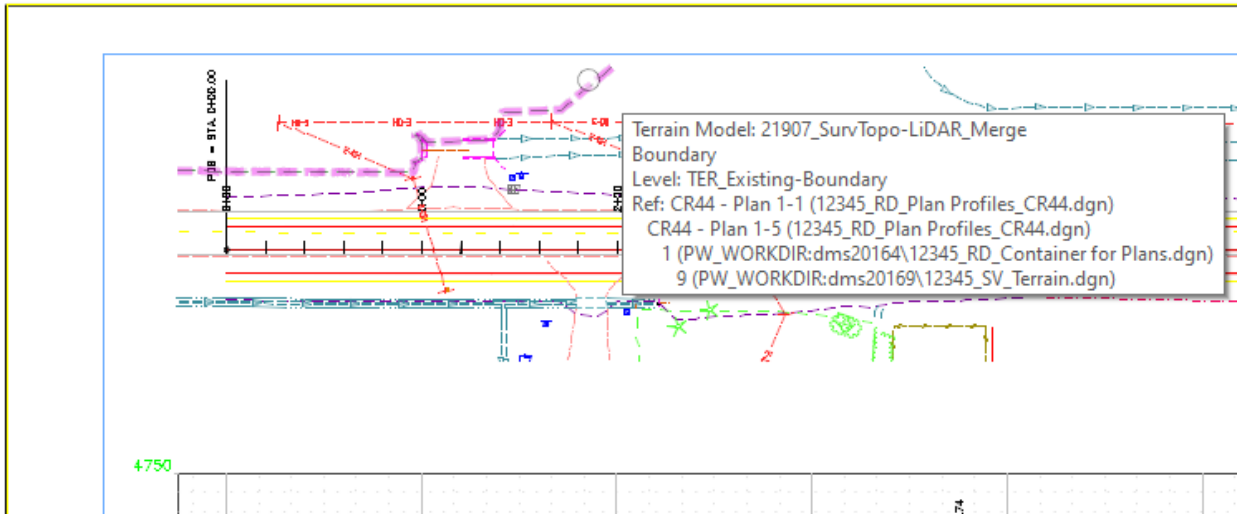

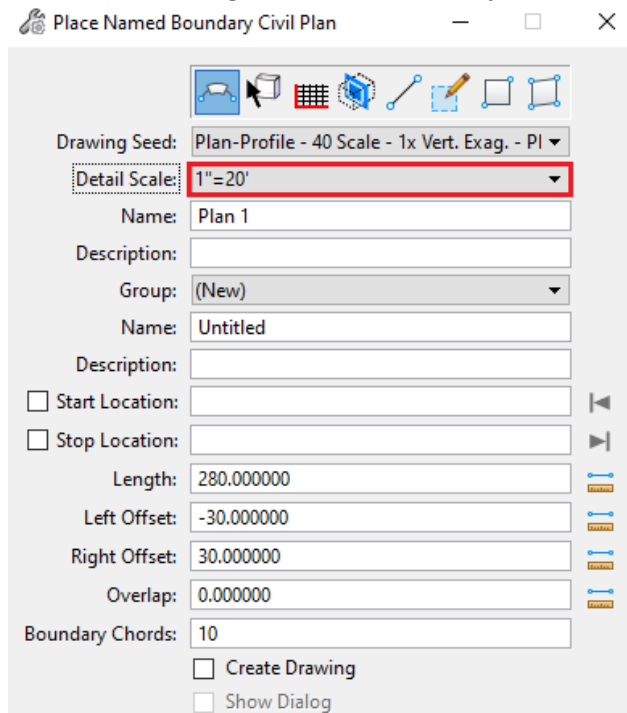
6.7 Other Scale Sheets

Drawing Seeds are set up for many different scales but should you need a Drawing Seed with a scale that isn't available, the steps below describe the scale changes you need to make during the Named Boundary process to create sheets at other scales. At this time, for example, there is not a Plan Profile Sheet Seed for a 1"=20' scale. If you needed a 1"=20' Plan & Profile Scale & a 1"=5' Vertical scale, you would set the scales in the following locations.

- 1) Drawing Scale of on the Drawing Production Ribbon Tab

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7. PLAN SHEETS (along Alignment)

7.1 Section Overview

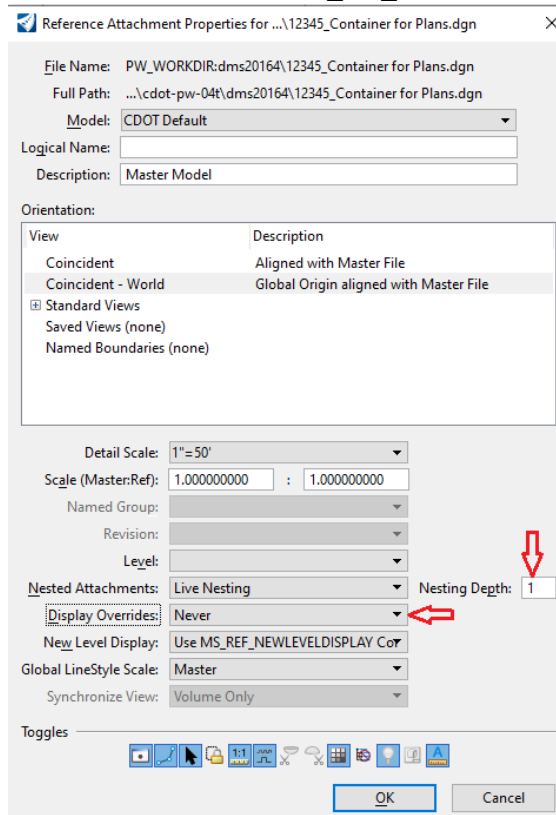
This section will cover creation of Plan sheets along an alignment. We will generate one set of Plan Named Boundaries & sheets for US85 at a scale of 1"=100'. In the next section, we will generate Profile Sheets for US85 SB & NB.

Annotation should normally be performed in the design or drawing models when using the Named Boundary process to create sheets.

7.2 Attaching the Container file (or references)

In the following steps, will create a file to reference the container file. In subsequent sub-sections we will place Named Boundaries and then create 1"=100' Plan along US85. If you had the same scale for all sheets, you could ultimately create one file for the Named Boundaries but that's not the case here so we are specifying CR44 in the name of the file as shown in step 1 below.

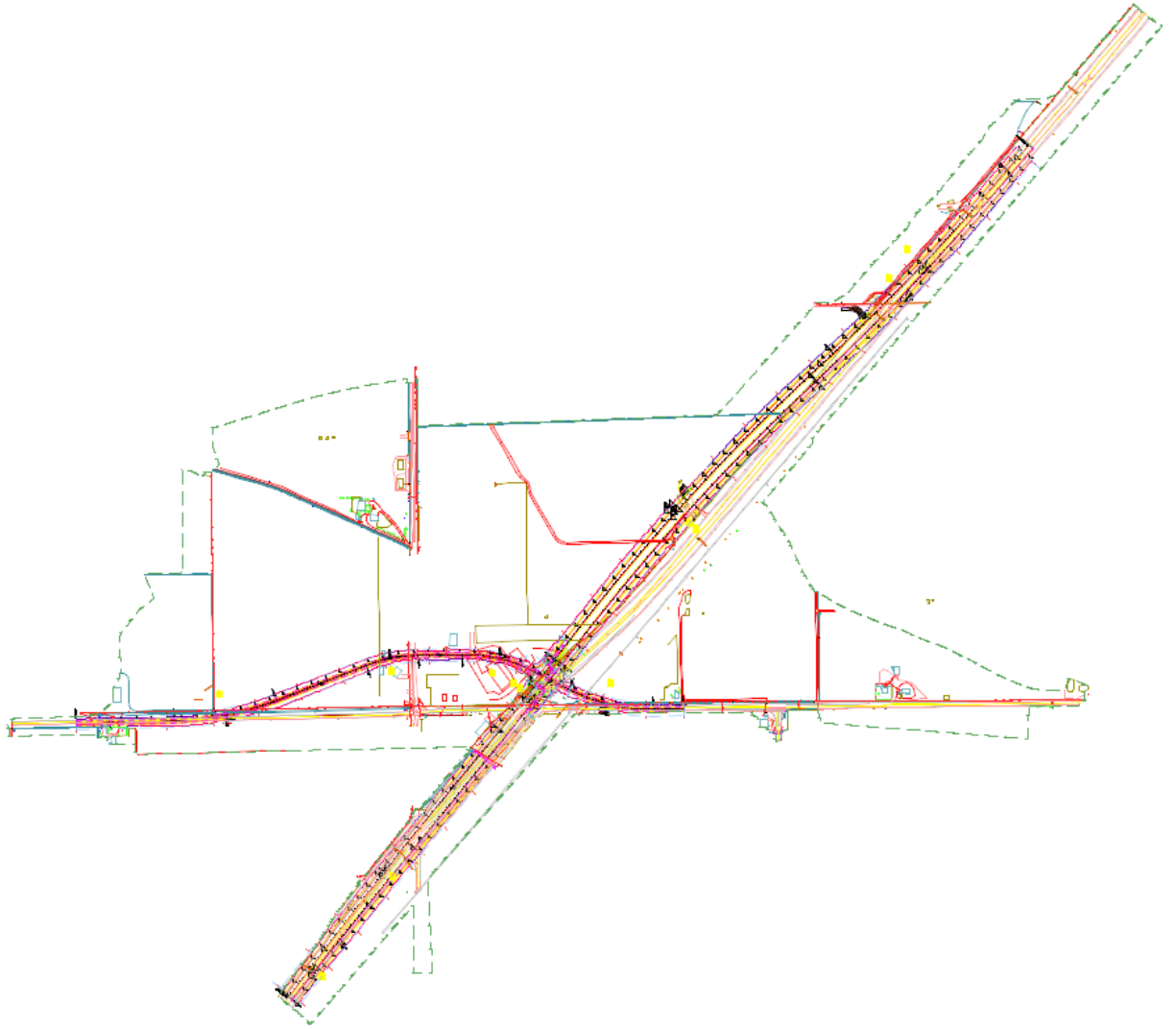
- 1) Create and enter the file **12345_RD_Plan Profiles_US85.dgn** (Using a 2D Seed file).
- 2) Reference the file **12345_RD_Container for Plans.dgn** with the following settings.



NOTES:

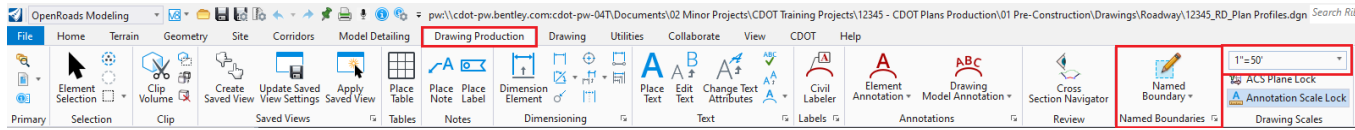
- Nesting depth of 1 will bring all the references in the Container file.
- Display Overrides is set to Never.

3) Fit the view which should appear as shown below.

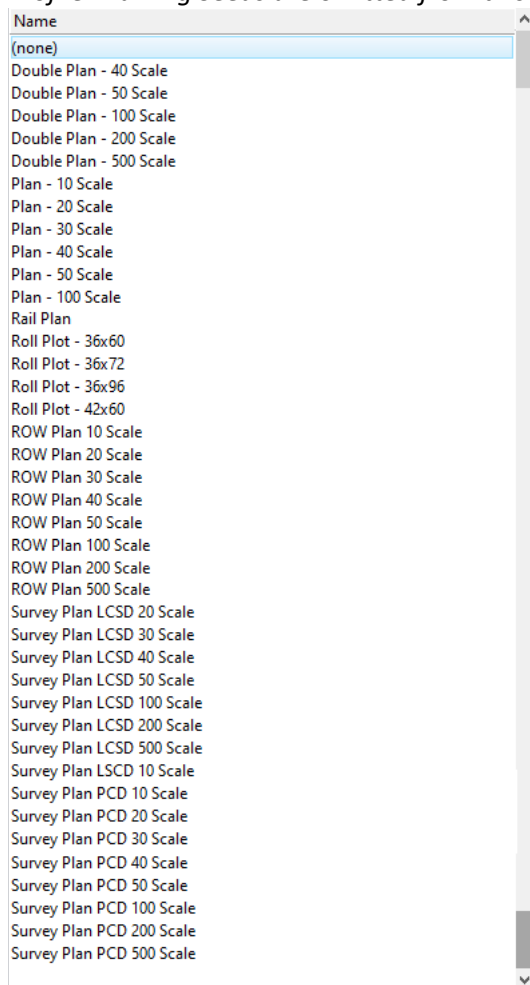


7.3 Placing Plan Named Boundaries

- 1) Select the Drawing Production ribbon tab, confirm or set a scale of 1"=100', then select **Named Boundary** from the Drawing Production ribbon tab.



- 2) On the Place Named Boundary dialog:
 - a) Choose the **Civil Plan** icon at the top of the dialog,
 - b) Choose the **Plan – 100 Scale Drawing Seed**
NOTE: Below is a list of the available Plan Drawing Seeds you can choose from. Plan Profile Drawing Seeds are omitted from this list.

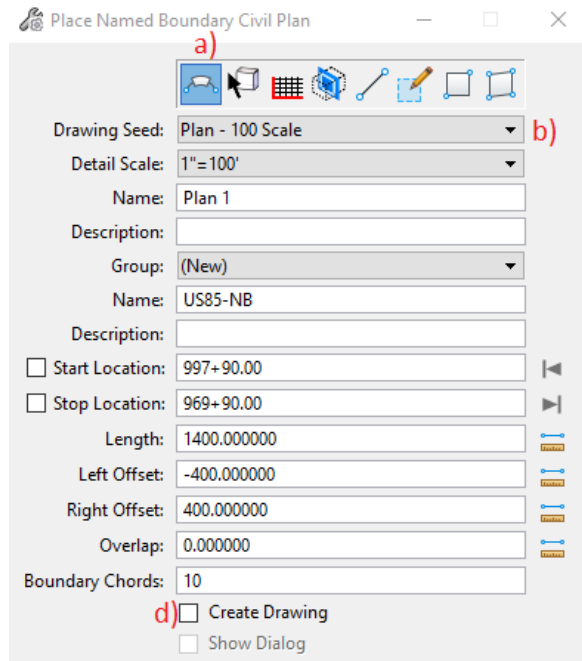


- c) **Select alignment US85-NB** (You are being prompted to *Identify Path Element* in the lower left of the MicroStation view. You may have to Right click to select this element because there is a Template produced CL element on top or below US85-NB.)

d) **Uncheck** the **Create Drawing** checkbox at the bottom of the dialog (if necessary).

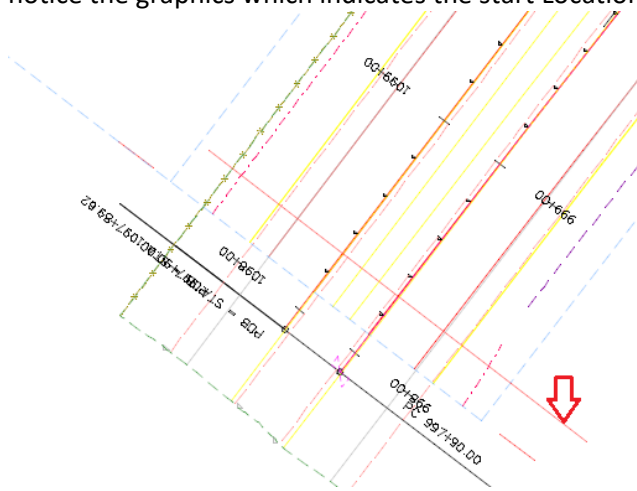
NOTE: *Create Drawing* performs the model/sheet creation which we are not ready to do until we have placed named boundaries for both plan and profile.

The dialog should look as shown below following the 4 steps.




NOTE: Although we will not make changes in this class, observe the two **Name fields** in the dialog above. The 1st (Plan 1) represents the name of the named boundaries. The 2nd (CR44) is the Group the named boundaries will fall under which should be the alignment name. The software will join these two “Names” when creating drawing and sheet models.



- 3) You should be prompted to **Identify Path Start Point to Place Boundary**. Move your cursor and notice the graphics which indicates the start Location.



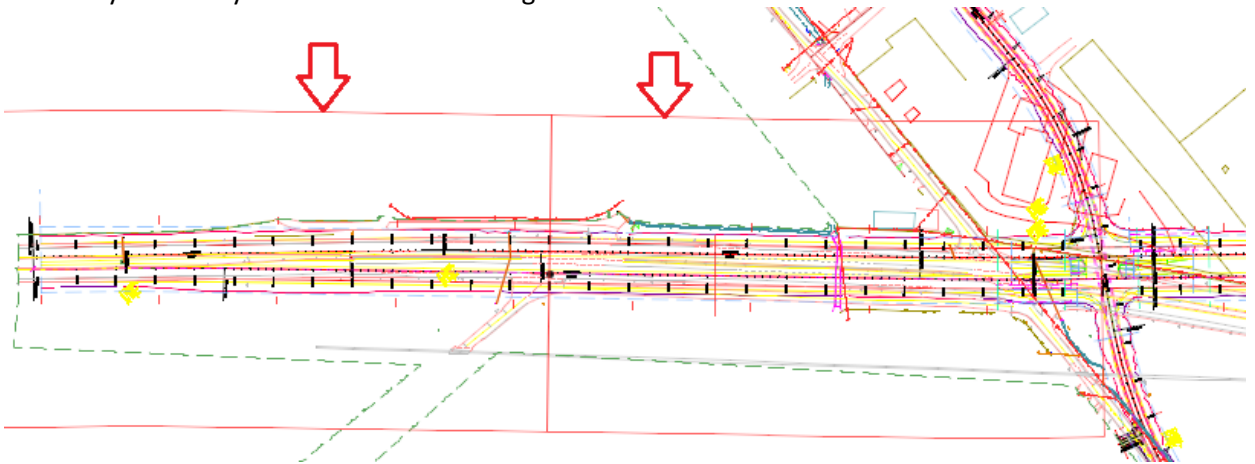
NOTES:

- You can set this Start Location with a data point, key-in, or lock the start station to the beginning of the alignment by clicking the lock to start button .
- You can key-in numbers less than the alignment to place the Named Boundary prior to the start station.

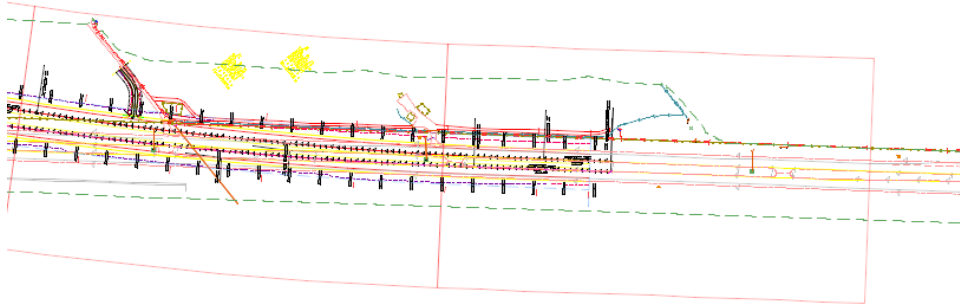
- 4) For this example, key-in 997+00 (which is 90' beyond the Start of the alignment.)

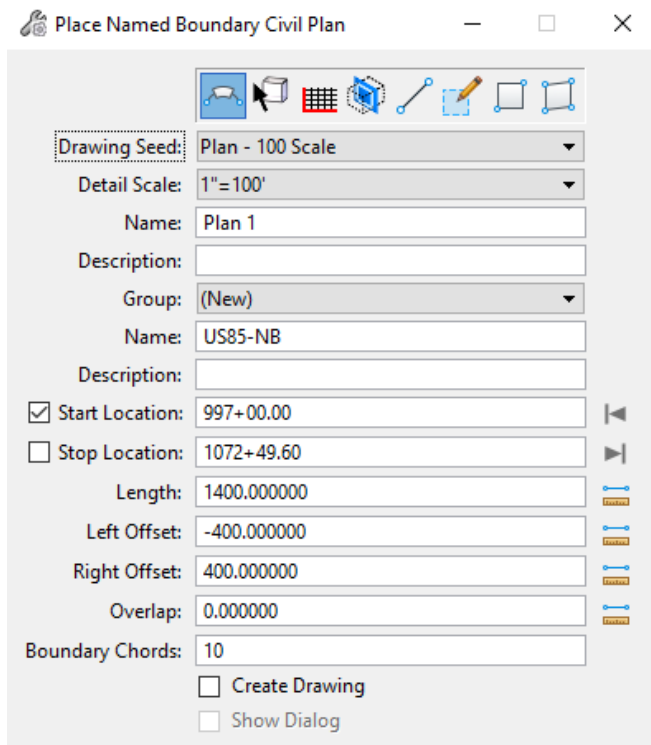
- 5) Data Point to confirm the Start Station which previews the 1st named boundary and ultimately more as you move your cursor down the alignment.



- 6) Now you are prompted to identify the end location to place the boundary. Move your cursor towards the end of the alignment. Data Point so the last sheet is placed as shown below.



- 7) Make changes to Offsets and Boundary chords if needed at this point although we will not make any changes in this example.



NOTE: Boundary Chords set to 0 will place a rectangular shape. If set to 10 or 20, the Named Boundaries will be curved around curves. The Boundary Chords introduced can be moved as needed to adjust the clipping area.

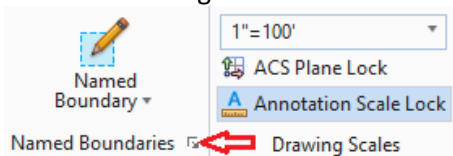
- 8) Data Point one more time to accept the Named Boundary Placement. This will exit you out of the Place Named Boundary dialog.
- 9) At this point, you would review each Named Boundary and referenced elements and ensure everything that needs to be displayed on each Named Boundary is present. This is the stage where you could move Named Boundaries or Activate or Exchange References and move or rotate text so it is displayed on the Named Boundray. Also, you would turn any plan view levels off as needed and Save Settings.

In this example, turn construction class off to turn the corridor handlers off and Save Settings. The Plan Named Boundaries are also on Construction class so they will be turned off as well.

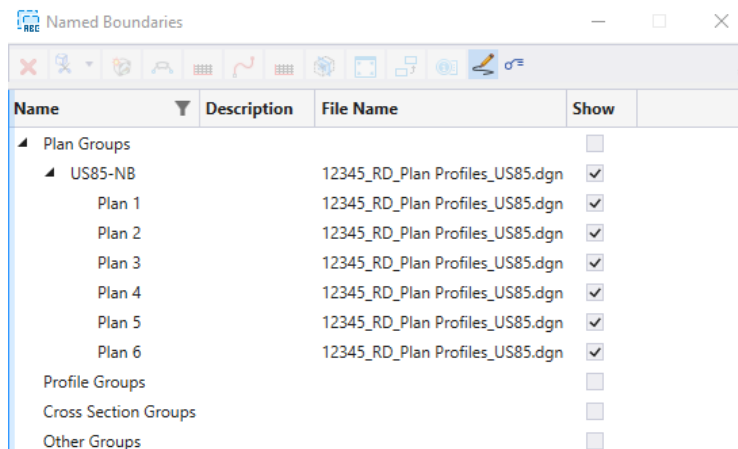
7.4 Creating Sheets (Named Boundary Manager)

In the next few steps we will create sheets from the named boundaries we have placed. Turn off any levels you do not want on your sheets, turn off construction class elements, and then Save Settings. This can be performed later as well and controlling sheet levels is discussed more in section 7.6

- 1) Select the Manage Named Boundaries button.



