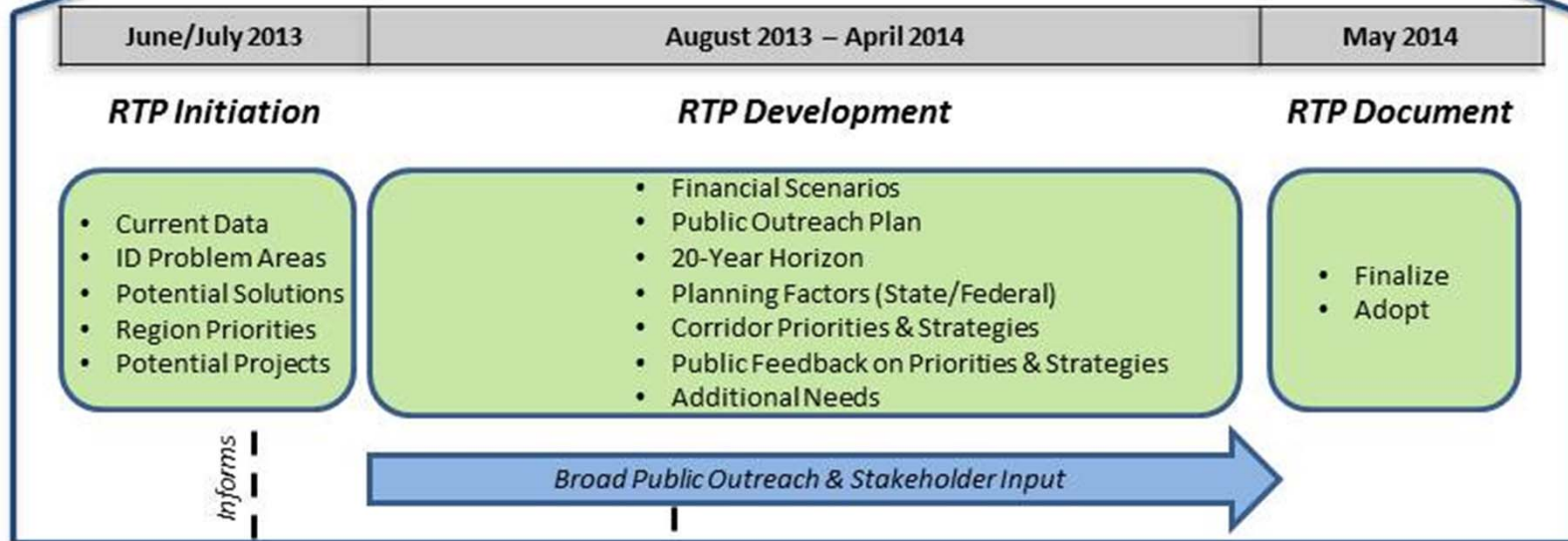

Statewide Plan Process Overview

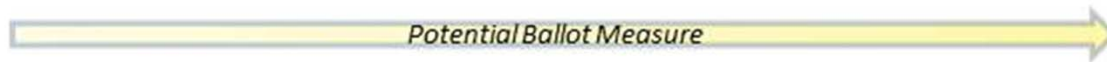


Regional Plan Development Process & Timeline

Regional Transportation Plans	Public Involvement
<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Meaningful plans that guide future decision making	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Broader public participation beyond TPR meetings – go where people are, use non-transportation meetings
<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Corridor visions should inform planning. Short-range strategies needed more attention.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Liked electronic keypad ‘polling’
<ul style="list-style-type: none">• 20-year timeframe too long – best to focus on critical needs now	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Improve outreach to non-driving public
<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Plan that is implementable	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Use Internet, state website, other electronic methods

Regional Transportation Plan Initiation and Development



- RTP Initiation: June – August 2013
- Continued RTP Development: August 2013-March 2014
 - Financial scenarios – Medium, fiscally constrained; high for if more revenues; low if lower revenues
 - Public Outreach Plan – Targeted for each TPR
 - Planning Factors – State and federal law requires that the planning process include consideration of ways to address economic vitality, multimodal, system preservation, safety, security, freight, environmental stewardship, energy/greenhouse reduction, system efficiency, and land use coordination with transportation
 - 20-Year Horizon – More emphasis on first 10 years
 - Corridor Visions, Priorities and Strategies – RTP still focused on corridors; potential projects from RTP initiation among corridor priorities
 - Additional Needs – What other multimodal and other needs have been identified
 - Adoption of RTPs

- Tribal governments – Southwest TPR
 - Closer review of Tribal Coordination Plan
 - Projects for partnering with CDOT
- State and federal environmental resource agency consultation
 - Webinar Concept