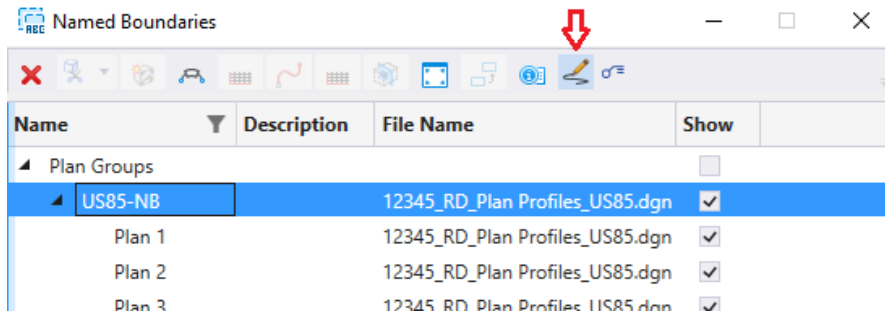
- 2) The Named Boundaries dialog is invoked. Expand the Plan Groups & Profile Groups to review the named boundaries & select **US85-NB** under the *Plan Group*.



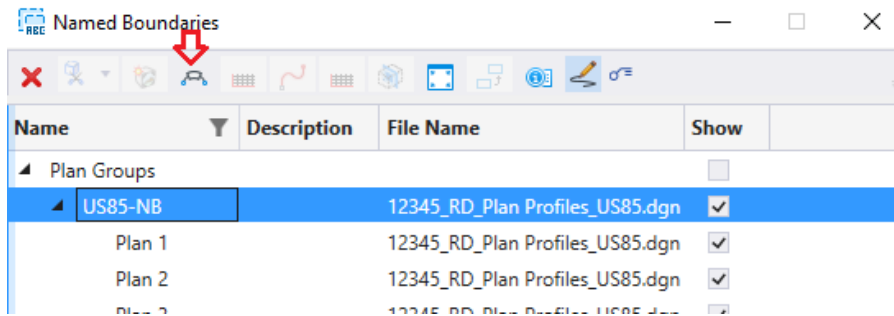

- In this dialog, you can delete Named Boundaries, go to Properties and rename named boundaries, create Plan & Profile sheets, etc.

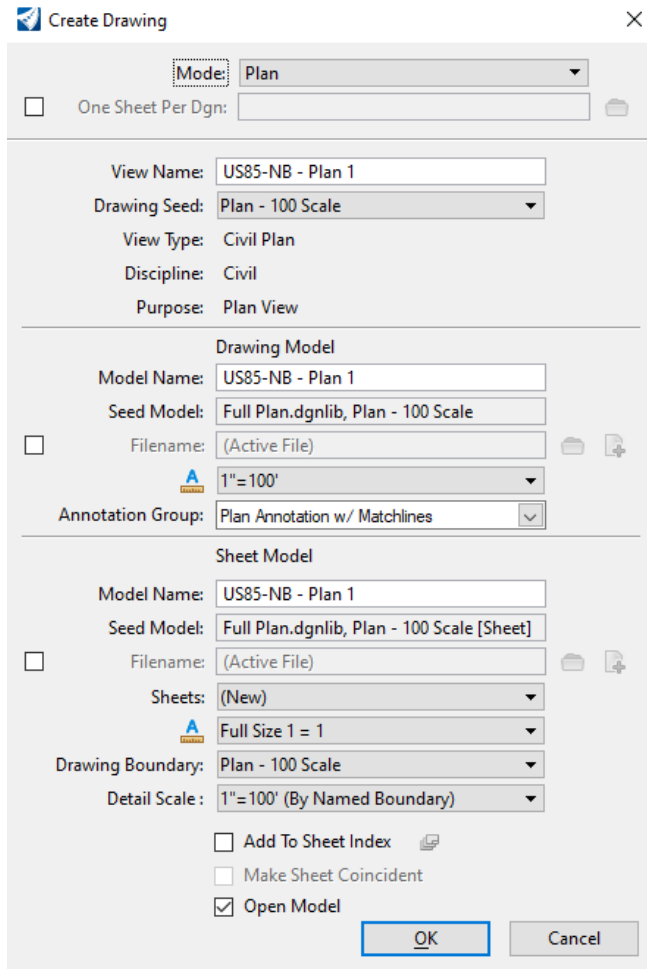

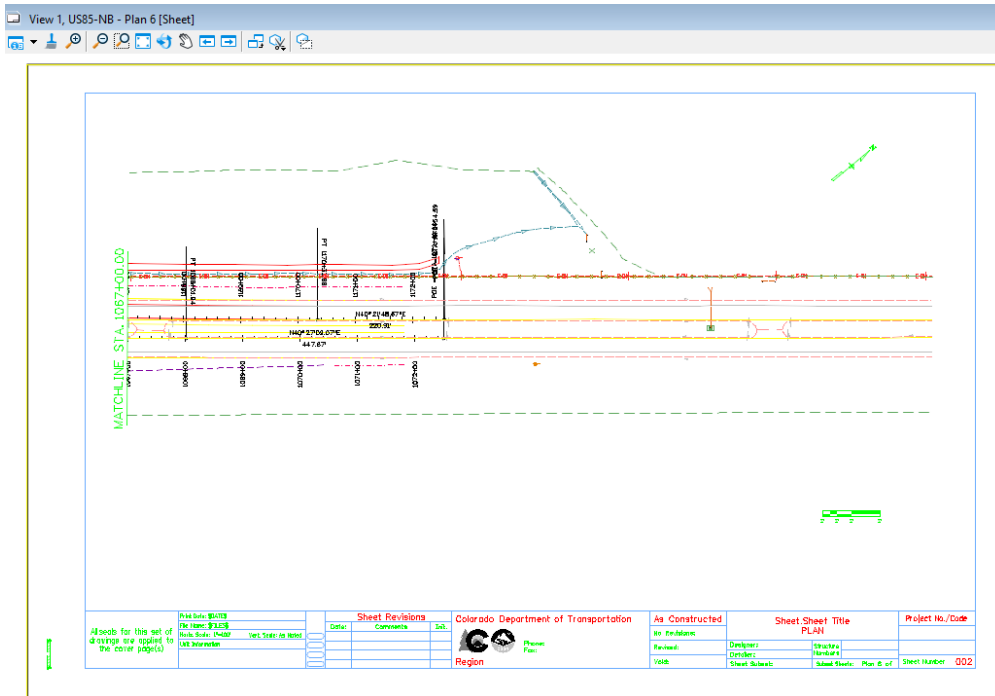

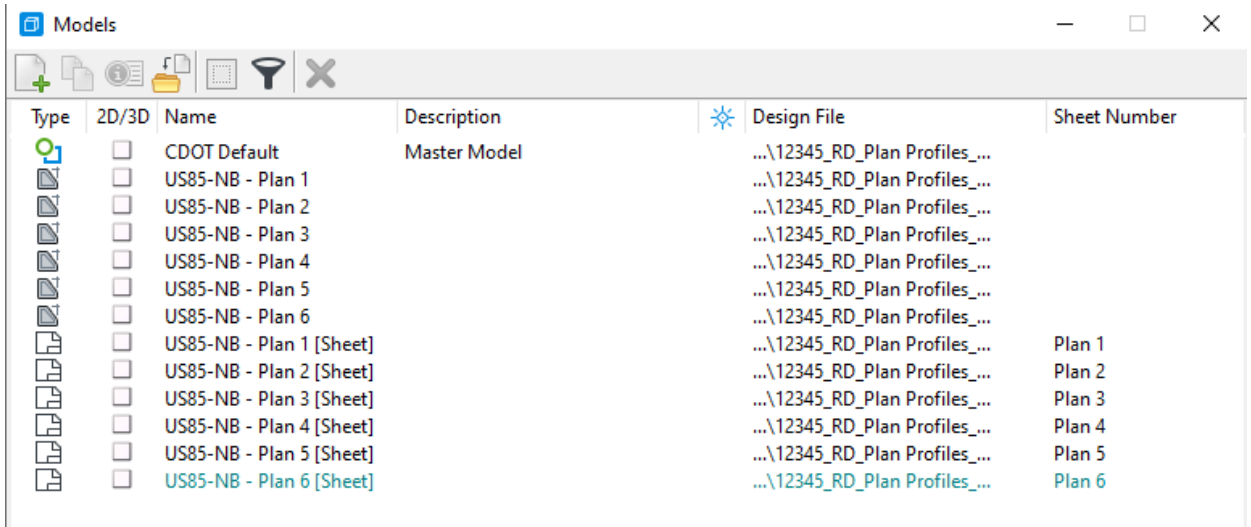

- 6) Tag **OK** to generate sheets. A status bar is displayed in the lower right of the MicroStation window showing progress until the sheets are created. When the processing is complete, you should be moved to the model of the last sheet created.



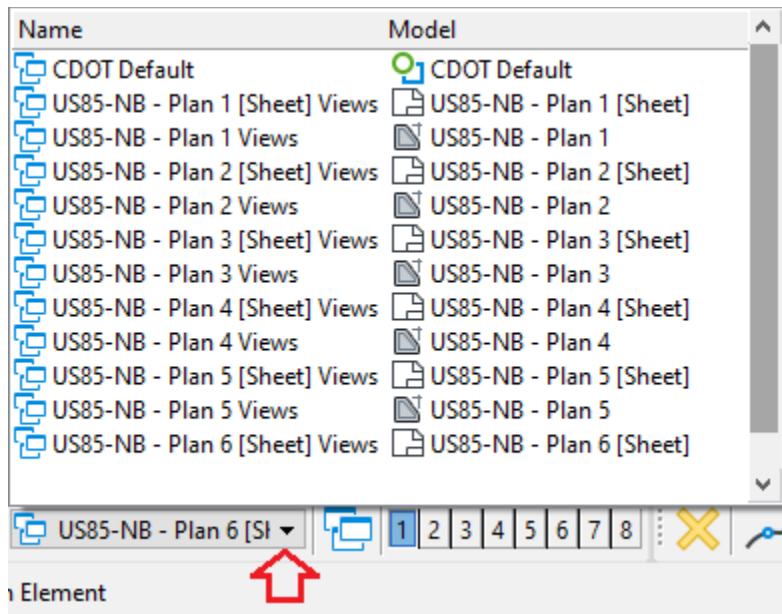

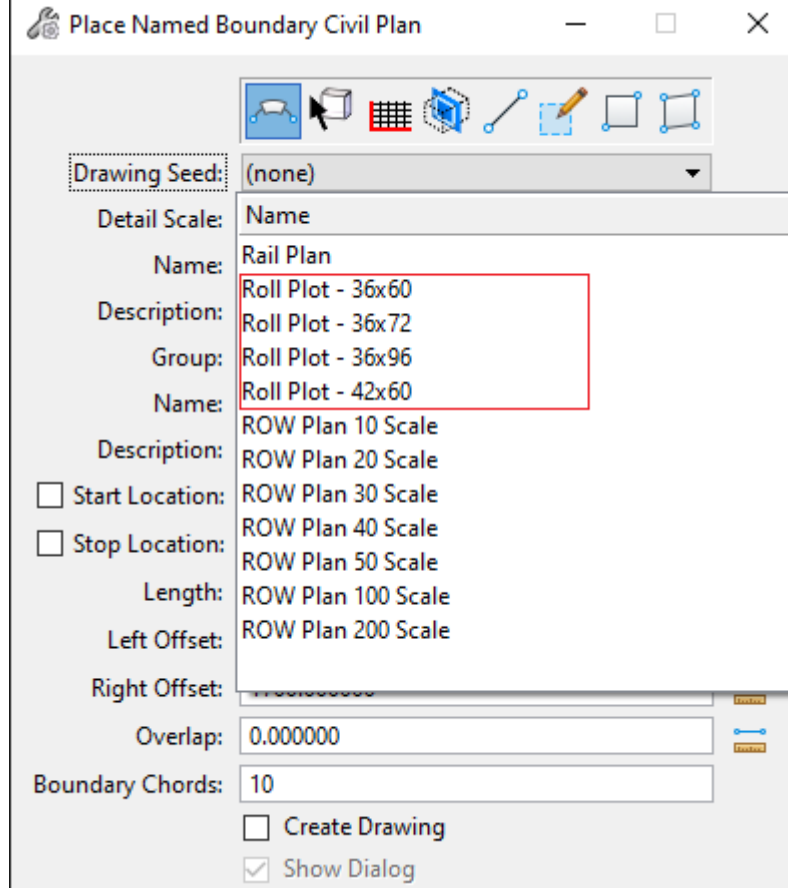

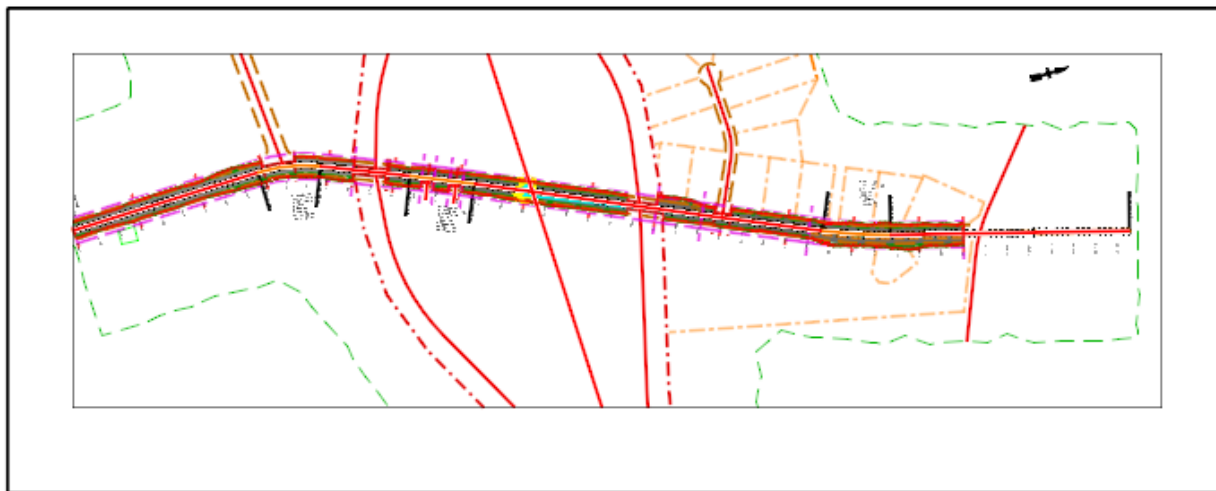

7.5 Roll Plots

Roll plots are sheets longer than the normal sheet and normally show the entire project or at least longer sections of the project. These are generally used for public hearings or presentations. The following Roll Plot Drawing Seeds are available.

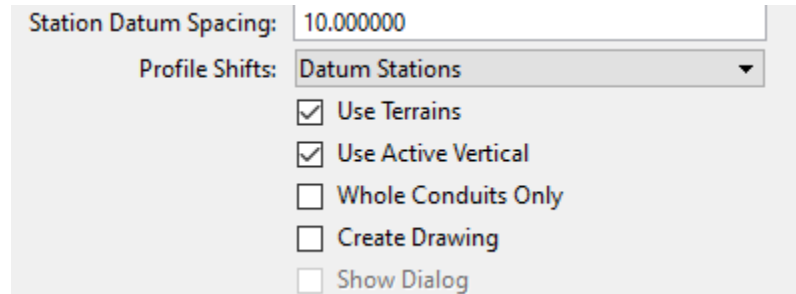
- You do have the option of checking the Create Drawing checkbox which means when you confirm all the prompts, you will move straight into the Create Drawing dialog. We will not in this example but this is a viable option.
- Given 1"=100' Horizontal & Vertical Exaggeration of 10. To calculate the Vertical scale: $100/10 = 10$ so the Vertical Scale will be equal to 1"=10'.
- Make note of the Available Profile Height (40 in this example). This will help you choose which Profile Annotation Group you will use.

- 7) Once prompted to Identify Profile View, data point in View 7 which should be still opened as a profile view. You should then be able to view the named boundaries in the profile view.



NOTE:

- The number of Profile Named boundaries matches the Plan Names boundaries but that may not be the case when there is a lot of vertical change along the profile. If the profile will not fit on a profile named boundary, the software will break that named boundary into 2 or more named boundaries and shift the vertical datum so that it is different for each extra named boundary if Profile Shifts is set to Datum Stations as shown below.

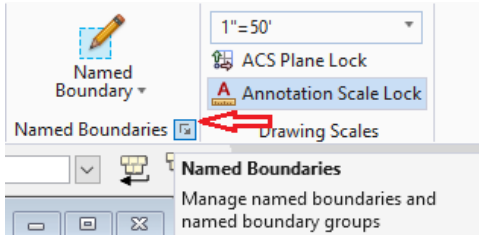

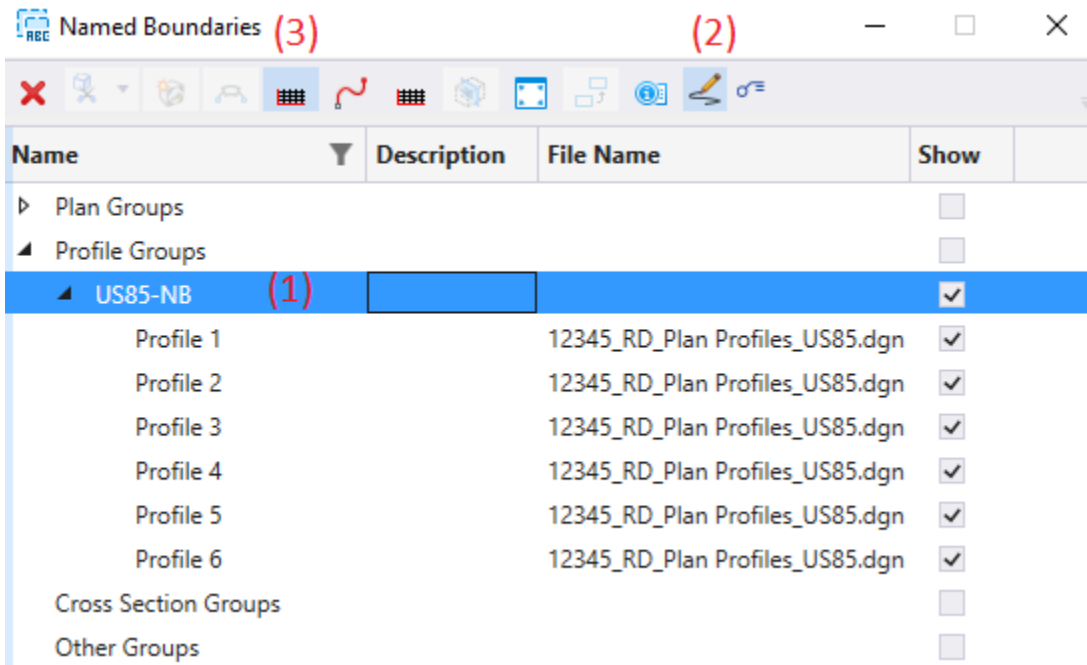

In the next few steps we will create sheets from the named boundaries we have placed. *The Profile View must remain open through this process when creating Profile sheets.*

- 1) Select the Manage Named Boundaries button.



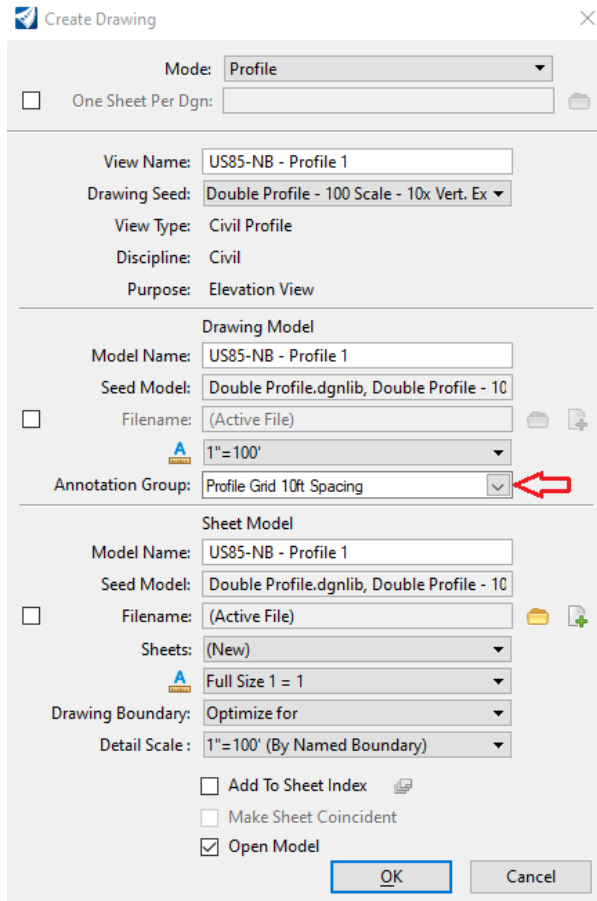
- 2) The Named Boundaries dialog is invoked. Expand the Profile Groups to review the named boundaries and follow steps 1-3 on the image below.



NOTE:

- If there are no arrows next to Plan Groups & Profile Groups, exit the dialog & open it again which should clear up that issue.
- In this dialog, you can delete Named Boundaries, go to Properties and rename named boundaries, create Plan & Profile sheets, etc.

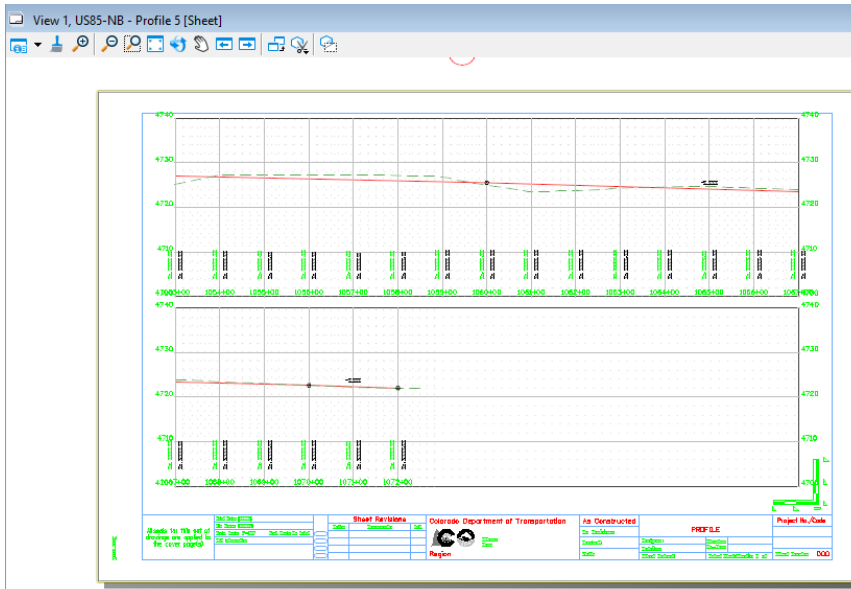
- 3) This invokes the Create Drawing dialog which is shown below step 4. You generally do not have to change much on this dialog unless you are working with a different scale (which is discussed later in this section).
- 4) Change the *Profile Annotation Group* from Profile Grid 100ft Spacing to **Profile Grid 10ft Spacing**. Remember our maximum Available Profile Height was 40 on the Named Boundary dialog. Using this annotation group will give us 10ft annotations for the elevation datum.



NOTES:

- You cannot create profile sheets if the profile view is not open.
- The 1st check box on this dialog will create one DGN file per sheet if you check it. If you do check it, the name of the DGN's created comes from the Sheet Model Name.
- It's your preference but we will leave **Add to Sheet Index** box unchecked. Files/Sheets can be added to Sheet Index later if needed. If you decide to check this, choose the icon to the right to specify the folder name.
- The *Profile Annotation Group* is what places the profile grid, annotates the elevation datum, station datum, and any proposed profile that is present when the drawings models are created.

- 5) Tag **OK** to generate sheets. A status bar is displayed in the lower right of the MicroStation window showing progress until the sheets are created. When the processing is complete, you should be moved to the model of the last sheet created.



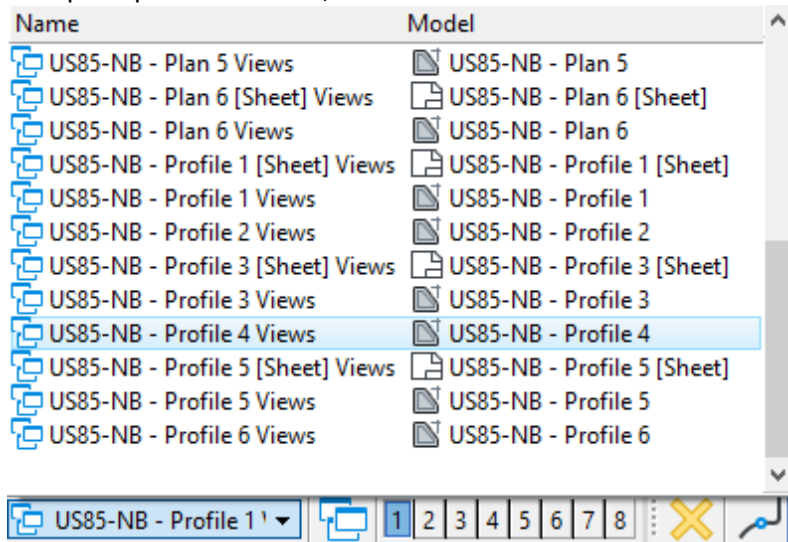

9. CROSS SECTIONS

9.1 Section Overview

To generate cross-section sheets, cross section Named Boundaries are generated at proposed cross section locations, drawing models are then created from the named boundaries for each cross-section, and sheet models are then created based on how many drawing models can fit on a sheet. This process will be discussed in this section along with cross section annotation and earthwork.

A few items to keep in mind in regards to OpenRoads cross sections:

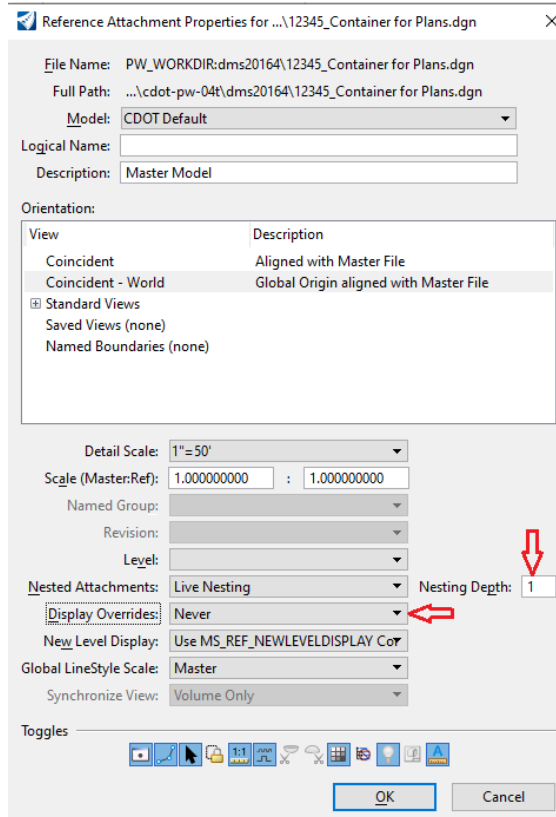
- The cross section is a live slice of the 3D model so any changes to the corridor or terrain means the cross section is automatically updated.
- Cross section annotation is not automatically updated so it has to be redone if the corridor changes.
- The cross section drawing model and sheet models can be created at separate times. This ability allows the user to add new sections as needed, create the drawing model only for these added sections, and then create new sheets for all sections which will allow these added sections to be included in the sheets in the correct order while allowing the existing drawing models which possibly have a lot of specific annotation to not have to be re-created.

Note that cross section annotation should normally be performed in the cross section drawing models.

9.2 Attaching the Container file (or references)

In the following steps, will create a file to reference the container file. In subsequent sub-sections we will place Named Boundaries and then create 1"=10' cross-sections along CR44. You can create one file for cross-sections or one file per alignment.

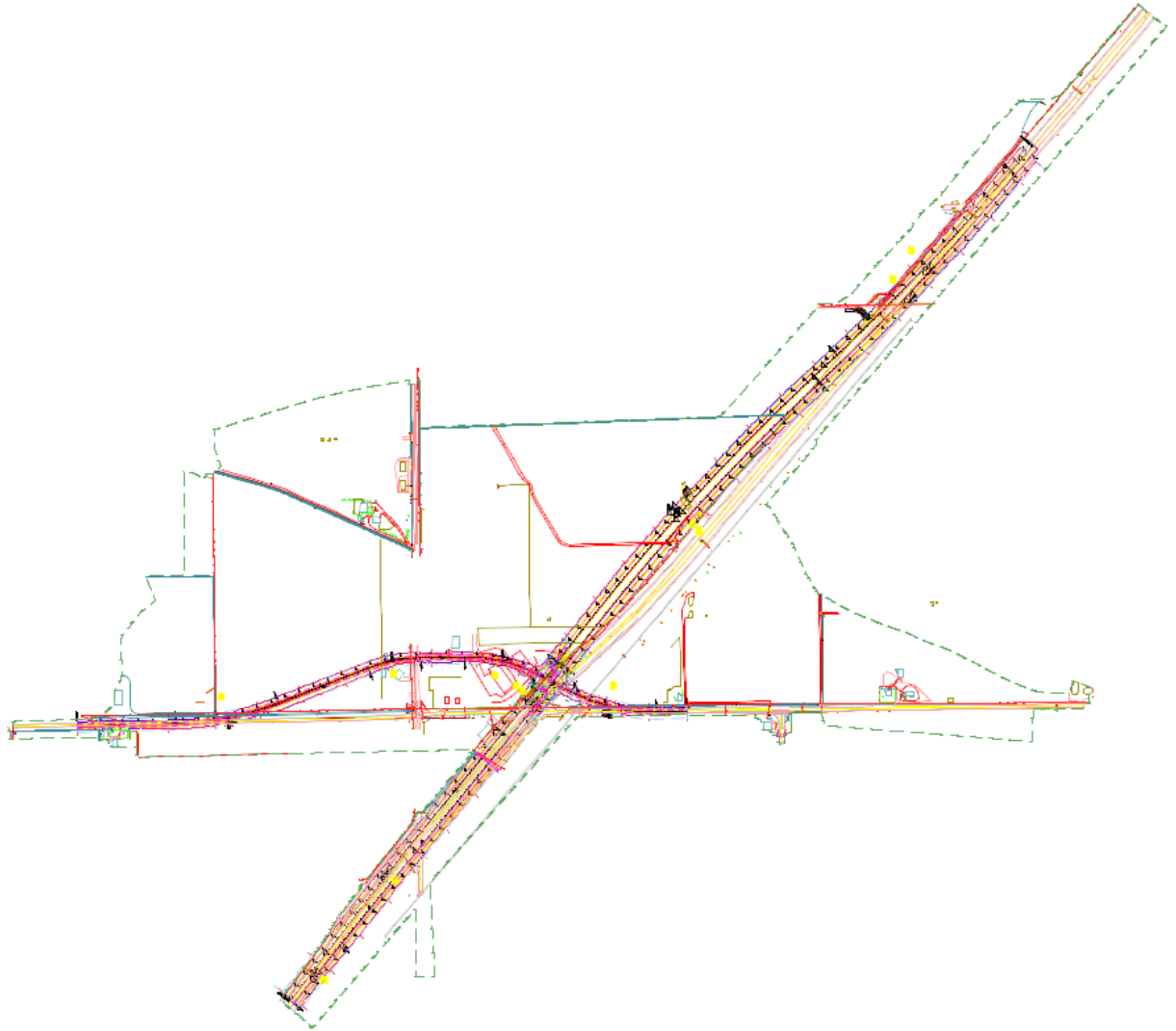
- 1) Create and enter the file **12345_RD_XS_CR44.dgn** (Using a 2D Seed file).

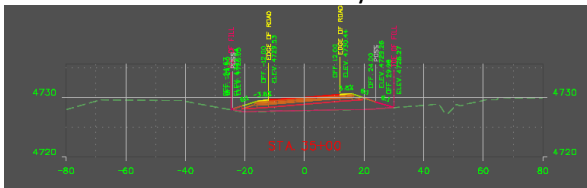
9.3 Creating Cross Section Sheets

9.3.1 Overview

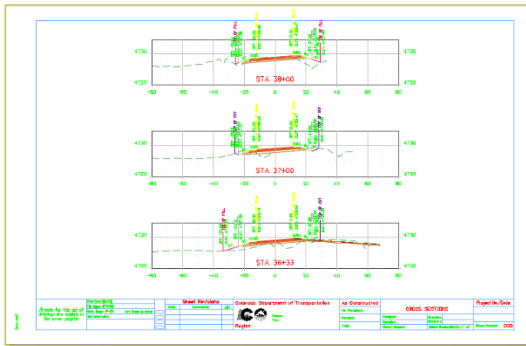
Named Boundaries are created in the 3D view as shown below.



Size of the cross section named boundaries are determined by the corridor and active terrain model plus settings on the Place Named Boundary tool. Drawing models are generated for each cross section named boundary as shown below.



Sheet models are created based on how many of the drawing model “windows” will fit on the sheet based on the “window” size plus cross section configuration variables that dictate the distance off the top/bottom the sheet, distance between sections, etc. An example sheet and these configuration variables are shown below.

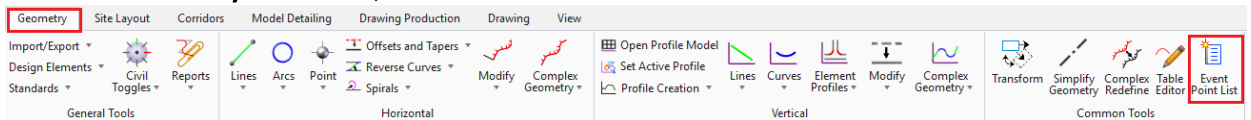

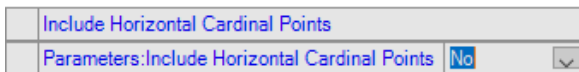
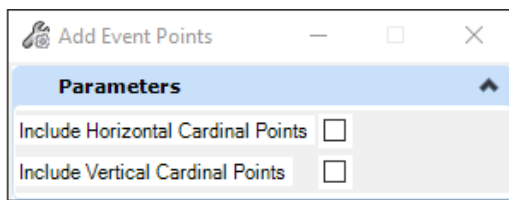
9.3.2 Event Points

The next section describes the Named Boundary process to place cross-section named boundaries along an alignment at a station interval (and control points if so desired). There are a couple of methods available to add cross-section named boundaries at user defined locations (such as drives, cross-drains, etc.) that are not at an interval or control point. The ideal method for additional cross-sections @ 90 degree angle to the baseline is using Event Points.

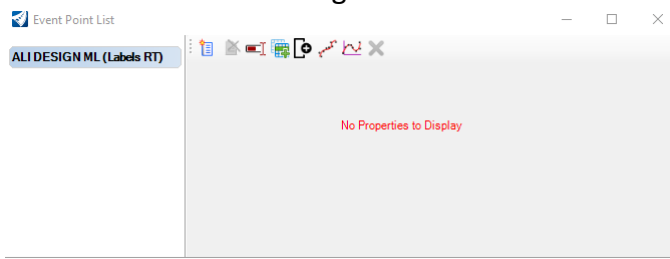

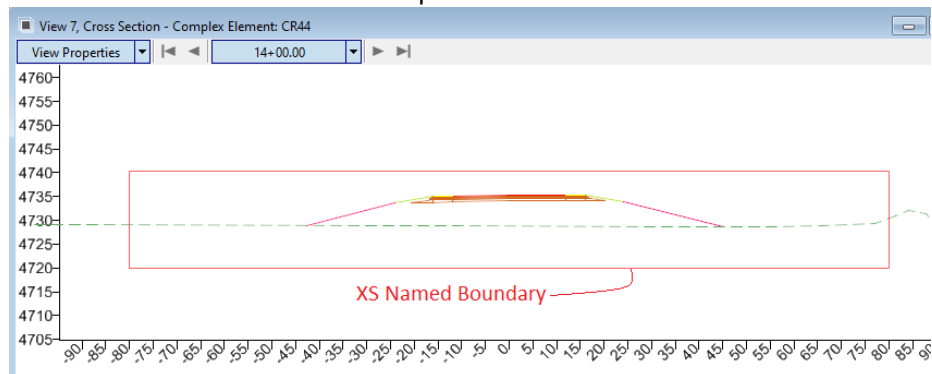
12) Data Point one more time to accept the *Named Boundary Placement*.

13) The named boundary dialog will close and the named boundaries will be placed and should be visible to you in the 3D view. They will also be visible in the 2D view if the Default-3D model display is on. Below is an image of the XS Named Boundaries. Also, notice the Named Boundary with the arrow pointing at it below. This Named Boundary was placed at one of the Event Points designated earlier.

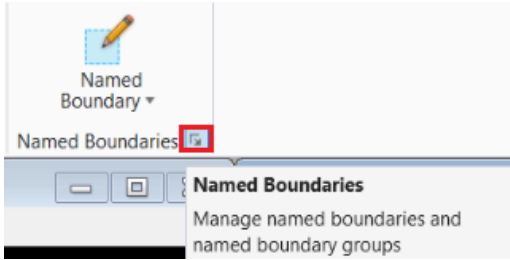
- Any 3D element that cuts through this cross-section named boundary will be displayed on cross-sections once they have been generated.
- It's a best practice to Use the Corridors -> Review -> Dynamic Sections dialog to quickly review cross-sections to ensure that everything that needs to be shown on the cross-sections (Drainage, full template, terrain, etc.), will show up in the XS Named Boundary window which you can see in the cross-section view as long as the Start Station and interval matches what was used when placing the Named Boundaries. See the example below.



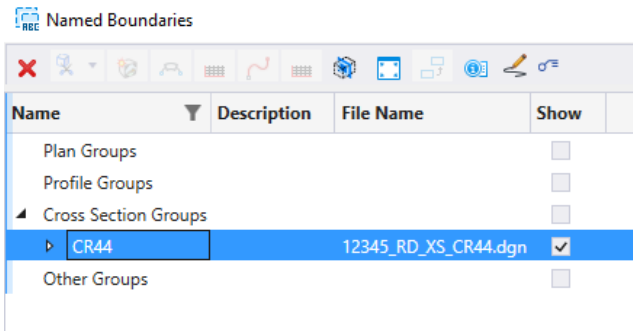
If there are elements that do not fit on the XS, you may want to delete the Named Boundaries & place them again making as-needed adjustments (scale, offsets, Top & Bottom clearance, etc.

- You also have the option to right click the Cross Section group and choose **Create Cross Section Sheets from Drawings** which will not create the Drawing models. This is ideal for using in a workflow where additional x-sections have been added (as described in the Notes of the next step) and all sheets are being re-created from the Drawing models.

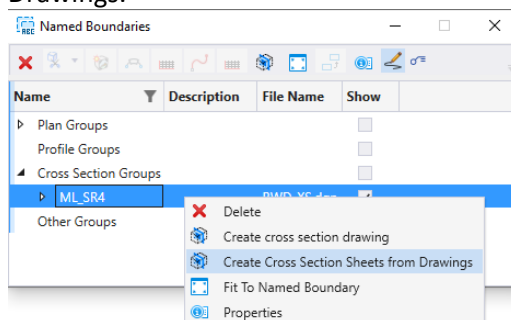

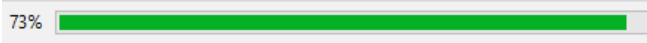

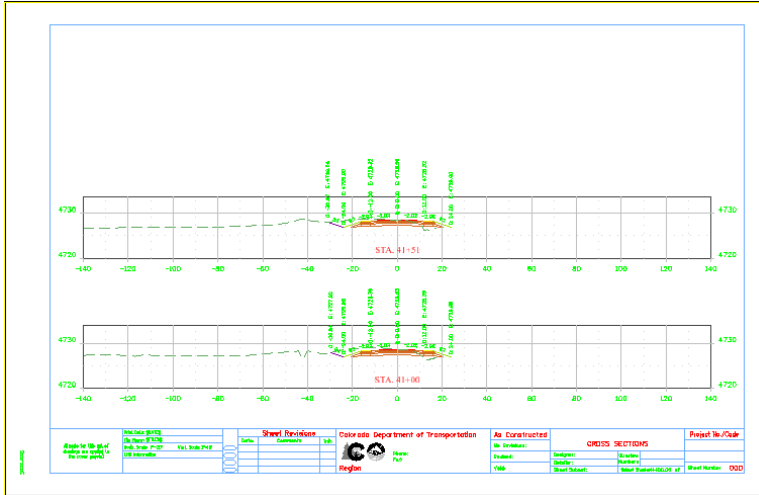
- You can make changes here but none may be necessary.
- Annotation Group – The initial annotation group used draws the XS Grid, annotates slopes, and uses the inline offset annotation with no flags. Go to the ANNOTATION\XS Annotation section to see more discussion on the different annotation groups available.
- **Pay close attention to the Check Box under Sheet Model on the *Create Drawing* dialog.** If not checked, the Drawing models will be created but the Sheet models would not be created. If you needed to add additional x-sections to already created x-section drawing & sheet models, you can uncheck this and not create the Sheets. You could then delete all the Sheet models and re-cut all sheets with the new x-section added in order by using the right click -> Create Cross Section Sheets from Drawings.



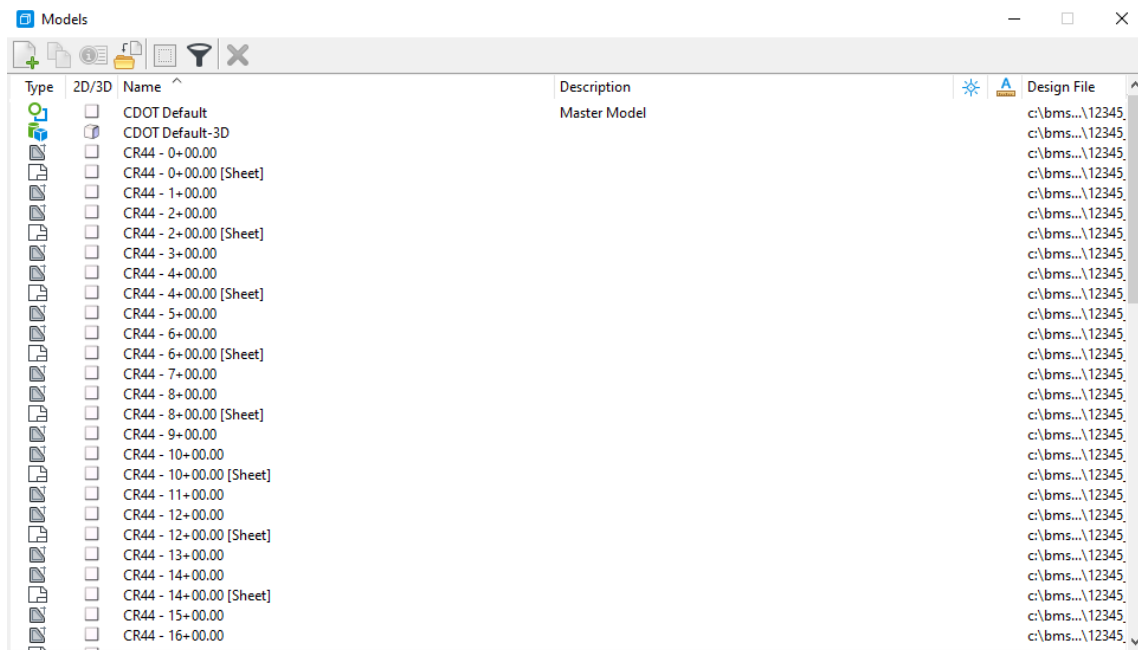
- 6) Click **OK** to create the cross-section sheets.
- 7) Observe the status bar in the lower right corner that shows the progress.



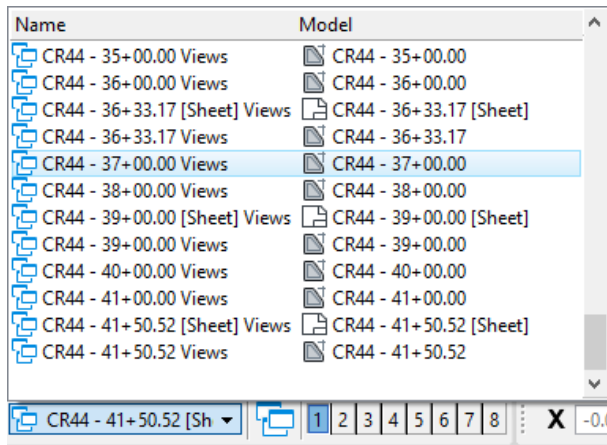

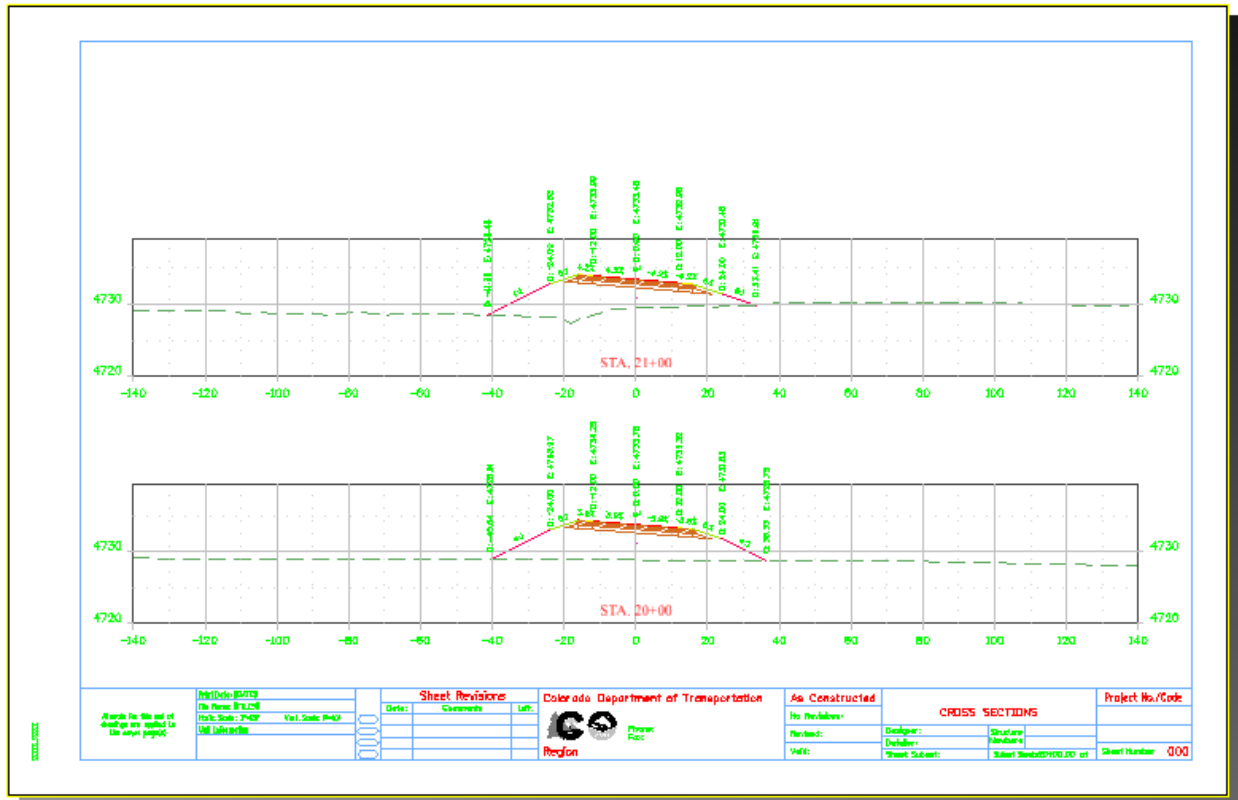
- 9) Open the **Models** dialog and review the cross section drawing and sheet models created. A Drawing model is created for each station and sheet models are created based on how many cross-sections can fit on a sheet.