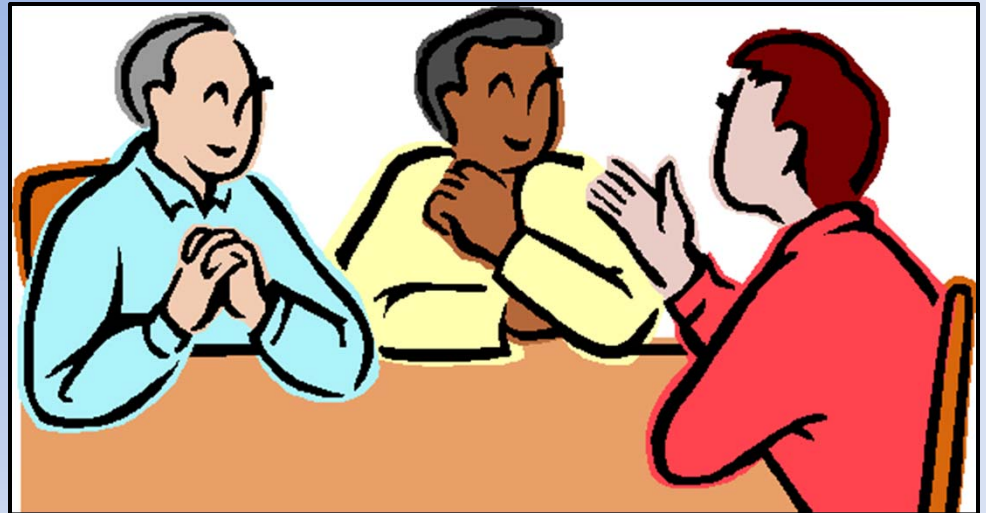
Developing and Implementing Public Outreach – Regional Transportation Plans

- June-July - TPR Meetings to Scope Initial Issues
- Identify Priorities, Needs, Problem areas, Possible Solutions
 - Develop initial project list
- September - Identify Public Involvement Techniques & Approach for each TPR
 - Possible techniques:
 - Telephone Town Hall conferences
 - Open House
 - Website
 - Webinars
 - Mailings, postcards

- October 2013 – Spring 2014
- Confirm TPR Level Priorities, Needs, and Possible Solutions
 - Continuing RTP development and concurrent public involvement
 - September 2013
 - November 2013
 - January 2014
 - March 2014
 - May 2014

Public Outreach – Statewide Transportation Plan

- January – Early Spring – Continued Public Involvement
 - Currently refining P I concepts/ideas
- May – STAC and public review and Comment of Final Plan Product
- June
 - Respond to public comments
 - Finalize Statewide Plan
 - Moving Forward and Implementation
- July
 - TC Adopts Statewide Plan

 - On-line “mini-polls”

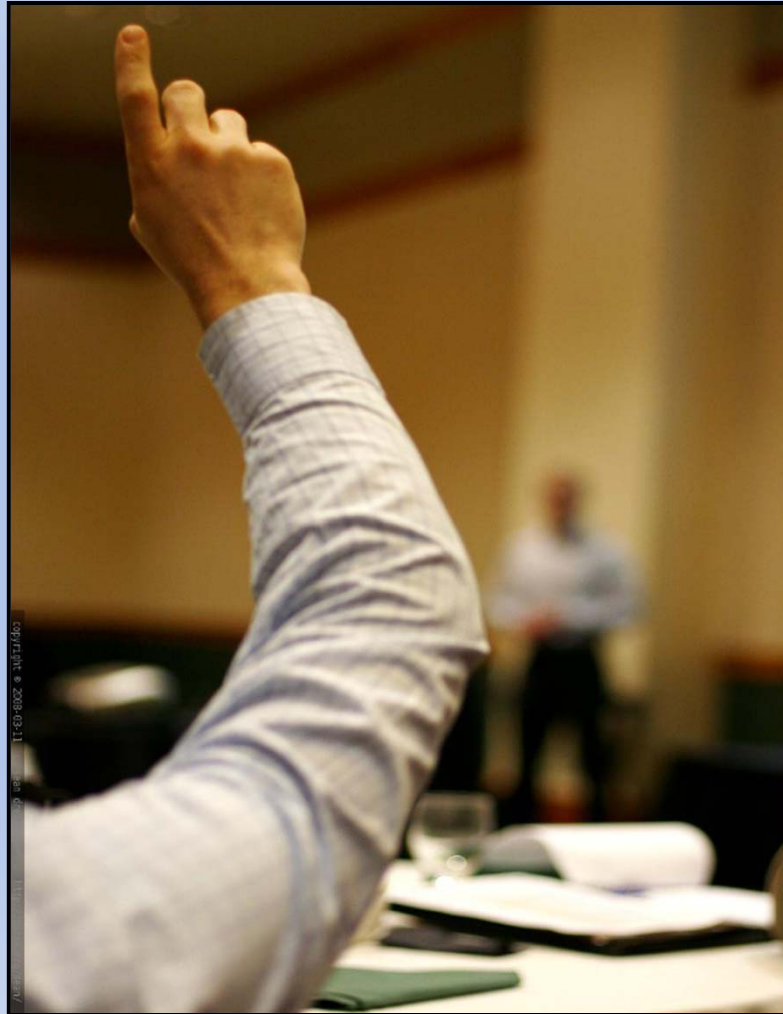


Future Steps with STAC