10) Close the model dialog and open the **Active View Group** which should be docked at the bottom of the MicroStation window.



11) Open the 20+00 (Sheet) & 20+00 Drawing model.



NOTE: At this point, sheets should be reviewed to ensure things like LT/RT Offset and Top/Bottom Clearance are adequate to show everything needed on the cross-sections. If this is not the case, you would generally delete sheets at this point, replace the named boundaries in question with modified depth, width, and/or height, & then re-cut sheets when needed. We will go through a few of these steps in the sections below.

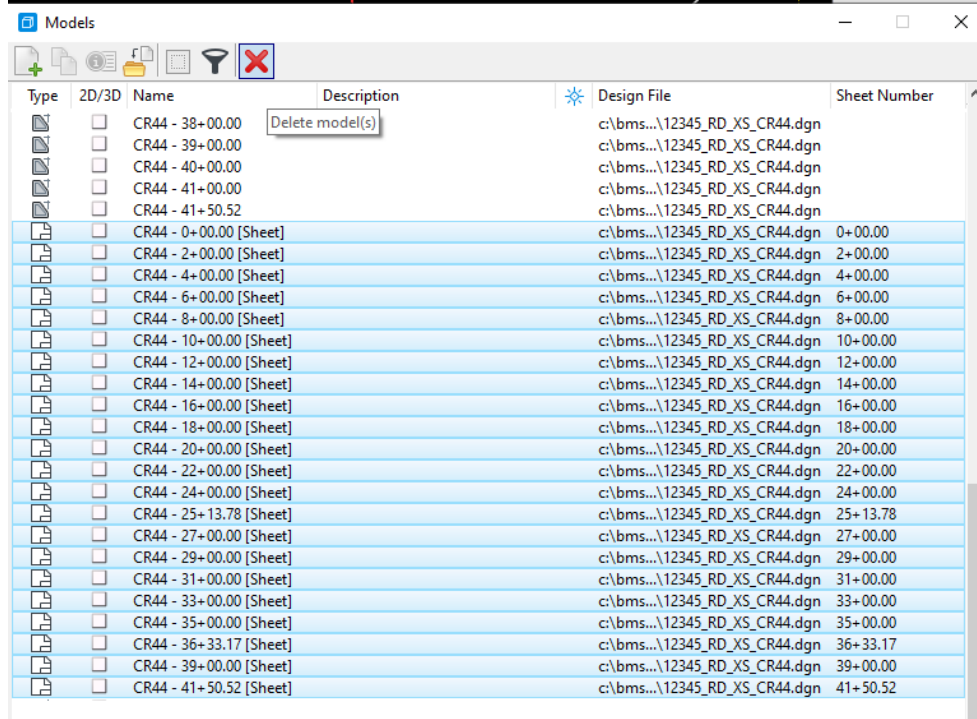
9.3.5 Deleting Sheets & Named Boundaries

We will go through the process of deleting all the sheets and some of the named boundaries in the next few steps. Do note that the NOTES in steps 4 & 5 of the preceding section discuss adding additional x-section drawing models, deleting sheets, and re-creating sheets.

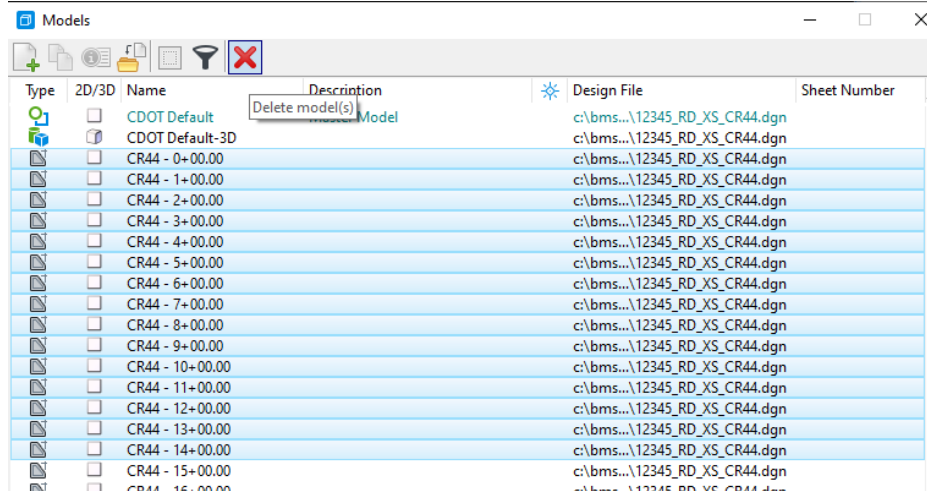
In our example & in the steps below, we plan on shifting the Offsets at the beginning of CR44 to show more of the right side of the roadway so that work removing the existing CR44 road can be shown.

9.3.5.1 Deleting Sheets

- 1) Open the Models dialog, select all the cross section sheet models, and choose **Delete Models**.



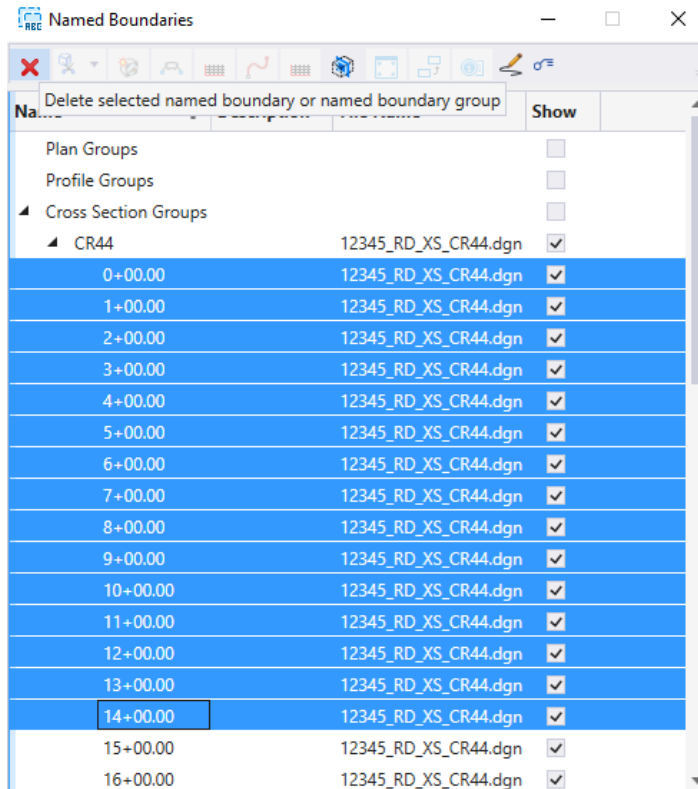
- 2) Also, delete the Drawing models for cross sections 0+00 to 14+00 because we will replace these with different dimensions in the next section.



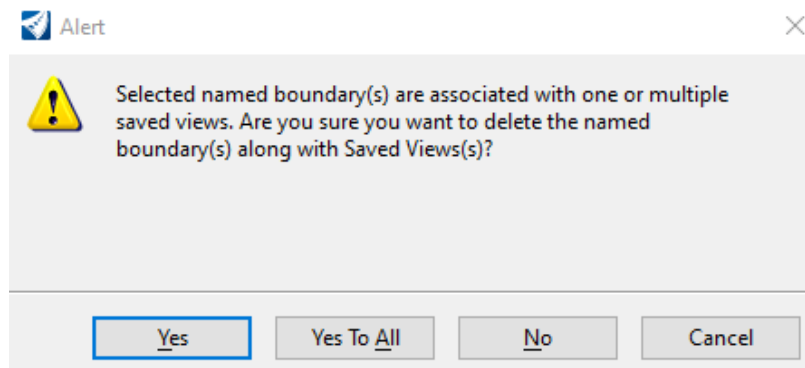
NOTE that we could have deleted all the drawing models as well and just recreated them all but having this ability to just add new named boundaries without deleting all the existing is needed when you have spent a lot of time annotating cross sections and you don't want to delete them all.

9.3.5.2 Deleting Named Boundaries

- 1) Open the Named Boundary Manager, select, and then delete Named Boundaries 0+00 to 14+00.



NOTE: You may be prompted with the following dialog. Choose **Yes To All**.



- 2) Go to File (the backstage area) and choose Tools -> Compress File.

In the next section, we will add these Named Boundaries back but with different offsets.

9.3.6 Modifying Named Boundaries

XS Named Boundaries can be modified in the 3D view but it is awkward to do this and the annotation doesn't recognize the modified Named Boundary which is a pretty major issue. A best practice is to:

- Delete the Drawing model(s) & the Named Boundary(s) you need to modify (As we just performed in the previous section).
 - Use the Named Boundary tool to place the Named Boundary(s) again modifying the LT/RT offsets and or Bottom/Top clearance as needed. Make sure you choose the Group previously created instead of creating a new one. (As we will do in the next few steps).
- 1) Open the Named Boundary tool, select the cross-section mode, set the 20H 10V Drawing Seed, and choose the CR44 alignment. Then set the dialog as shown below.

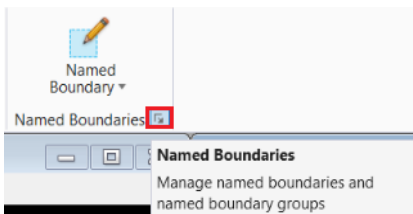

NOTE: One big change here is changing the **Group** from New to **CR44** which means the Named Boundaries about to be placed will be added to the CR44 group that already exists instead of a new group being created. If you want earthwork on cross-section sheets, you will need to process the End Area Volume Report in the file where cross-section named boundaries exist after Cut/Fill Volume elements have been created. The steps below will take you through this process.

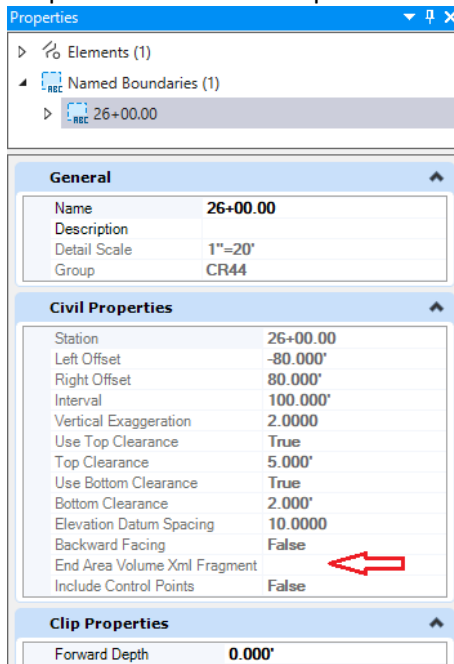

- 1) Remaining in the files 12345_RD_XS_CR44.DGN and with View 1 the active view, reference the file 12345_RD_EW.DGN (This file contains the Cut/Fill Volume elements & you should see them in the 3D view once the reference is attached).

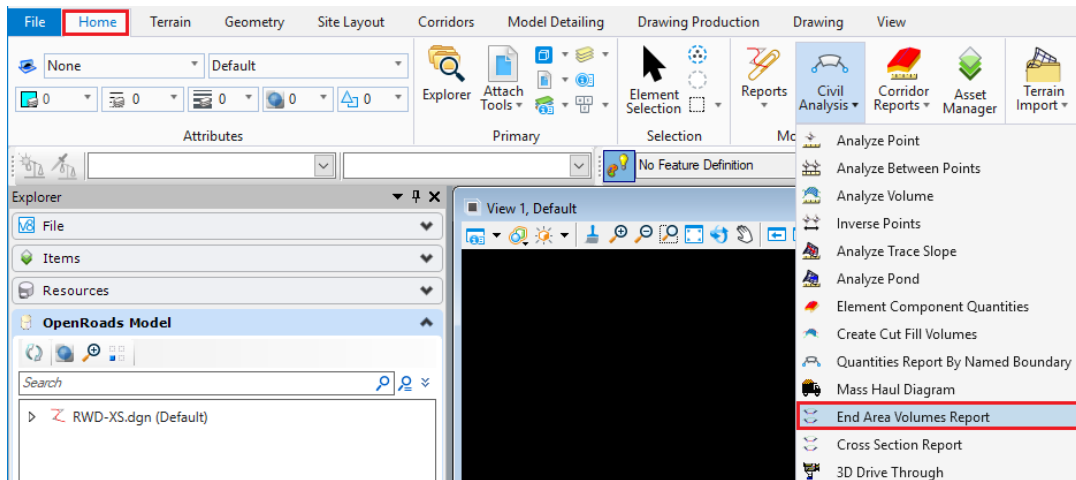

10. SUPERELEVATION DIAGRAM

Below are steps to generate a sheet which displays a Superelevation Diagram in the profile view. Superelevation must have been calculated and applied to the corridor and referenced along with the corridor to the Named Boundary file. You can create the super diagram when you set up sheets (Section 10.1 below) or through an annotation group to sheets already created (Section 10.2).

11. ANNOTATION

11.1 Overview

The Annotation tools available in OpenRoads Designer are found under the Drawing Production ribbon tab and are shown below.



- Civil Labeler – Non-Feature based labeling that provides more of a manual placement of labels in the Plan, Profile, and XS design/drawing models. Examples of the types of labels include Sta/Offset, Stat/Elevation, Offset/Elevation, Distance/Bearing, Intersection labels, Curve data, etc.
- Element Annotation – Feature Based annotation used to annotate Alignments, Survey elements, etc.
- Drawing Model Annotation – This has to be ran in a Drawing model and is used to annotation items like:
 - Profile Grid, Datum, & Profile
 - Cross-Section Grid, Datum, Offset/Elevations, Slopes
 - ROW, Guardrail, etc. on Cross-Sections

Most of OpenRoads annotation is automatically updated when changed and the file it resides in is opened. A couple of examples of this automatic updating are;

- If a curve in an alignment is changed, the Stationing & Curve data is automatically updated.
- If a line whose distance/direction are labeled with Civil Labeler is modified, the length/bearing are update.

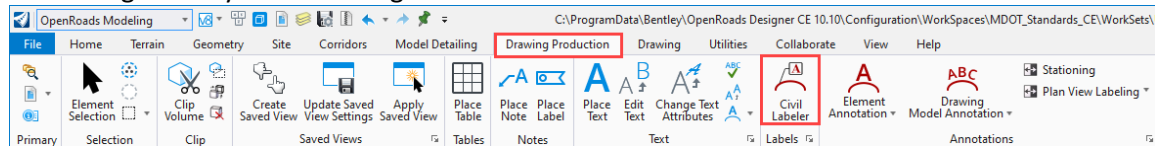
The exception to this automatic update of annotation when the annotated element changes is cross-section annotation. Cross-Sections have to be re-annotated if the Corridor model changes.

Annotation should normally be performed in the design or drawing models when the Named Boundary process has been used to create sheets.

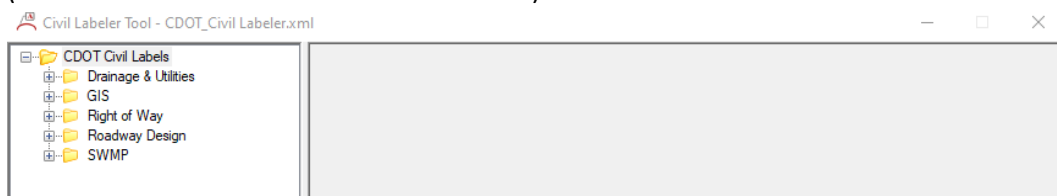
11.2 Civil Labeler

11.2.1 Overview

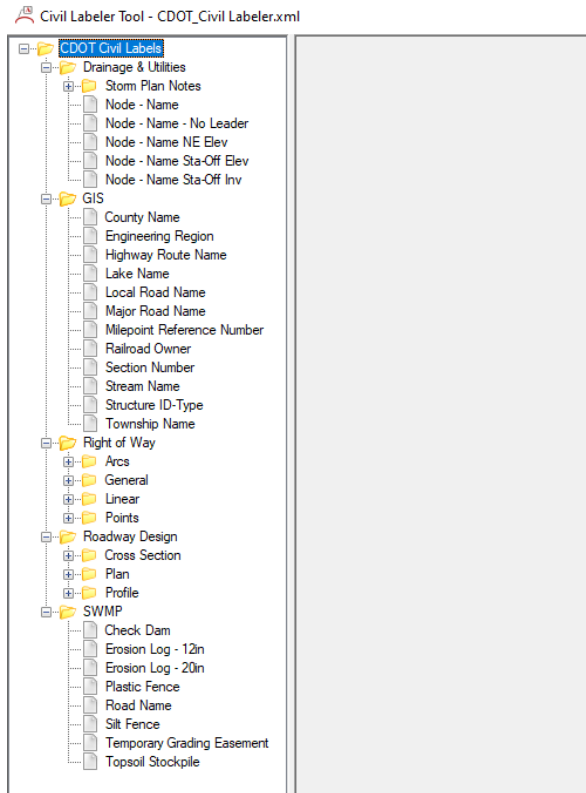
The civil labeler is a production-focused annotation tool for the civil environment. Stored as part of a workspace, label definitions are easily shared while maintaining constancy and compliance with standards. Label definitions bring together Text Favorites, Text Styles, Dimension Styles, Element Templates, custom prompting, border frames, and lock settings into a single, repeatable label definition. In addition, civil labels can target multiple elements allowing more complex labels than other annotation tools. For example, the ability to target two geometry elements and compute offsets between geometry or interesting stations.



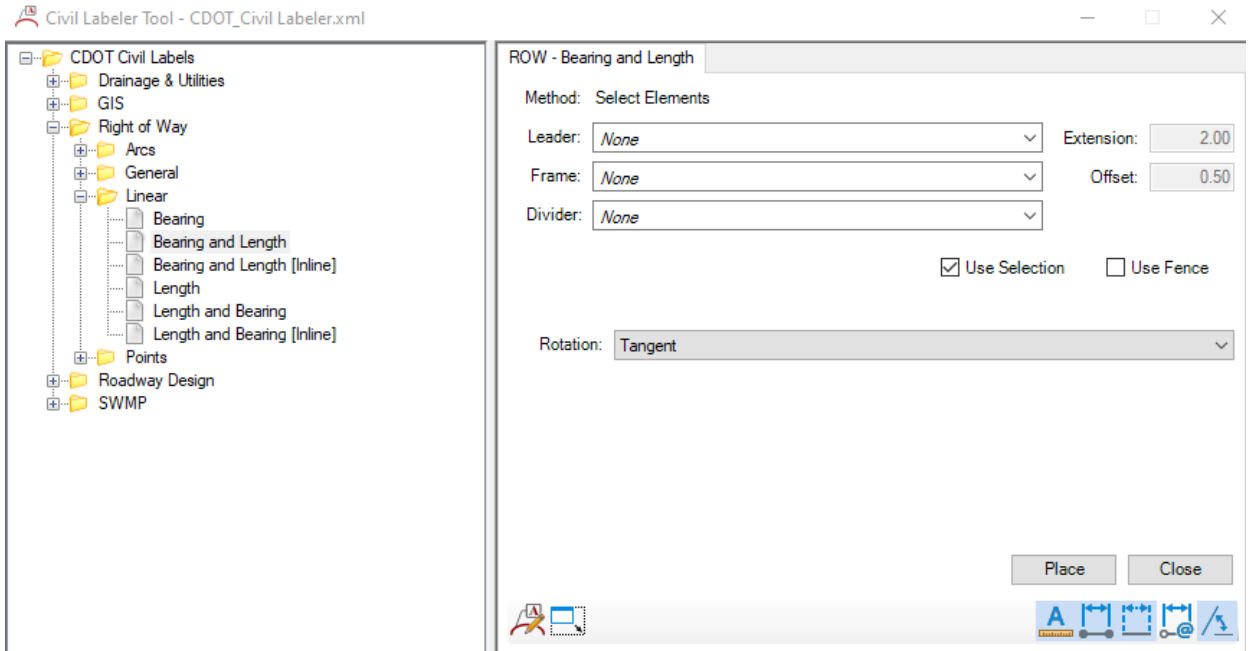
- 3) Open **12345_RD_Plan Profiles_CR44.dgn**
- 4) Invoke Civil Labeler & expand the **CDOT Civil Labels** folder when the + sign appears next to it. (It takes a few seconds for the labels to load).



- 5) Review the label types under each category.



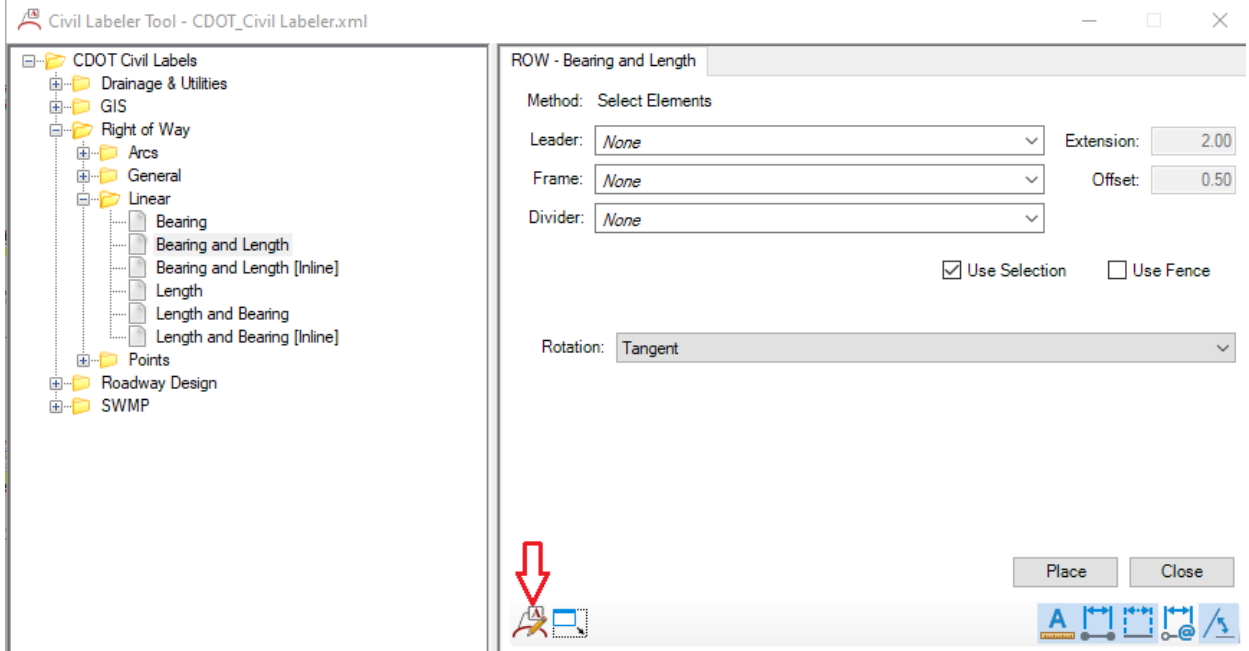
- 6) Drive down into the Right of Way -> Linear folder and select the **Bearing & Length** label. Review the dialog. Observe the Place button on the various settings to the right of the dialog.



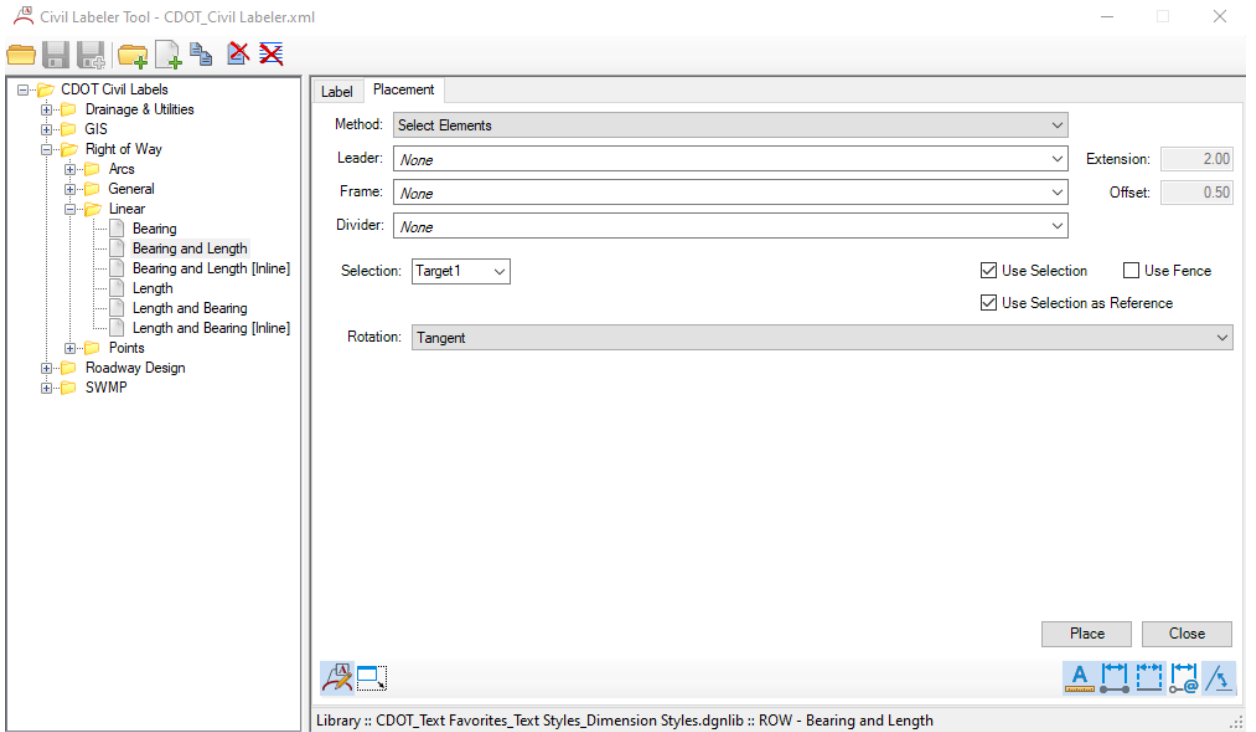
11.2.2 Enable Label Manager

In this section, we will show you how to create your own XML file to change/add label settings if you want. This is not a requirement of use but an option only which will let you create or copy labels as needed. You can see that the Civil Labeler looks at the **CDOT_Civil Labeler.xml** file that is in the workspace by default. We will Save the XML within the project area in these steps.

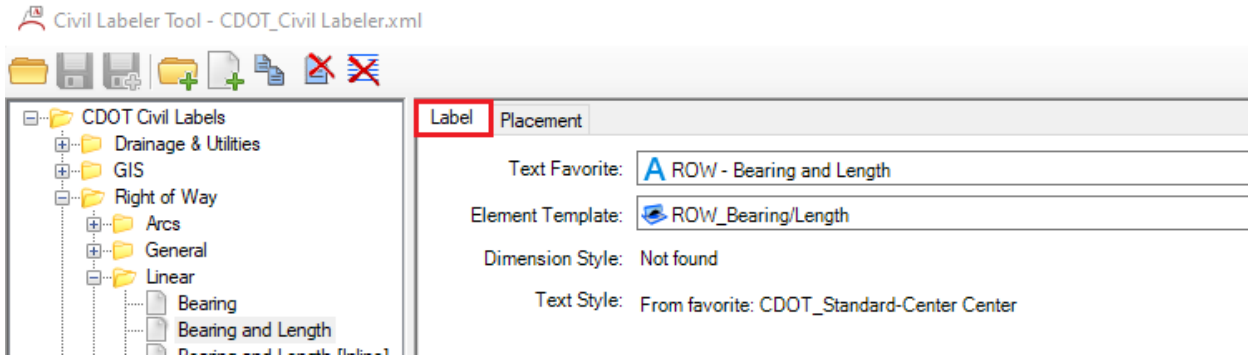
- 1) Choose the **Enable Label Manager** button in the lower left of the right frame of the dialog.



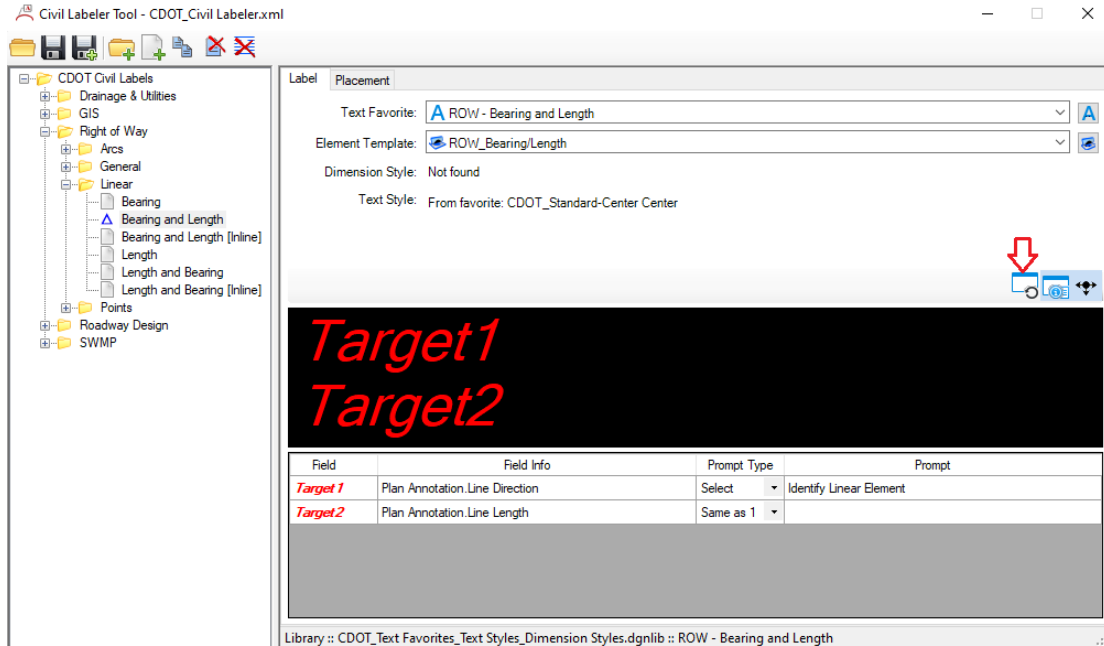
- 2) See the results below. This adds a *Label* tab at the top of the dialog and also the ability to copy labels, create labels, create folders, etc.



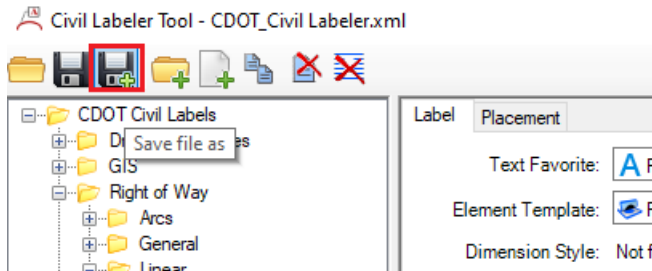

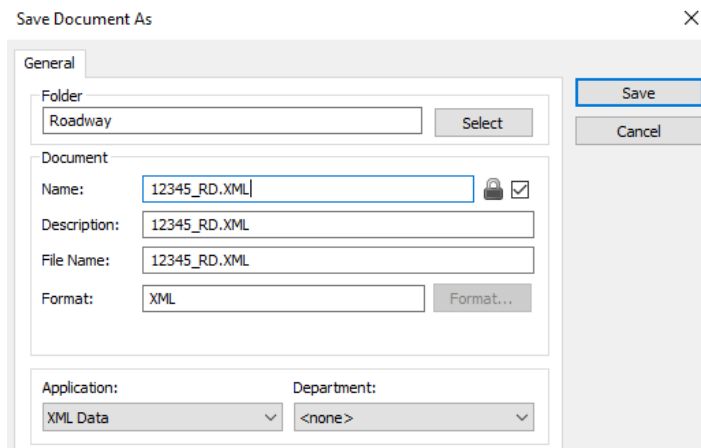

Note that if this setting is enabled, when a view rotates, the label will rotate with the view. This is nice for some labels such as curve labels so the text stays readable at all times, but not ideal for Bearing and Length labels placed on the same angle as the element that is being rotated.



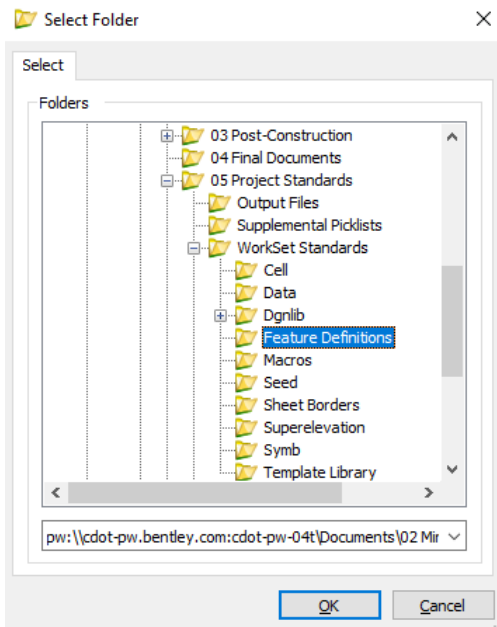
- Choose the **Save file as** command.



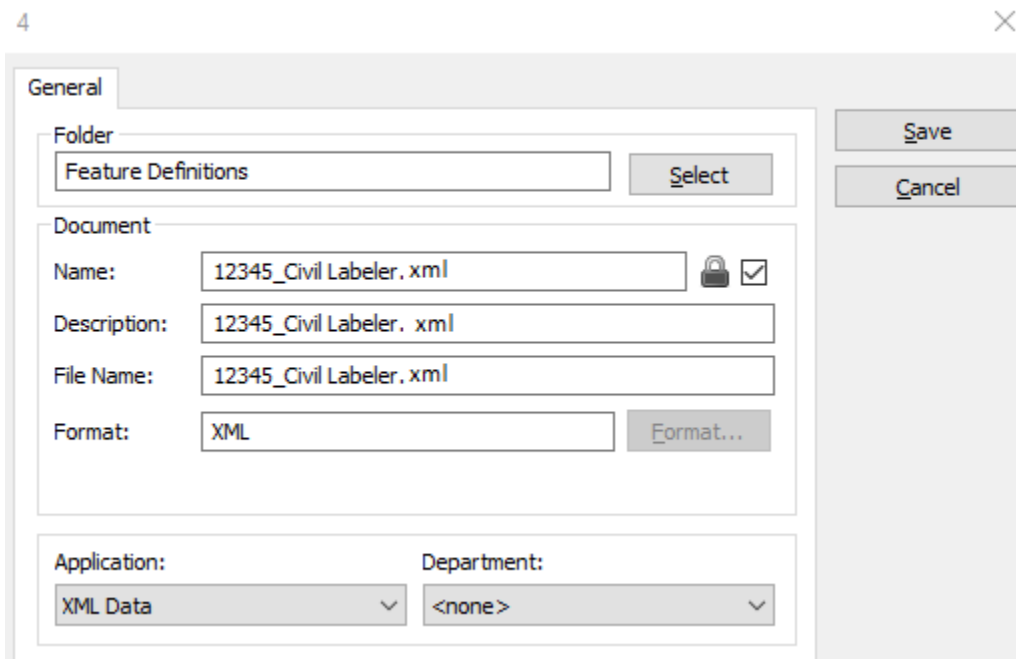

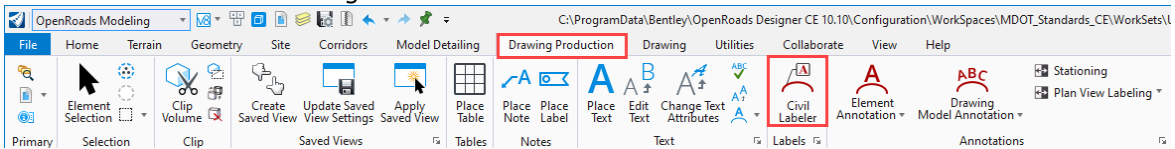
Annotation of Plan & Profile should be performed in design or drawing models. The coordinate system is valid in the Plan View drawings models so Civil Accudraw can be used to locate Station/Offset or coordinate values. Below are a few examples of manually annotating Plan and Profile models.

11.3.9 Others

The following annotation groups that are not under a folder categorization are for the most part, self-explanatory. We have already been through the XS End Area Volume and we will go through adding ROW in section 11.5 below.



11.3.10 Removing Annotation Groups

Note that running an additional XS annotation group will add to the annotation that is already present which in some cases could create overlaps in text. If you wish to replace an annotation group, you will need to use the **Remove Drawing Model Annotations** and then use the Drawing Model Annotation command to add the new group(s). When you use the **Remove Drawing Model Annotations** command, you can't choose an annotation group to remove so currently, all annotation is removed. The Remove Annotation command is demonstrated in the section below.

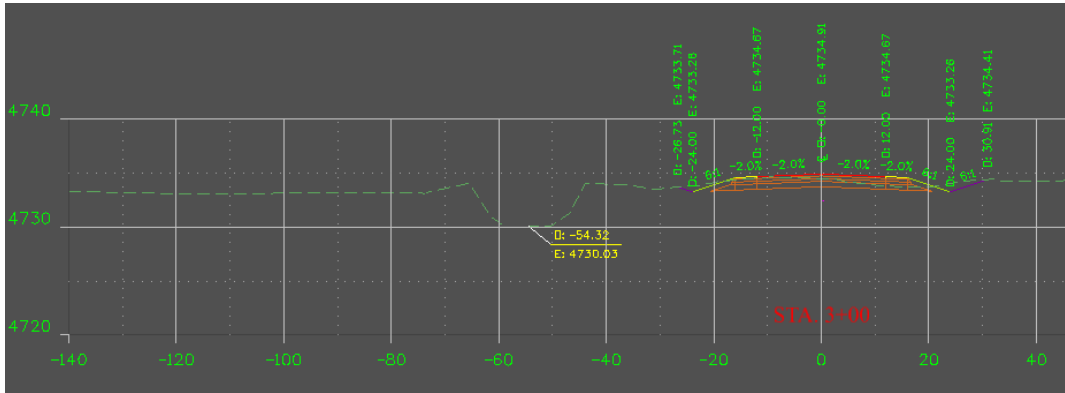
11.4 Corridor Changes

If anything about the Corridor model changes (profile, superelevation, model changes such as pavement width, ditch depth, shoulder width, pavement depth, etc.) the annotation will need to be updated. Steps below go through this process.

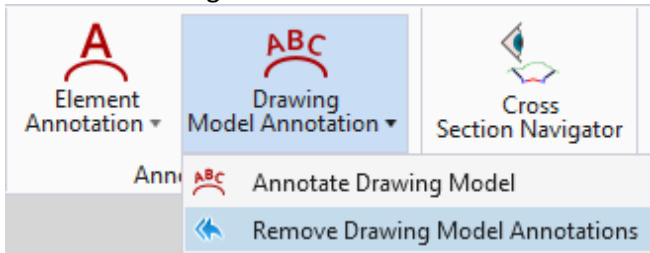
In the steps below, we will assume the design profile has changed on the CR44 alignment and the corridor model has changed. To update the annotation on the cross-sections:

- 1) Open the file **12345_Rd_XS_CR44.dgn**
- 2) Although you can go to any of the cross-section drawing models to perform the update, we will go to CR44 - 3+00.00

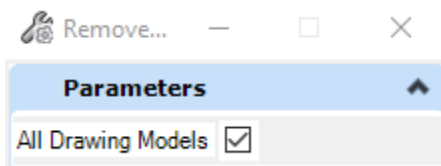
3) This model should look similar to what is shown below.



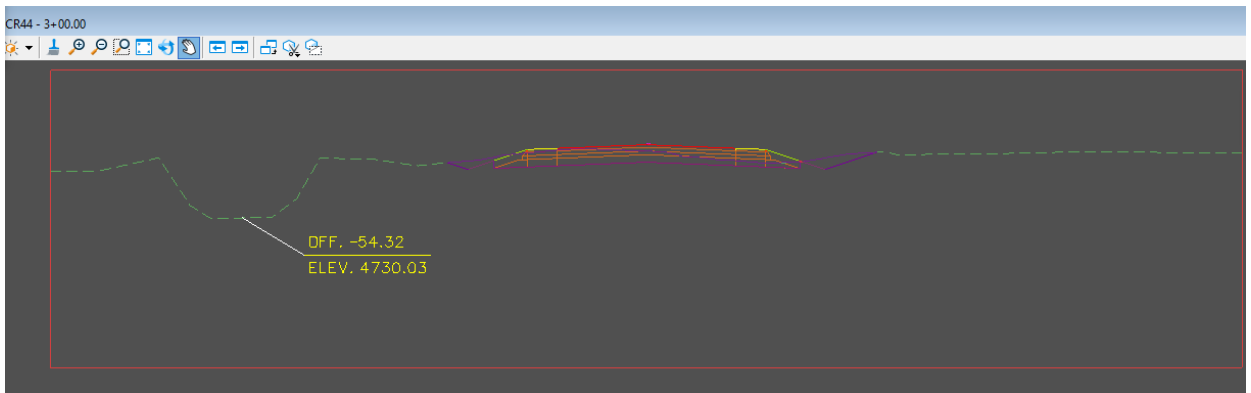
4) Choose – Drawing Model Annotation -> Remove Drawing Model Annotation



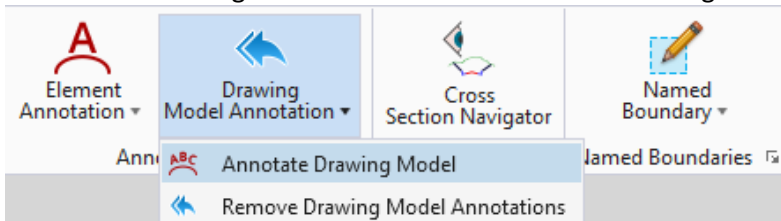
5) Put a check in the All Drawing Models check box.



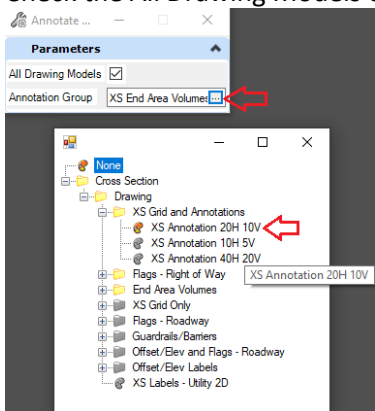
6) Data point to confirm all models. All annotation except the label placed by the Civil Labeler has been removed.



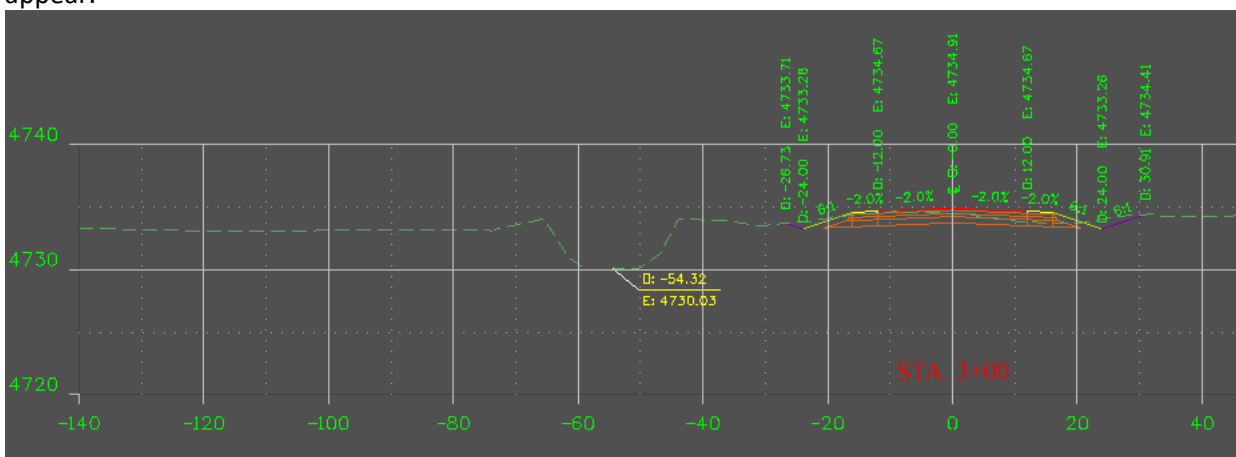
7) Choose the Drawing Model Annotation -> Annotate Drawing Model



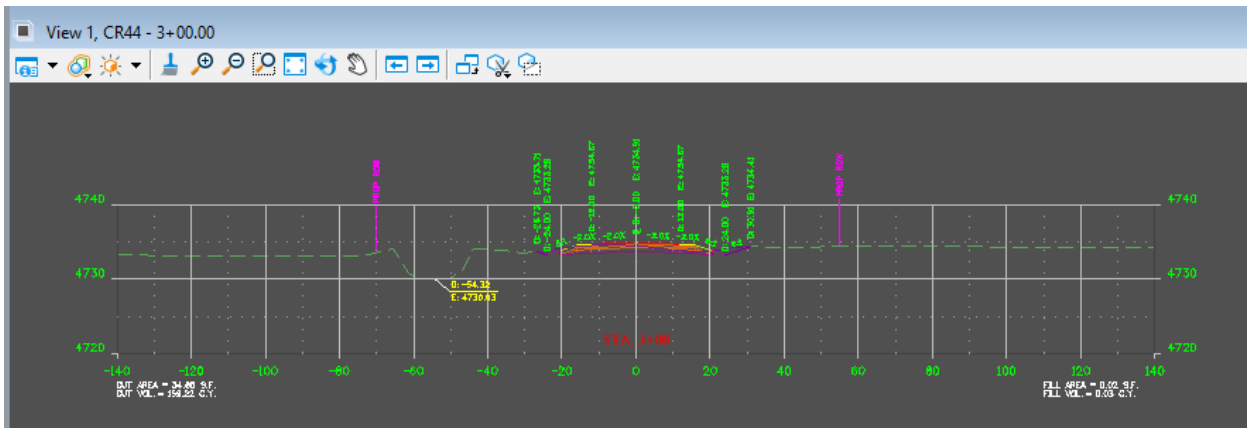
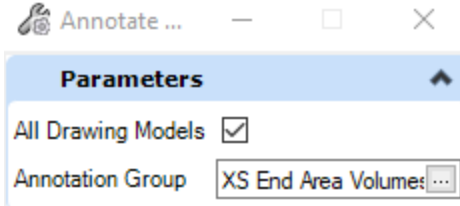
8) Check the All Drawing Models checkbox and choose the Annotation Group shown below.



9) Confirm the prompts and the updated grid, offset/elevation offset labels, station, etc. should appear.



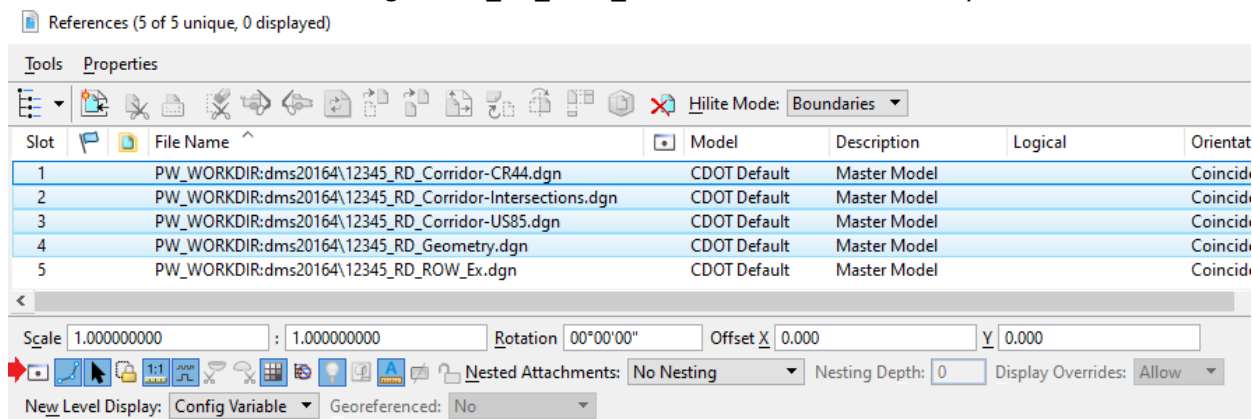
- 10) You would also have to choose and run any other annotation groups (such as XS End Area Volumes, Flags – Right of Way, etc. We will not do this but you would do the following to update the earthwork.
 - a. Open the Multi-model view of the XS file.
 - b. Run the End Area Volume Report again to update the earthwork based on the profile change.
 - c. Go back to one of the XS drawing models
 - d. Choose the Drawing Model Annotation command.
 - e. Choose the XS End Area Volumes annotation group and data point to confirm the prompts and the earthwork should be added back.



11.5 Adding ROW

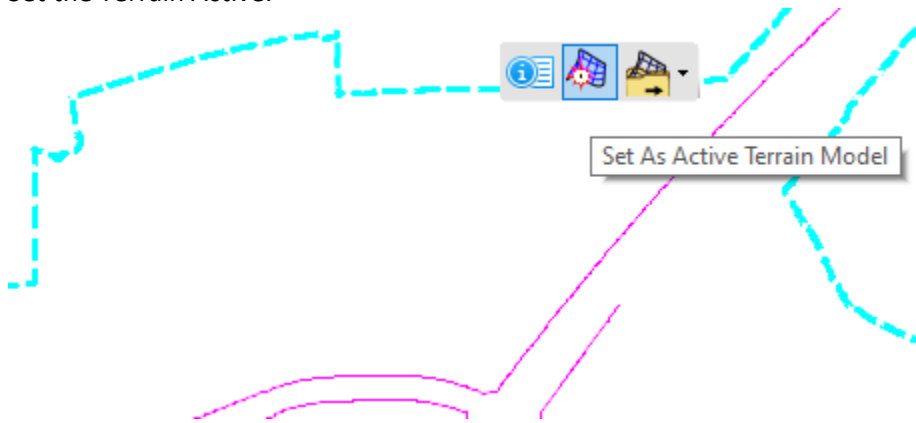
We will go through the steps of showing the location of proposed right of way on cross-sections. This process will work for existing and proposed ROW and also Easement. To accomplish this, you must profile the existing and/or proposed ROW which is performed in the first few steps below and then we will apply an annotation group in the XS file.

- 1) Open the file **12345_Rd_ROW_Prop.dgn**. This is just a 2D file so we will reference the terrain & set it active so we can profile the ROW.
- 2) Turn OFF all references including 12345_RD_ROW_EX.DGN which should already be off.

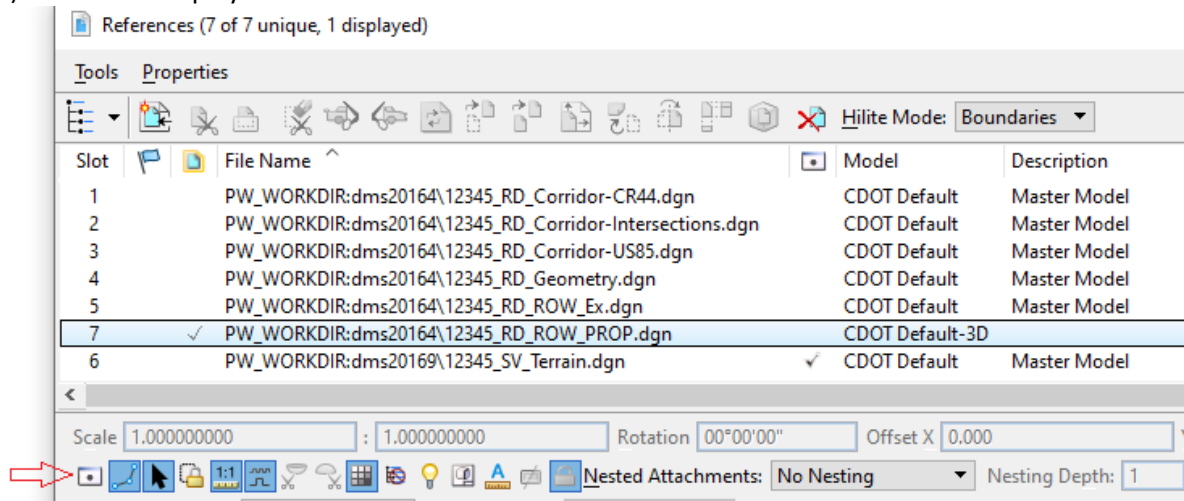


- 3) Attached the Existing Ground Terrain from the Survey folder. The file name is 12345_SV_Terrain.DGN9

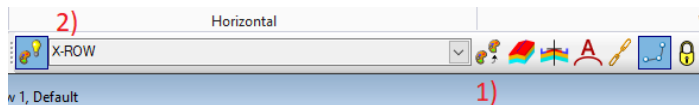
- 4) Set the Terrain Active.



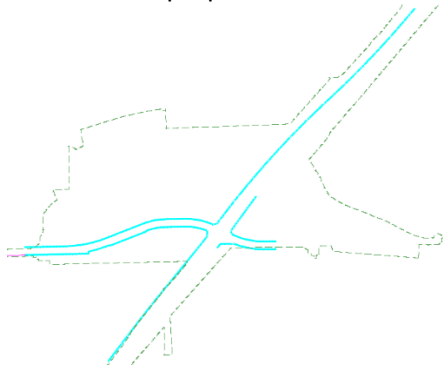
- 5) Turn OFF display of the Default-3D reference file of the Default model in view 1.



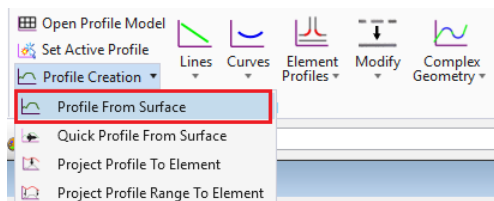
- 6) On the feature definition toolbar (available under Geometry -> General Tools -> Standards), choose Match Feature (1 below). Select one of the proposed ROW lines to set the feature to Right of Way (Prop) and then set the Use Active Feature toggle on (2 below).



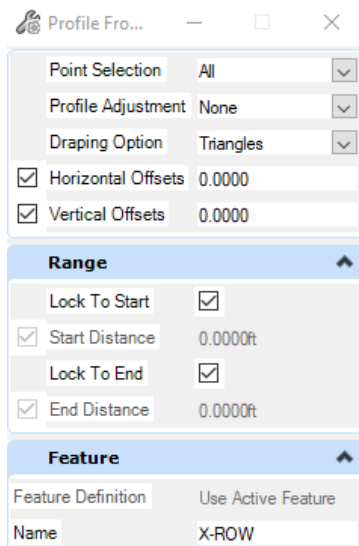
7) Select all the proposed ROW elements.



8) Select the **Profile from Surface** command.



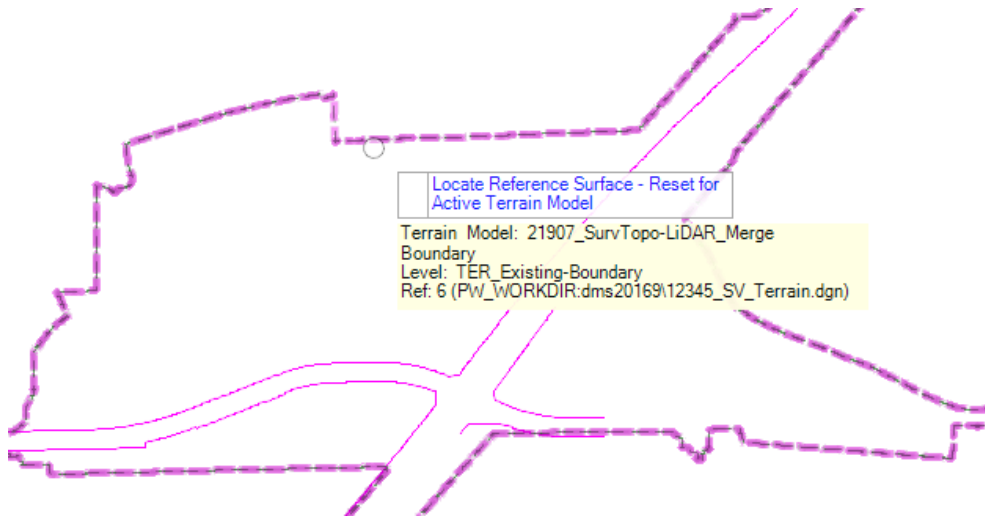
9) Fill out the dialog as shown below.



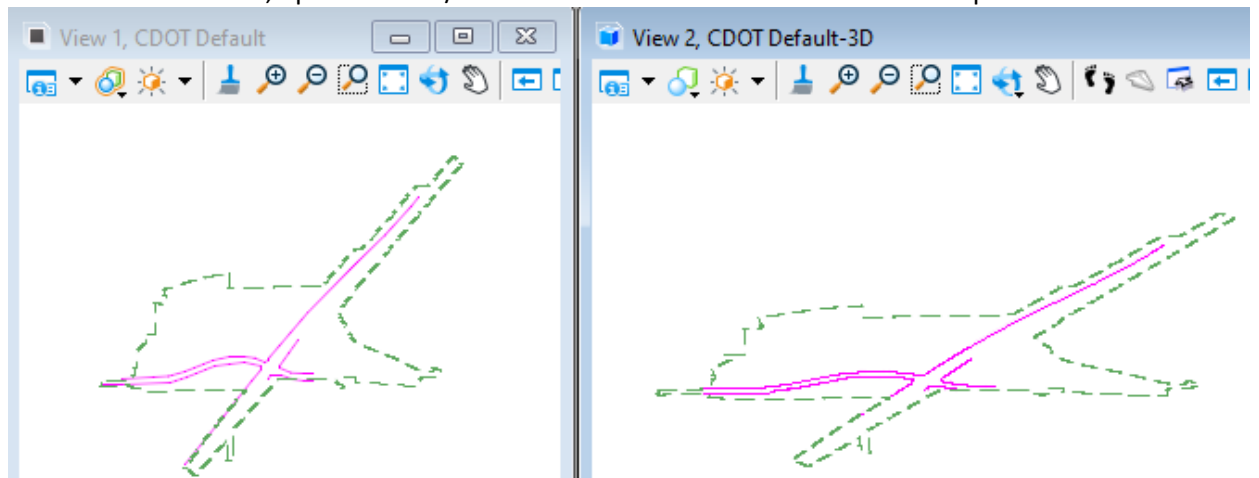
10) Data Point as prompted.



11) Select the terrain model and then confirm all the prompts to profile all the elements.

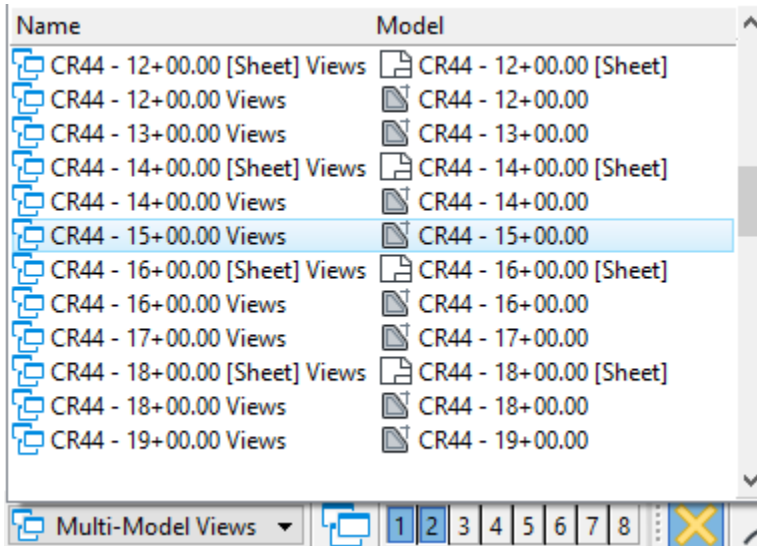


12) From the Reset menu, open the Plan/3D views and make sure the ROW lines are profiled.

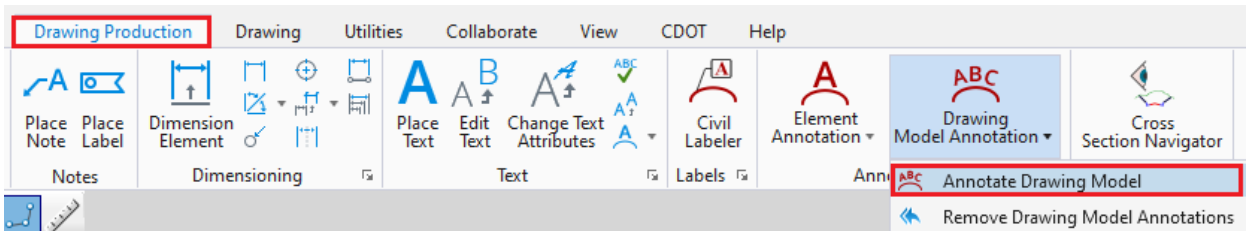


13) Open the 123455_RD_XS_CR44.DGN file and referenced 12345_RD_ROW_Prop.

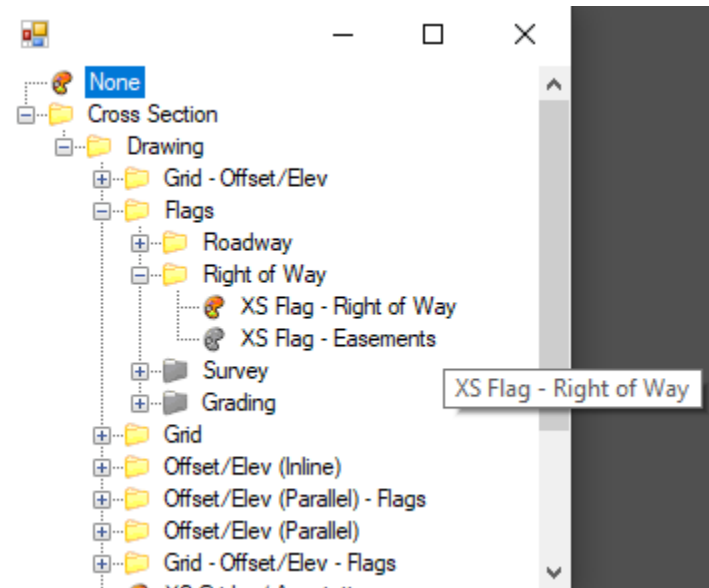

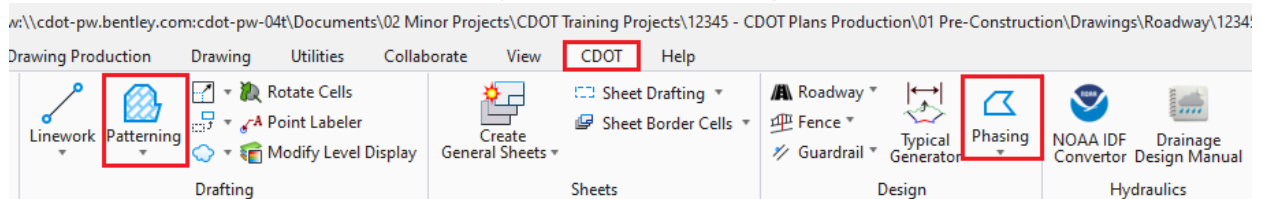
11.6 Patterning & Hatching

Pattern tools are available on the Drawing workflow as shown below.

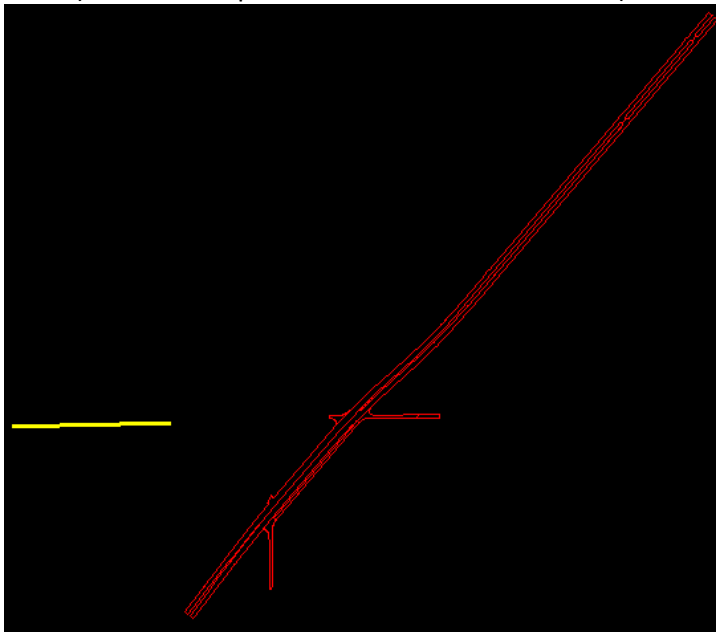

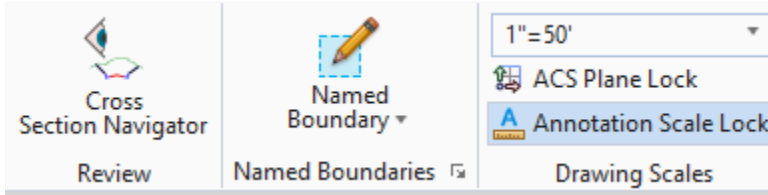


11.6.2 General process

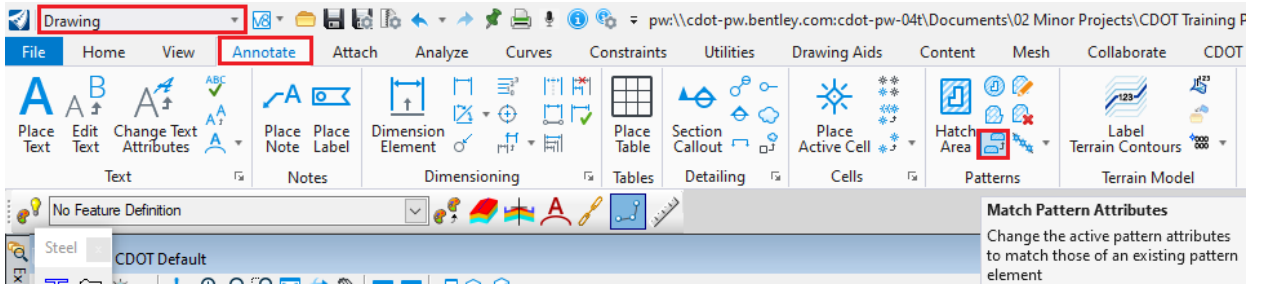
- 1) Open the file **12345_RD_PavemenrRemovalShading.dgn**
- 2) There are multiple pavement removal shapes in this file that need to be cross-hatched (red below) and one shape that has been cross hatched (Yellow below).



- 3) Go to Drawing Production & verify the Drawing Scale is set to 1"=50'.



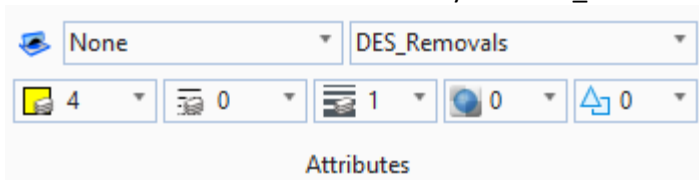
- 4) Go to the **Drawing Workflow** -> **Annotate Ribbon tab** -> **Patterns Ribbon group** and choose the **Match Pattern Attributes**



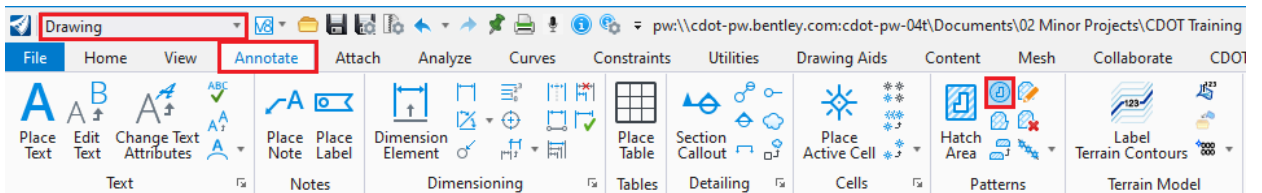
- 5) Ensure that Match Symbology is checked and then select the Yellow cross-hatch area to the left.



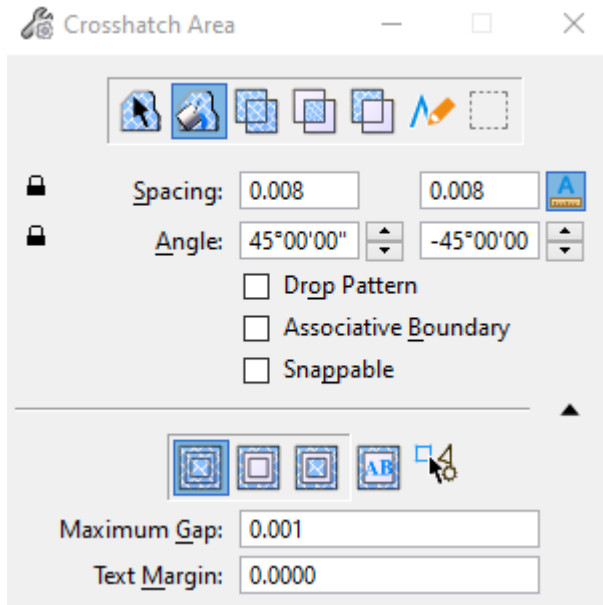
- 6) Go to the Home Ribbon tab and verify that DES_Replacements is the active level.



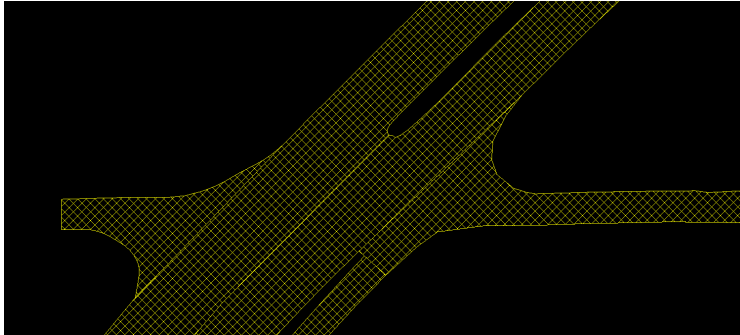
- 7) Go back to the Annotate Ribbon tab and select the Crosshatch command.



- 8) Below are the settings that should be pre-set since you matched the already patterned shape to the left.



- 9) Data point in the shapes to flood these areas.



NOTE:

To get the hatching to be placed at an angle along the element, do the following:
Rotate the view so that the edge of the shape you want to draw the angle from is at horizontal and then when you hatch it, the hatching is placed at the intended angle along the shape.

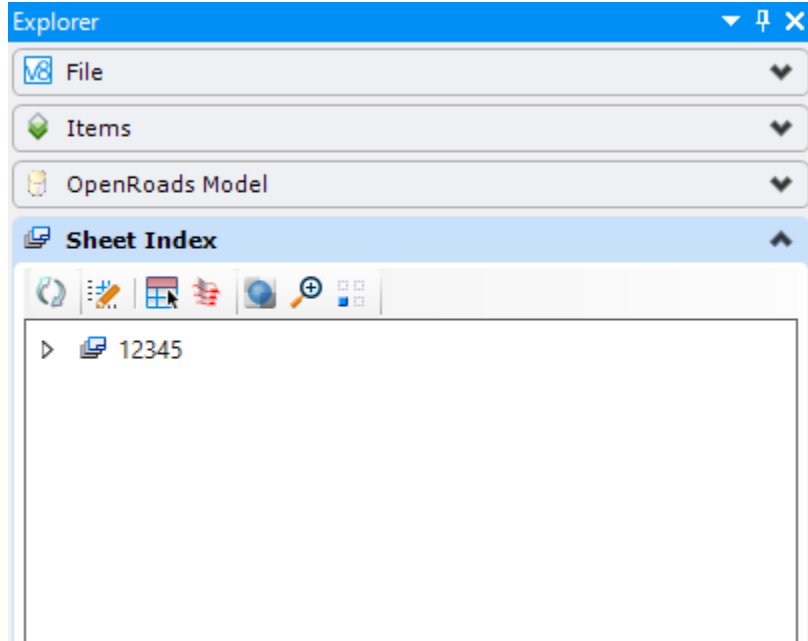
11.7 Setting up 2D D&U Linear Data For Display on Cross Sections

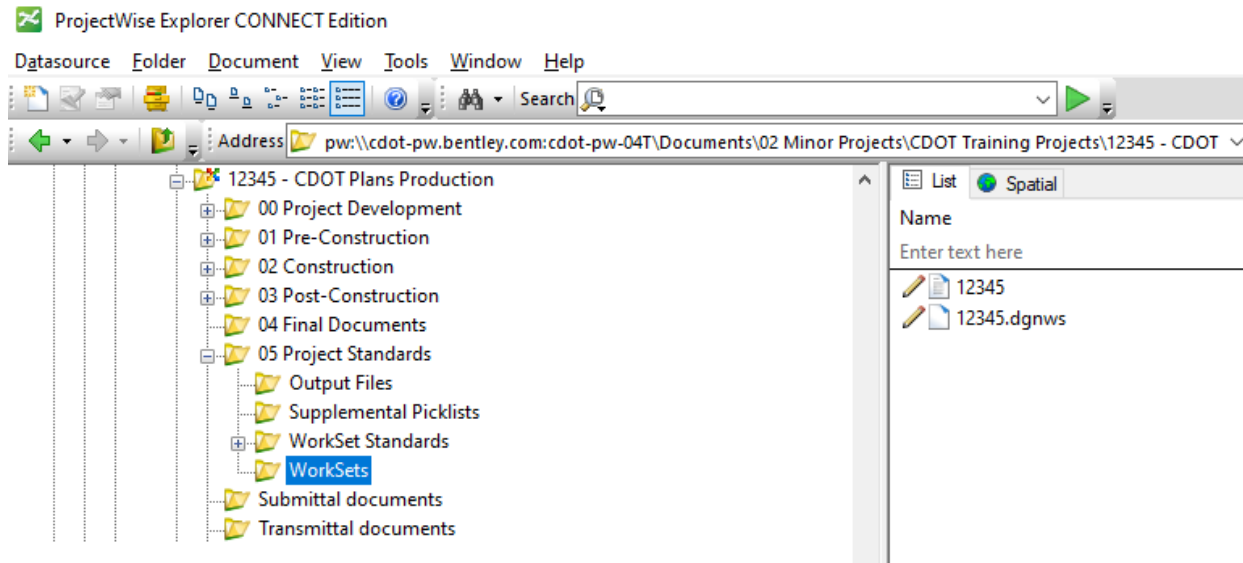

12. SHEET INDEX

Sheet Index is found on Project Explorer as shown below and is used to manage DGN files that contain your Sheets. **It's extremely important that all Sheets are created in a Sheet model because Sheet Index will only recognize sheet models as sheets.**

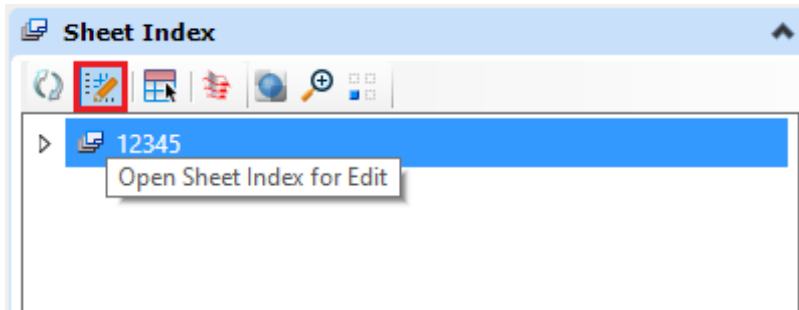


Notice the folder name above matches the workset name for your project shown below. Sheet Index information is stored in the DGNWS file.

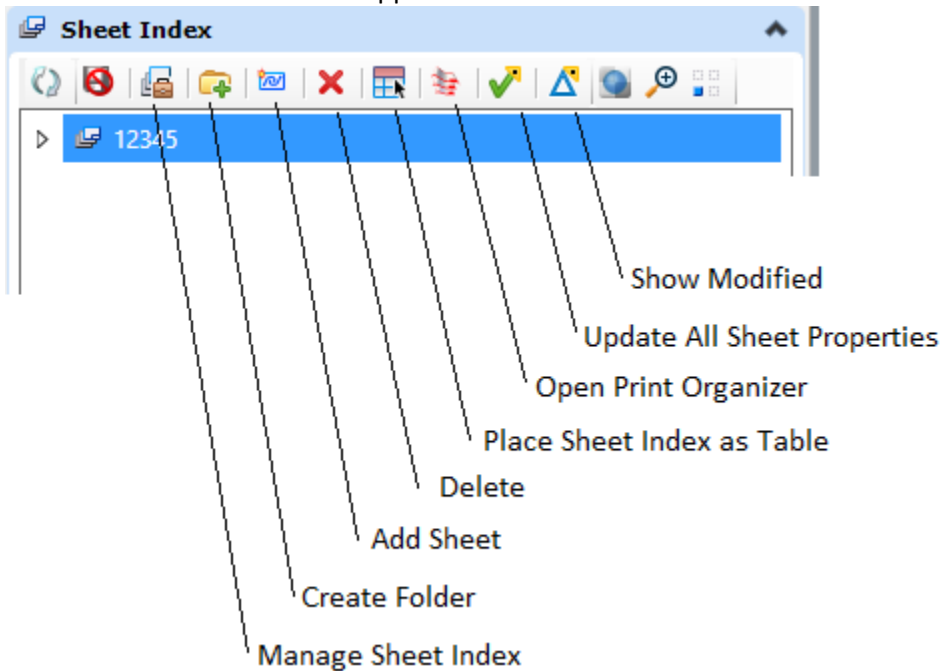


12.1 Open the Sheet Index for Edits

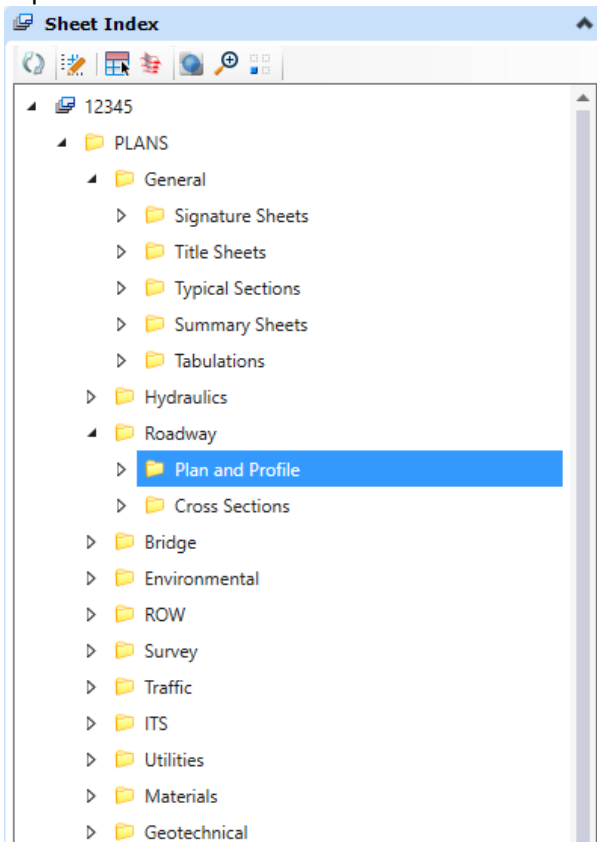
- 1) You can be in any DGN file to access the Sheet Index but let's open the **12345_RD_Title.dgn** file.
- 2) Open Project Explorer and select the Sheet Index tab.
- 3) Sheet Index is by default, not open for edits so from the sheet index menu, Choose the **Open Sheet Index for Edit** command.



- 4) Notice all the commands that appear on the menu.



5) Expand the folders as shown below.

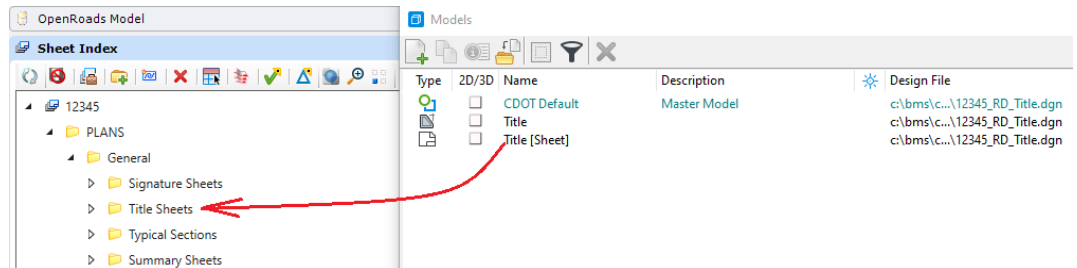

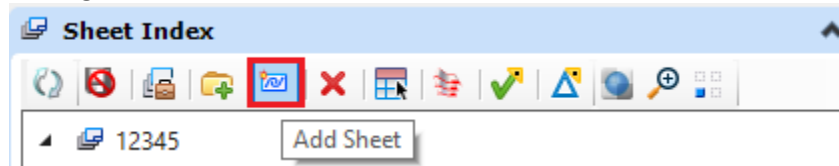
12.2.1 Overview

There are 3 ways to add sheets to Sheet Index:

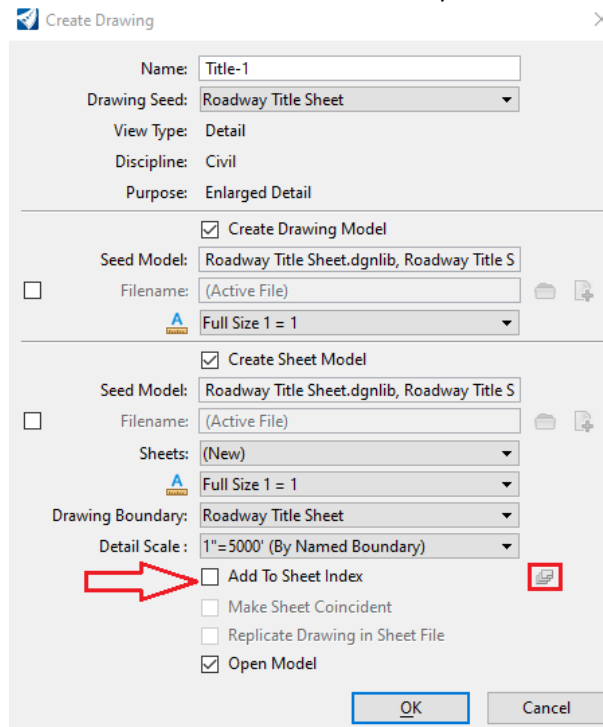
- **From the Models dialog** -> You can drag & drop a sheet model into a Sheet Index folder.



- Through the **Sheet Index Add Sheet command** -> Shown below.



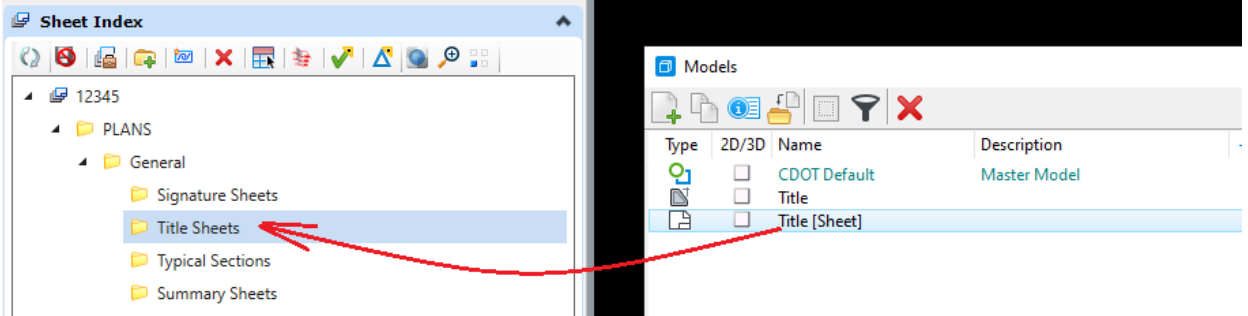
- **Through the Create Drawing dialog** -> Check the **Add to Sheet Index** check box on the Create Drawing dialog when creating sheets through the Named Boundary process. The button to the right below will allow you to select the Sheet Index folder the Sheet will be placed in.



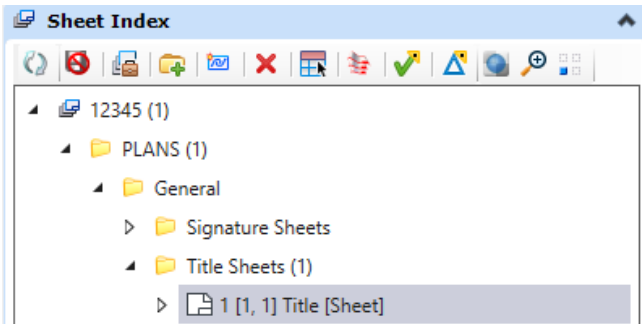

12.2.2 Drag & Drop a Model

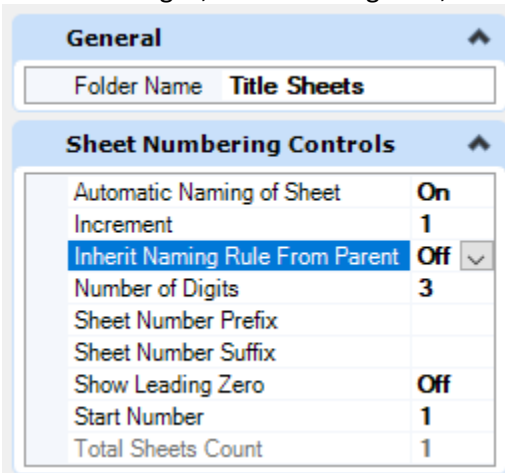
- 1) Open the Models dialog and drag and drop the Title [Sheet] model in the Title Sheet folder.



- 2) Review the added sheet.

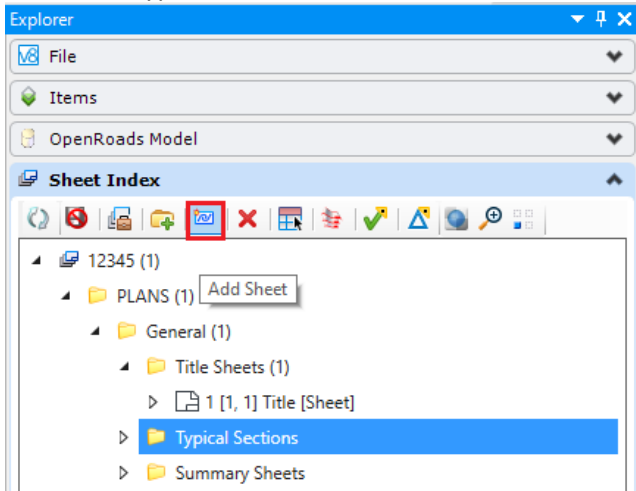


- 3) Select the Title Sheets folder and review Properties. These settings control the Sheet number, Number of digits, Show Leading Zero, etc. Also note the Total Sheet Count as well.

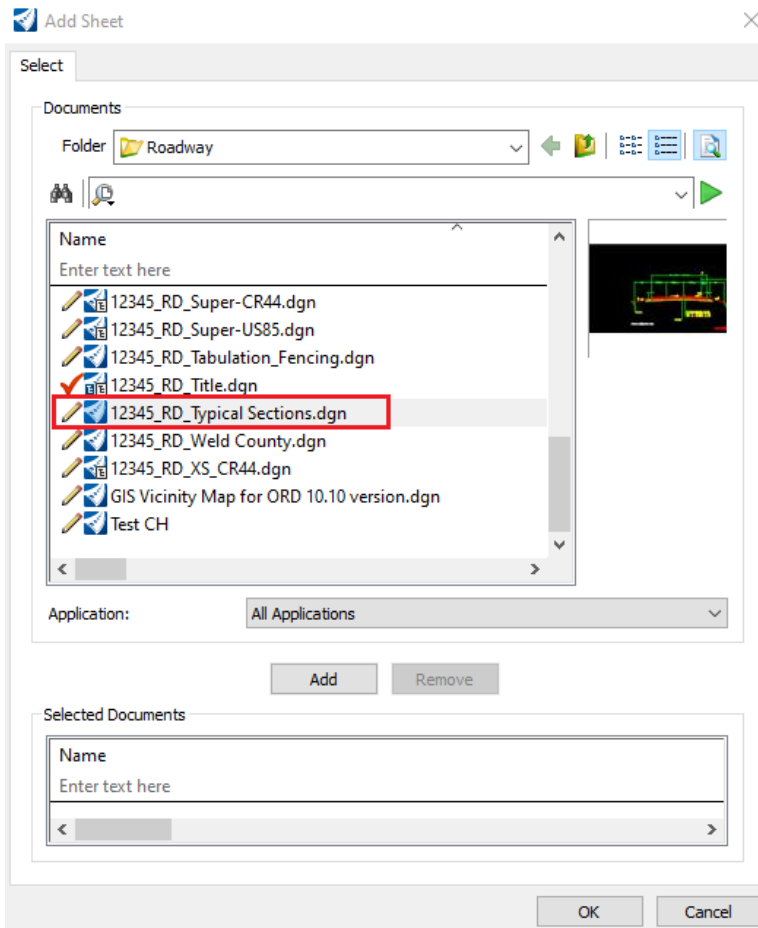


12.2.3 Add Sheet command

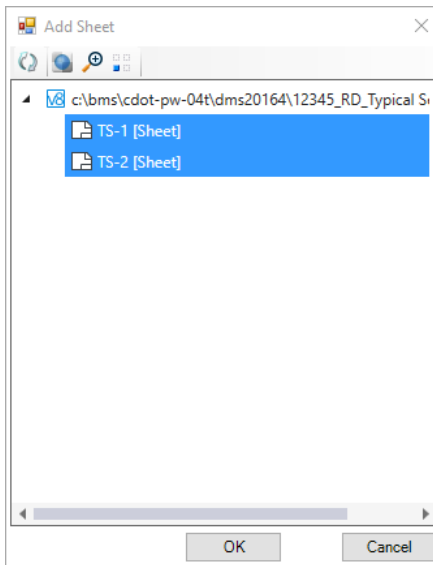
- 1) Select the Typical Sections folder and choose the **Add Sheet** command.



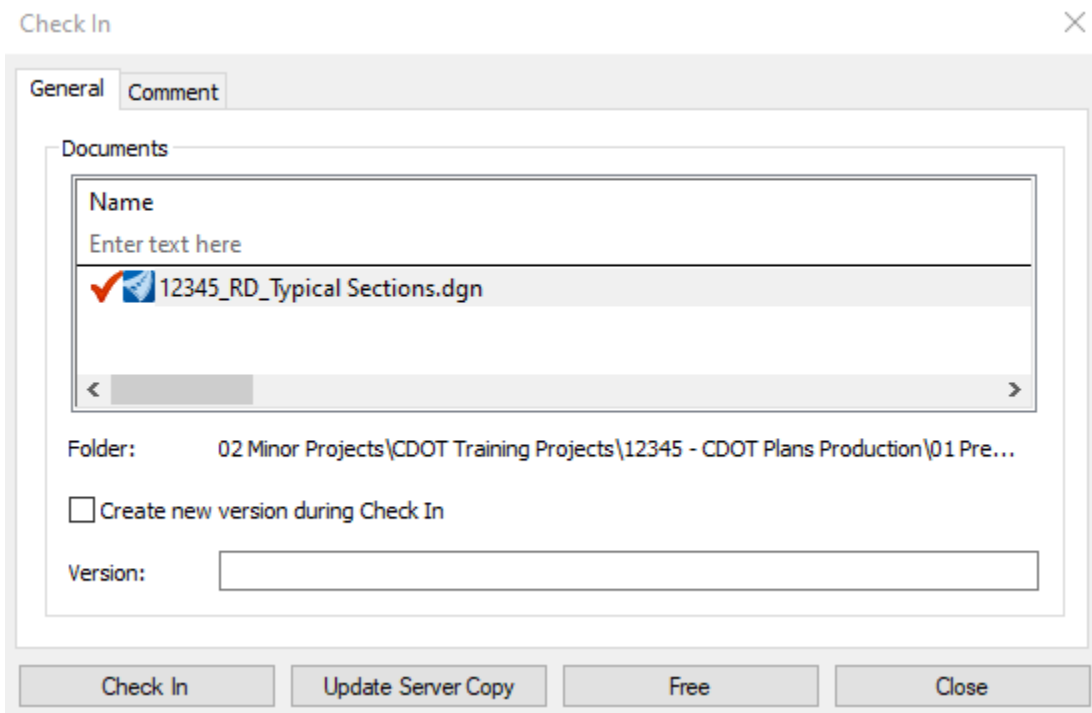
- 2) On the resulting dialog, choose the 12345_RD_Typical Sections.dgn file and click OK at the bottom of the dialog.



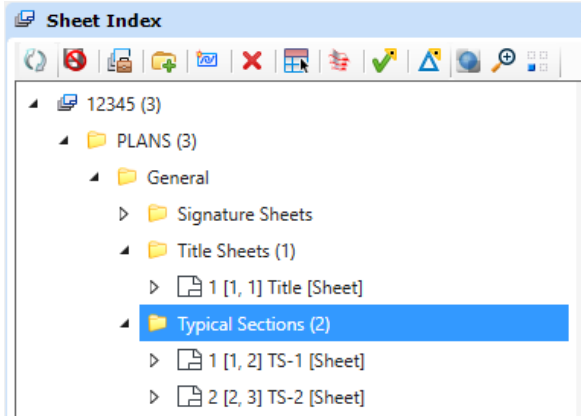
- 3) On the resulting dialog, all sheet models in the previously selected file should be displayed. Select the two Sheet models and choose OK.

- 5) Expand the Typical Sections folder to see the added sheets.

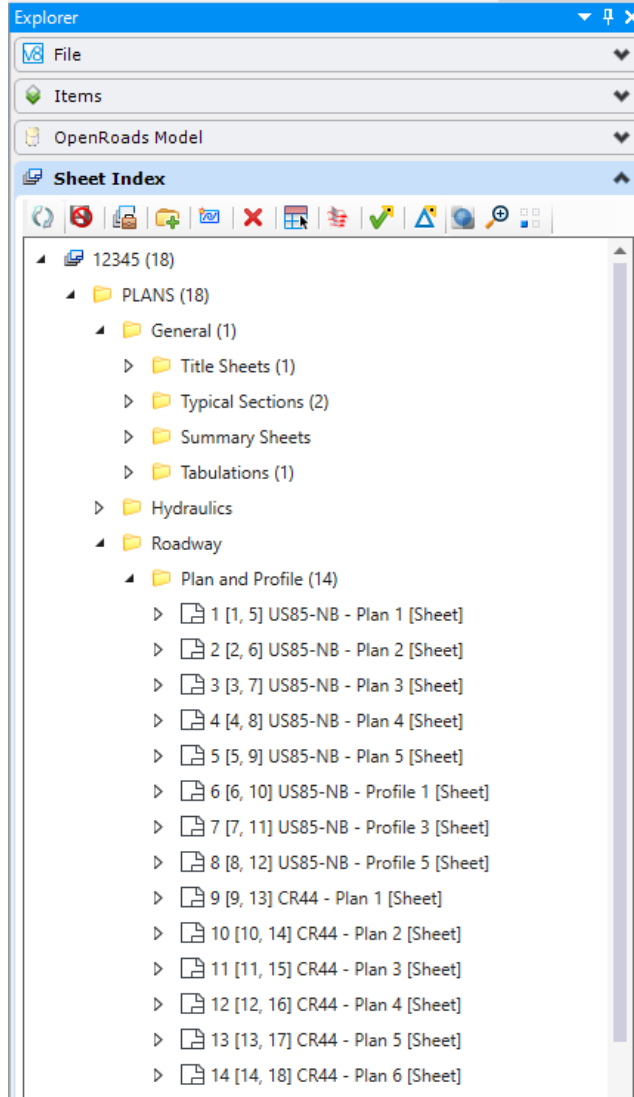

- 9) You can actually use Sheet Index to navigate to different models/files. Double click **CR44 – Plan 1 [Sheet]**



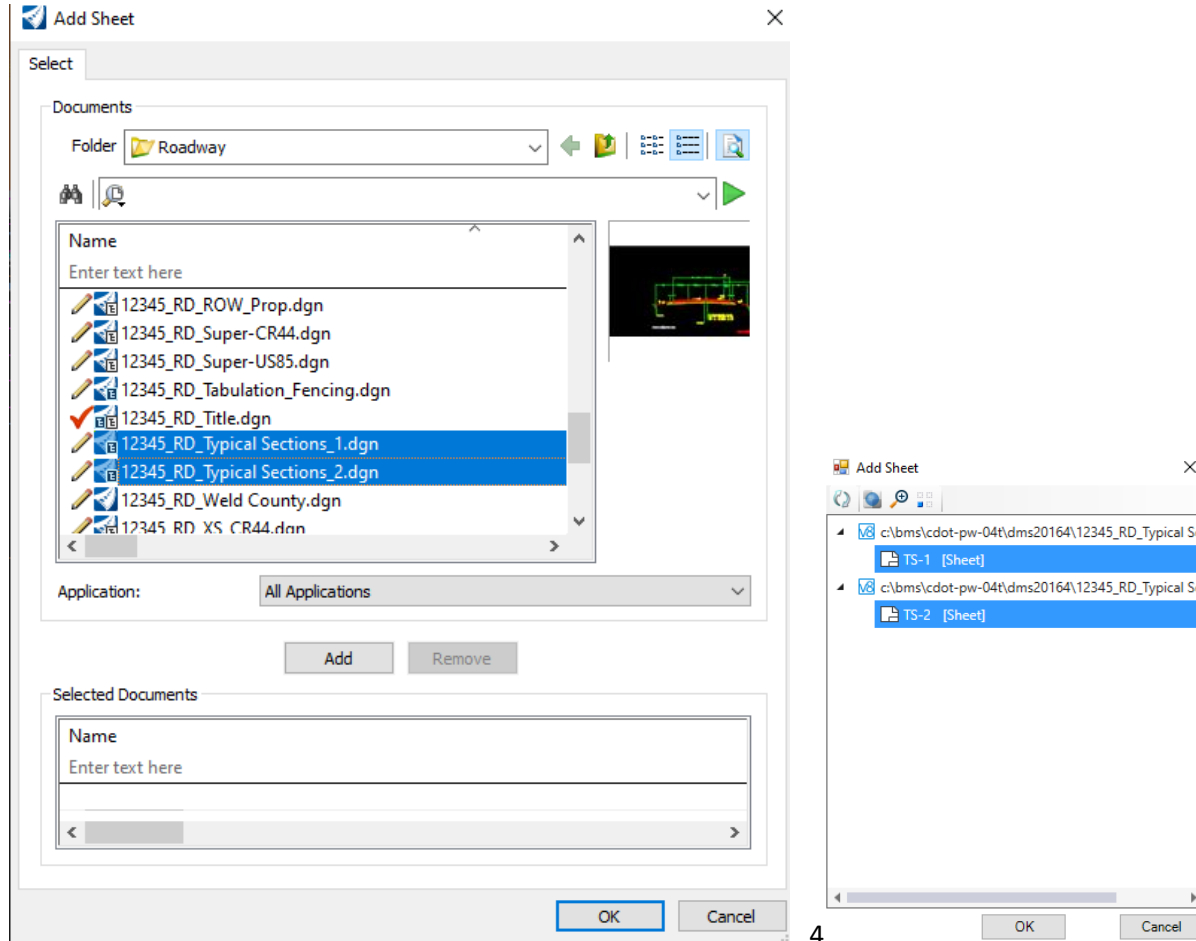
- 10) The model CR44 – Plan 1 [Sheet] in the file 12345_RD_Plan Profiles_CR44.dgn will be opened.



- 11) Open the Sheet Index for edits again.

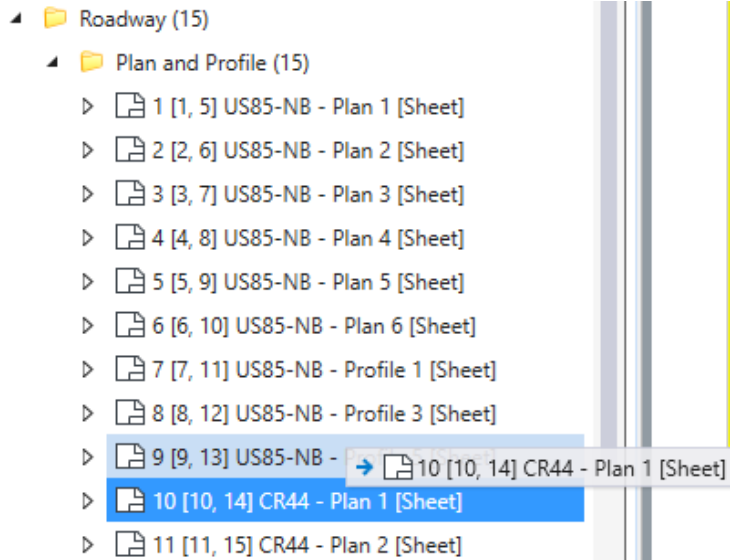
12.2.4 Add Sheet command (from Multiple DGN files)

12.4 Sheet Border Annotation

CDOT sheets have been set up with Text Fields on them so they can be populated with Workset Properties.

- 1) Review the title block area of this Plan & profile sheet. Observe that the Sheet Number is 013 for CR44-Plan 1[Sheet]. Notice that you see X's in several areas. These are the text fields that will change when the Workset Properties are changed which is discussed in the next couple of steps.

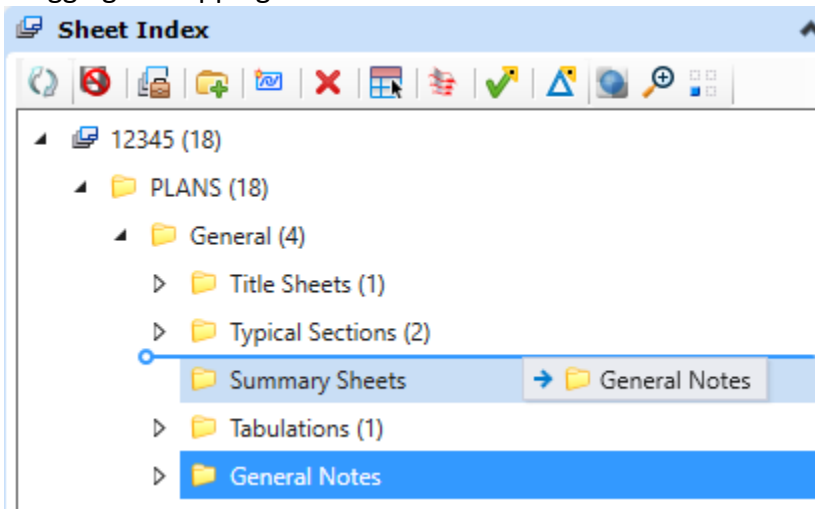

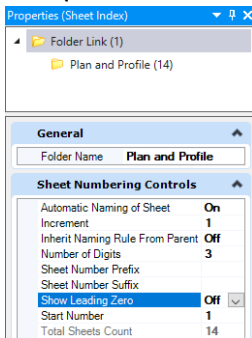


12.6 Sheet Properties

- 1) Select the workset 12345 in Sheet Index and review Properties. We've collapsed Index Properties to put the focus on **Sheet Numbering Controls** which is shown below. We will not change anything here but review what could be changed in regards to Sheet Numbering Controls.



- 2) Select the PLANS\Roadway\Plan and Profile folder & review the Sheet Numbering Controls can be folder specific. Notice the Inherit Naming Rule From Parent is Off so any changes to folders above the \Plan & Profile folder would not impact the sheets in the \Plan & Profile Shoulder.



- 3) Select the PLANS\General\General Notes folder created in the previous exercise. Edit the properties to match the ones that are set for the Plan and Profile folder (shown in the previous step).

12.7 Sheet Numbers and Sheet Numbering Edits

12.7.1 Sheet Numbering

Sheet & Subset Sheet Numbers are calculated by how many sheets are present in the Sheet Index and in what order. These are automatically populated in the Sheet/Subset Sheet fields as shown and discussed in the example below. **If you add or delete a sheet to the plans, the Sheet Number for all sheets below that sheet should update to reflect that additional sheet.**

- 1) You should still be in model CR44 – Plan 1 [Sheet]. Observe the image below. This should explain how the sheet numbers and subset sheet numbers are generated and populated from the number of sheets in the folders in Sheet Index.

12.8 Add/Delete a Sheet to/from the Plan Set

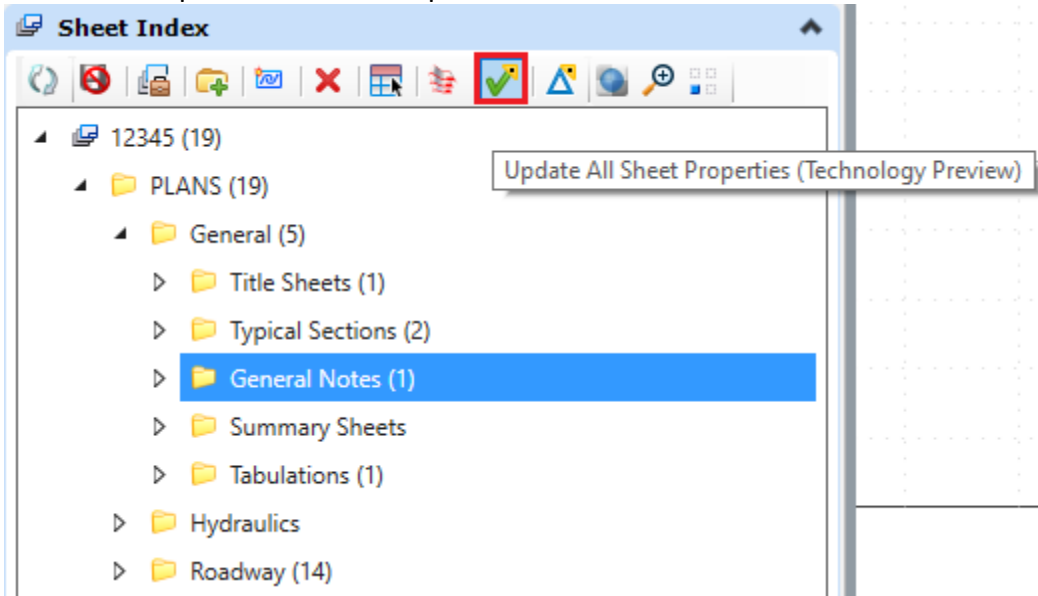
Sheet Numbers will automatically populate when new sheets are added or sheets already in the Sheet Index command are removed. We will go through and add a sheet to the Sheet Index and make sure the Sheet Number field has been updated in the following steps.

- 1) Remaining in the- 12345_RD_Plan Profiles_CR44.dgn & the model CR44 – Plan 1 [Sheet], add the file, **12345_RD_General Notes.dgn** to the PLAN\General\General Notes folder using the Add Sheets command.

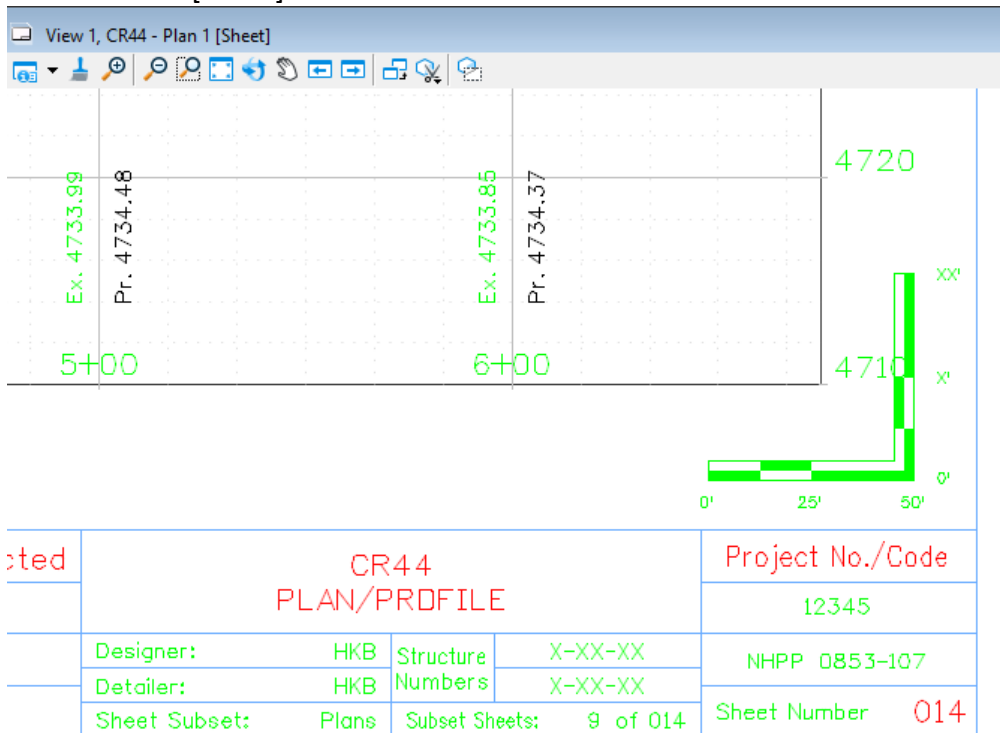


2) Notice that the Sheet Number didn't change for the model we are in. It was Sheet Number 13.

3) Choose the Update All Sheet Properties.

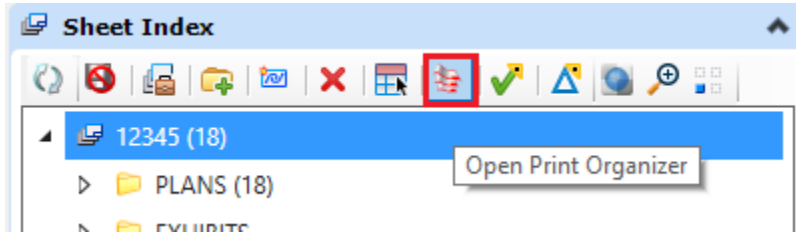


4) Give it a little time to process but the Sheet Number should change from 13 to 14 in the CR44 – Plan 1 [Sheet] model.

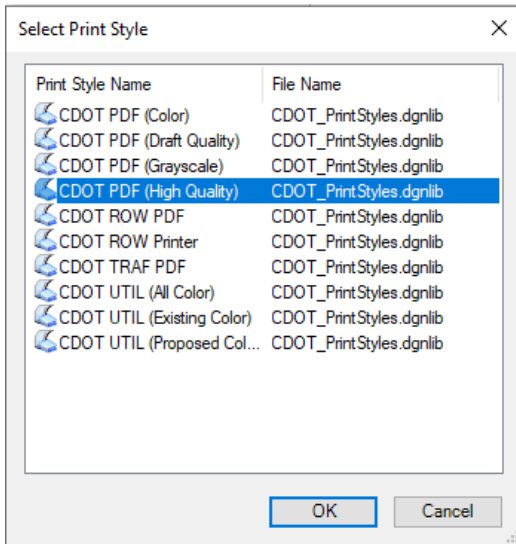


12.9 PDF Creation Process

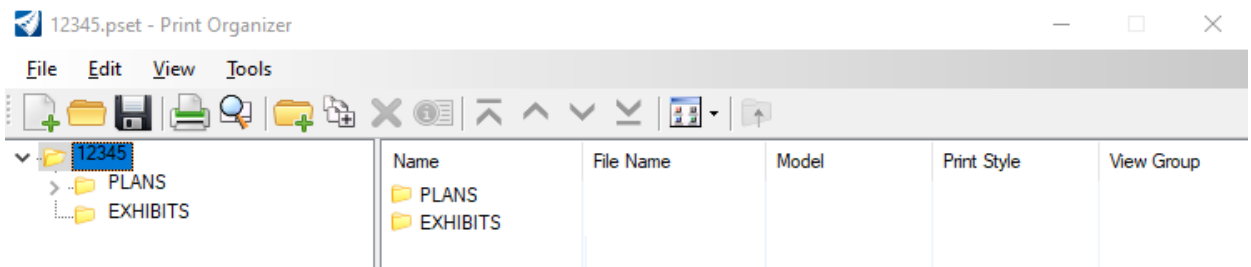
- 1) In the Sheet Index, select the 12345 workset and choose **Open Print Organizer**.



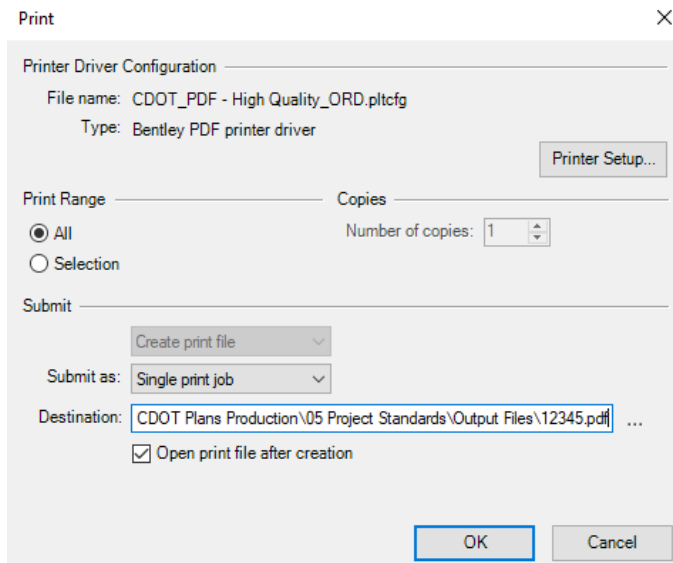
2) Choose the desired print style and click **OK**.

- 4) Click the print icon, verify the **Destination** is correct. Choose the browse icon to change the path and name the file if needed and then click OK.



NOTE: A pset is not necessary if the print organizer is launched from the sheet index.
